dramatic event of outstanding importance was the coming to the Annie Russell Theatre on January 11-14 of Fred Stone in "Lightnin" which has been called "one of the best-loved of American Plays."

The play was first produced by Frank Bacon in 1918 and had a long and successful revival last year by John Golden on Broadway with Fred Stone playing the part

of "Lightnin" Bill Jones.

In the Rollins performances Mr. Stone was supported by an outstanding cast chosen from the Rollins Student Players. Each of the six performances attracted a capacity house and Mr. Stone's interpretation of "Lightnin" was enthusiastically acclaimed. Mr. Stone is an Honorary Alumnus of Rollins College.

The schedule for the Rollins Debating Team this year includes debates with such colleges as Johns Hopkins University, the University of Vermont, New York University, William and Mary College, four of the leading Colleges in Florida, and a number of other Colleges.

Rollins Cultural Activities

The recently proclaimed "intellectualism" of President Hutchins of the University of Chicago as the aim and end of higher education is challenged by the educational philosophy of President Hamilton Holt, and the educational ideals which have been evolved at Rollins during the past twelve years under his leadership. Dr. W. A. Cowley recently elected President of Hamilton College challenged this new "educational idol" in his inaugural address. He said, "The College is not a mind factory. In education and in living, intelligence is not enough. Thinking is only a part of living. Students come to College not only to train their minds but for the enrichment of their lives as people.

Society expects not only intelligence from College graduates but also civilized attitudes, matured emotions and cultivated

character."

For twelve years Rollins College has been pursuing this goal under its Conference Plan which *humanizes* the classroom work, and its Achievement Plan of promotion which *individualizes* the curriculum.

Rollins Musical Program

HE Symphony Orchestra of Central Florida is affiliated with Rollins College and is under the direction of Alexander Bloch of the Rollins Conservatory of Music.

The Orchestra which consists of fifty instruments opened its twelfth season on December 12. Four concerts are given during the winter season. The dates of the three remaining concerts are January 25, February 22 and March 22.

The concerts will include works by Debussy, Schumann, Tchaikowsky, Saint-Saens, Beethoven, and Wagner. The Orchestra takes high rank throughout the South, and was included in the Survey recently made by the Columbia Broadcasting Company.

The Bach Festival

will be held March 2-3 in the beautiful Knowles Memorial Chapel. The choir this year numbers 150 carefully selected voices.

The distinguished soloists include Lillian Knowles, Arthur Kraft, David Blair Mc-Closky and Mac Morgan.

The Apollo Boys Choir of Birmingham will sing from the triforium of the Chapel in the chorales of the Saint Matthew Passion. This Festival of Bach music is widely accepted as one of the notable musical events of the year.

Endowment For Student Aid

Rollins No. 1 and urgent need is "endowment for student aid".

Last year 59% of Rollins students paid the actual cost of their education, or \$1345. The remaining 41% required some "student aid" in order to enable them to remain in College.

The "Unit Cost Plan" which requires students that can afford to do so to pay the actual cost of a year at Rollins, has put

Rollins' finances on a sound basis.

During each of the past thirteen years of President Holt's administration the College has shown an operating profit—except for the years 1926, 27, 28 and 1932—and during that time it has accumulated a total operating surplus of \$72,015.34—and this during the years of "depression" and "recession"!

On the present basis of its operation Rollins does not need endowment for salaries or other current expenses. It does need, and that urgently, \$1,000,000 of additional endowment, the income from which will be used exclusively to enable worthy, ambitious students, who could not otherwise do so, to remain at Rollins.
