Libraries of the 21<sup>st</sup> century are evolving at a pace scarcely imagined a few years ago. In the next few years the Olin Library will grapple with important decisions to take advantage of emerging technologies and align our resources with the accelerating expectations of our faculty and students. The librarians will be depending on close working relationships with the faculty as we navigate changes such as the transition from print to electronic information, the acquisition of new databases, and the development of services to support the evolving curriculum at Rollins.

A streamlined and improved way we communicate and work with faculty members will be our primary means of soliciting faculty input for this transformation. By assigning responsibility for similar academic disciplines to a single librarian, that person can become more familiar with the resources, norms, and structure of knowledge specific to that discipline.

We are fully aware that changes to the library, some of which seem innocuous to the majority of our users, may have profound ripple effects on teaching or research in specific disciplines. Your librarian will be in frequent contact with faculty members and departments to gather ideas and feedback on decisions such as the acquisition of new materials, rearrangement of library space, introduction of new technology, and the development of our print collection.

Another goal of your librarian is the improvement of information literacy among our students. Students, like everyone else, are bombarded with an increasing quantity of information and must learn to evaluate information and navigate the increasingly complex array of information provided through technology. Librarians can partner with faculty to design innovative research projects which will strengthen the information literacy of our students. Recent curricular changes at Rollins have encouraged heavier use of capstone courses, service learning, and internships. Such courses usually require more complex assignments or the use of nontraditional research techniques. This streamlined and improved way to communicate and work with the faculty will provide better support for such programs.

We also hope that we will provide individual Rollins faculty with better service by having a consistent, familiar face who can handle their concerns. You will be able to rely on your librarian to schedule instructional classes for you, order books, provide departmental allocation information, and work with your students on particular assignments. Beyond these basic services, your librarian will be happy to consult with you on your own research projects.

## Need Help Working with Online Data? Yvonne Jones Begins Role as Library Support Contact for Student and Faculty Use of Online Data.

As the information that the library organizes and delivers to our users moves from print to digital, the variety of information resources grows. For instance, we used to deal with images only when they appeared in books and journal articles. Now we provide access to ArtSTOR, a complete database of searchable images. Likewise, we used to deal with only printed music, and now we provide online access to streaming music through Naxos and the Classical Music Library. We used to deal with printed and published data, but now that most data is stored digitally our users are increasingly seeking and interacting with large digital datasets. We want to provide help with this.

There are special skills associated with collecting, organizing, accessing, and helping users with datasets. Yvonne's PhD research involved analyses of datasets from the National Center for Health Statistics on the nutrition and health of over 13,000 children. She has continued her interest in using available online data, recently publishing work comparing academic libraries using datasets from the National Center for Education.

Yvonne currently serves as the science liaison for the library. She is excited about adding this new role developing the library's support for online data use. She will be taking a look at promoting datasets that are already available at Rollins and finding additional quantitative resources of interest to Rollins students and faculty in all departments. In addition, she will work with IT to provide appropriate software and hardware for statistical analysis of datasets and provide basic Geographic Information Systems (GIS) support. She is ready to provide instruction and training, in both group and individual sessions, on the use of selected datasets.

## Nature and Science now available online!



The two most widely read and prestigious science publications in the world are now available to the Rollins community online through Olin Library. We are happy to announce that we have managed to obtain current subscriptions to both these premier journals. *Nature* and *Science* are weekly publications

dedicated to the spread of science information in the broadest sense.

These are two of the most noted journals in which to publish primary science research, so they are frequently where the most cutting-edge science findings you hear on the news are presented. However, they also make available easy to understand news and reviews on topics across a wide area of interests. Recent articles include: “The tangled web of super-heroes,” discussing sexism and elitism in the Marvel Universe, “Archaeology: pieces of the puzzle,” about the situation in Afghanistan, and “Reefs in trouble” the *Science* feature article for Dec.14 on coral reef damage.

The online access provides much more than just electronic access to the content in the print journal. Both *Science* and *Nature* provide access to research in advance of publication (Nature AOP, ScienceXpress), online news, opinion columns, blogs, multimedia sites with podcasts, video streaming, even an online flash comic (*Nature's Adventures in Synthetic Biology*). Readers from all departments on campus can find something of interest in these weekly science news journals.

## *Rollins Oral History Archive*

What would make a college professor turn down a more lucrative position to come teach in Florida? Herbert Hellwege admitted that the beauty of Winter Park, the campus, and the community swayed his decision to take the job. Professor Hellwege's observations are now part of the Rollins College Oral History Archive, launched in the summer of 2005. The purpose of this project is to capture long-term employees' memories and experiences in audio or video form.

Initially funded through a student-faculty collaborative research grant, the program sought to provide an open and candid platform for veteran faculty members to contemplate their years at Rollins, reflect on the challenges they faced over the decades, and celebrate the accomplishments of their teaching, scholarship and community service. The project team consisted of Wenxian Zhang, Associate Professor and the Head of Archives and Special Collections, Corey Schreck ('06), and Lily Velez, ('07). Library archival interns Timothy Maurer ('08) and Rachel Todd ('09) also contributed to the project. Dr. Jack Lane, College Historian and Professor emeritus, has served as consultant and participated in the program. So far more than a dozen interviews have been conducted, with each session documented using a digital voice recorder and a DVD recorder, and conversations transcribed.

Combined, our selected participants have contributed more than 400 years of service to the Rollins community. These individuals range from science professors to history teachers to language instructors, from endowed chairs to deans and vice presidents, and every participant has a story to tell. Although each individual has a unique personality and followed a different career path, many of their ideas about the liberal arts education, their notions of the community, and personal reflections of Rollins are strikingly similar. Professors such as Jack Lane and Barry Levis both commented on the inter-departmental community found at Rollins. Professor Hellwege remembered how he and Donald Griffin, former Rollins student turned faculty member, would teach a course together with Hellwege acting as the teacher and Griffin a student. Lane talked about a master learners program where faculty would attend regular classes as a student, and then discuss the connections between them.

### ***The Olin Library Goes 24/7 for Finals***

The Olin Library stayed open continuously for the final eleven days of Fall term. This is the second time Rollins has experimented with round-the-clock access during reading days and final exams, and the number of students who took advantage of the expanded hours was impressive.

The average gate count for the hours between midnight and 8A.M. was 209, with a high of 350 on the evening of Monday Dec. 10, and a low of 47 on Saturday, Dec. 8.

A count of students in the building each morning at 4A.M. averaged around 40-50 students. For a campus with a residential population of less than 1700, those numbers seem to indicate this was a success. Many thanks to the Provost, Campus Security, and the Olin Library staff who made this service possible.
