## Olin Library Welcomes a New Director

Jonathan Miller has joined the Rollins College community as the new director of the Olin Library. A native of England, Jonathan graduated from the University of Sheffield with a degree in Political Theory and earned his Masters of Information and Library Sciences from the State University of New York.

Jonathan comes to us from the University of Pittsburgh, where he served as the Head of Public Services from 2002-2006, and is the former Library Director of Augustana College in Illinois. In addition, Jonathan has worked for the University of Iowa and The Ohio State University. While at the University of Pittsburgh, Jonathan began work on a doctorate in Information Science. The subject of his dissertation will be the role of librarians in helping to shape the Copyright Act of 1976. "I've always been interested in the legal and policy issues surrounding intellectual content," he said. "Copyright is one way in which our society encourages the production and distribution of science and the useful arts. The deal is that by rewarding creators for a limited time, we all have access to more knowledge and art. Libraries have always been part of this distribution system."

Going forward, Jonathan believes that keeping in touch with library patrons will be one of his most important priorities. "We have a new generation of faculty and students who have evolving expectations of what an academic library should be. We need to keep in touch with them to know what their needs are... on their terms, not on ours." The challenge for the library will be to develop a process for meeting these new patron expectations while maintaining all that is best about the existing library.

As a small step in this direction, Jonathan has started a blog to introduce himself to the Rollins community and help us think about some of the issues facing the library and the academy. Take a look at <http://rollins-olin-library.blogspot.com>. He encourages your comments.

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## Books That Made a Difference

*Siddhartha*  
By Hermann Hesse

A blast from the past for many baby boomers. It was the early seventies. The war in Vietnam was out of control, the President was headed for disgrace, and I was, like so many of my generation, searching for some way to make sense of the world. Although many books have shaped my view of life and influenced my decisions, perhaps none have had the overarching effect of *Siddhartha*, Herman Hesse's story of a young man's search for his role on earth.

I was 18 years old, and anything was possible, as long as I did not have to go fight in Vietnam. Like most 18 year olds, I believed that all of the killing, all the fighting, and all the violence taking place around the world was a tragic waste of life and spirit. "All we are saying.....is give peace a chance." It was a time when young people saw the devastation of the environment, the greed of the world's wealthiest nations, and the oppression of so many people everywhere as evidence that we needed a revolution. It was a time to remember.

*Siddhartha* gave me hope. The story culminates in a view of people that is upbeat, optimistic, and respectful. Hesse's character grows to understand how so many different people can live together, how the forces of nature come to show us the error of our ways, and how love is indeed the most powerful force of all. These and many other undercurrents in *Siddhartha* left a mark on me at the age of 18 that remains still. After many years of study, family, travel, teaching and learning, and working with a rich variety of people of all ethnicities, ages, and abilities, I realize that my very nature has changed very little from that time, and that my simple approach to the many decisions I face daily can be at least in part traced to the pages of *Siddhartha*.

To many people, the virtues of waiting, being patient, and listening are lost in the modern race for more property, more wealth, and more prestige. Recognition and reputation are valued more than honesty and altruism. *Siddhartha*'s message to me 35 years ago was calming, and allowed me to focus on the importance of inner strength and resolve. As I flip through the pages now, I know this little book has taught me much about living.

Turnitin is a comprehensive resources for teaching about, deterring, and identifying plagiarism. By creating a Turnitin account, faculty can check students papers against Internet sites and commercial databases to identify instances of plagiarism and other problems in the use of paraphrasing or citation. In the last year, more than twenty faculty members uses this resource in over thirty-four courses. Turnitin can also be used with Blackboard.

Improvements include a podium to house all equipment, a multi-media control system, a Smart Symposium interactive pen display, and a high-resolution document camera.
