The next dramatic performances of the Student Company under the direction of Dr. Earl E. Fleischman will be Shakespeare's "Hamlet" on February 22, and Philip Barry's "Hotel Universe" on April 12.

President Hamilton Holt was the speaker at the Knowles Memorial Chapel on January 5. He spoke on "America's Supreme Opportunity", putting his address in the form of an "open sermon" to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, with whom he recently lunched at the White House. It was a masterly plea for President Roosevelt to lead the United States into the Court of International Justice, and the League of Nations.

THE INITIAL EVENT IN THE ROLLINS SEMICENTENNIAL

Tuesday, January 29, 1935, 3 P. M.

Why Orange City? Because it was here, half-way between Winter Park and Daytona Beach that Rollins, a Pilgrim institution, was born January 29, 1885.

Appropriately then, a half-century later, by invitation of the Congregational Church, all roads will lead again to Orange City.

At 2:45 P. M. an academic procession composed of trustees, faculty, chapel choir, students and invited guests from many sections of the United States, will proceed from Recreation Hall on University Avenue, Orange City, to the speakers' stand on the area adjoining the Congregational house of worship.

Addresses by Rev. Edward M. Noyes, D.D., President of the American Congregational Association of Boston and Rev. Jay T. Stocking, D.D., of St. Louis, Moderator of the General Council of the Congregational and Christian Churches; the unveiling of a Memorial Tablet upon the church and a Roadside Marker upon the Highway; a reception and tea tendered in Library Hall by the women of the church and community; music by the Rollins Student Trio and an exhibition of portraits and historical memorabilia, are features of the program.

Seating accommodations will be ample; also space for parking opposite the church.

Extend the invitation far and wide. It is an Epic to conjure with—this story of Pilgrim influence which initiated Rollins College.

land idealists founded a pioneer college in Winter Park, Florida—as they had founded more than a score of other Colleges in New England and the western states. It was a different kind of school—a New England College, with its dreams and its ideals set down in the heart of Florida.

THE ROLLINS ANIMATED MAGAZINE

HE "publication" of Volume IX, Number 1, of this unique Magazine will take place as a "Literary Vespers" on Sunday afternoon, February 24, at 2:30 on the college campus. It is the only Magazine in the United States that "comes alive".

On the previous Sunday, February 17, an abridged "Radio Edition" of the Rollins Animated Magazine" will be broadcast from New York with a national hookup. The speakers will be distinguished "contributors"

to previous issues of the Magazine.

Among the "contributors" who will appear in person at Winter Park on February 24 are Hon. Cordell Hull, Secretary of State, and Hon. Andre de Laboulaye, the present French Ambassador to the United States. Last year President Roosevelt's Cabinet was represented by Hon. Homer S. Cummings, Attorney General and Hon. Daniel C. Roper, Secretary of Commerce.

A group of sixteen or more notable editors, poets and novelists will also be present to make their contributions in person. The usual great audience of between 5000 and 6000 "subscribers" will be present to enjoy this literary festival, sponsored by Rollins College for the benefit of its students, the community of Winter Park and interested visitors throughout Florida.

The proceeds derived from the "Rollins Animated Magazine" are applied to the book

fund of the College library.

THE KRESS ART EXHIBIT

NOTABLE event in the program commemorating the Semicentennial of Rollins College will be the exhibition of 61 Italian paintings from the famous collection of Mr. Samuel H. Kress of New York City.

The exhibit will fill the three galleries of the Winter Park Woman's Club and will formally open February 1 and close February 24. No admission will be charged as Mr. Kress hopes in this way to encourage a more cultural understanding of Art.

This exhibit is, without doubt, the most valuable collection of paintings ever shown in Central Florida, and presents a rare opportunity for the study of masterpieces of painting, many of which have come from famous European galleries. Art lovers throughout Florida are invited to enjoy this unusual cultural opportunity, which rarely presents itself outside the great art centers of New York and Chicago.

This is the first time that this almost priceless collection of paintings has been loaned to a College, and Rollins is proud to be thus highly honored.

Mr. Kress has long been a patron of Art and has selected this group of 61 paintings as representative of the development of the art of painting in Italy. The exhibit will be opened February 1 with a formal reception and Mr. Kress will be an honored guest on this occasion.
