These will be the headlines they will read shortly in OLIN INFO and the <u>Sandspur</u> if the current trend of student abuses of the Olin Library is not curtailed. For example, many of you may not know that library patrons are now attempting to illegally remove books and magazines on a daily basis; that during the past week, no less than four students, with arms loaded with library books, have mysteriously "fallen" from the stairs in the library in the presence of their friends, and that pages are being torn and cut from circulating and reference books and from current and bound issues of library magazines on a regular basis

Additionally, food and beverage consumption in Olin is on the rise and personal property of library patrons is being stolen on a more frequent basis. And, if the above were not sufficiently alarming and disappointing, I must report that the two copies of the Sunday Orlando Sentinel have been taken from the Library receiving area and returned damaged or mutilated, if at all, for each of the past five (5) Sundays..

Personal Property of Library Patrons No Longer Safe From Theft in Olin Library

This special issue of the Olin Library newsletter represents the first of a series of efforts to both monitor these type offenses and to deal firmly with the offenders.

For example, the library will begin circulating to faculty and the College administration a list of sections of book and periodical articles that have been, in many cases, ripped from the volumes. This will continue to be done on a regular basis, so that anyone committing such acts will know that their faculty are familiar with the specific materials that have been vandalized.

In order to begin to respond to the general deterioration in the conduct of patrons in the library, each instance of disruptive behavior, each attempt to steal library materials, each time a person mutilates a library books or journal, each prank or pledge activity in the library, and any other inappropriate activities that occur in the library will be treated as the serious violation of College regulation and property that they are and the library administration will press for the most severe penalty possible.

The Cost of Library Thefts and Mutilations


Many persons responding to the revelation that library materials are being stolen and mutilated almost immediately pose the questions: *How much does it cost to replace/repair...?*

While there is no formula for calculating the actual cost to the College for each book or magazine lost to theft or damaged by mutilation, there are specific categories of costs that we experience in dealing with these problems. Some of them are:

Staff time in locating replacement items	- \$\$\$
Cost of replacement item	- \$\$\$
Rebinding cost for damaged material	- \$\$\$
Staff time in processing replacement	- \$\$\$
Permanent damage to mutilated volumes	- \$\$\$
Loss of access by student & faculty to material	s-\$\$\$

Without providing the actual dollars for each category, you can readily see that the total replacement/repair cost @ item, then can be more than the cost of one or more new titles that the Library would purchase if it were not required to repair damaged materials or replace stolen materials.

These are abuses of the rights and privileges of all ulty, staff and administrators at Rollins College, and you press your outrage. Any student who observes and se offenses may one day discover that the resourses they

need have been mutilated or stolen, or that funds to acquire the new resources that they need have been spent to replace stolen or repair damaged library books and periodicals. Its your Library, too. Each of you must speak out against such conduct.

Copies have been circulated to alumni, trustee, friends, emeriti faculty, parents, et. al. It is hoped that this special issue will not reach their hands, as it would not bring pride to their hearts. Lately there have been several reports of student misconduct in the Olin Library. I write to clarify Rollins' position with regard to infractions that occur within the library system.

- Theft of library materials is considered <u>theft</u>, and is subject to disciplinary review and sanctions.
- Students who damage library property will be held accountable and will be subject to disciplinary proceedings.
- If certain organized activities are identified as pledge activities, the student organizations, as well as individuals involved, will be held accountable.

It is my hope that all members of the College community will appreciate the quality of our library and treat it with the respect and consideration it deser Only by upholding high standards can we be assured that we will have aquality library in the future that all of us will enjoy using.
