THE Bach Festival at Winter Park which is now in its fifth season is regarded as one of the notable musical events of the South. Rollins Economic Conference

THE sixth annual Economic Conference to be held at Rollins College, February sixth, seventh and eighth, promises to be equal in interest and stimulation to those of past years.

This year questions of business and industry under our defense program and the world situation will be the general topic. Eminent business men and labor leaders have been selected to discuss these questions.

Many persons of national and international fame have appeared on these conference programs in the past and it is planned to have several equally prominent names on the coming program.

Two or three sessions are held daily during the three-day period; one session in the forenoon and one in the afternoon.

Rollins Religious Preferences

THERE are fifteen churches represented in the list of religious preferences as recorded by Rollins 415 students.

Leading the fifteen groups are the Episcopalians with 88 students. The Presbyterians and Methodists each have 68 students and the Baptists 39. There are 31 members of the Catholic Church, and 30 of the Congregational Church, 14 Christian Scientists; 11 Hebrews, 7 Lutherans, 7 Unitarians and 3 Quakers. Several other groups are also represented. During the year nearly 150 students are associated with the services and program of the Knowles Memorial Chapel.

Have You an "Educated Heart"


IF YOU have not discovered the lasting satisfaction which comes from making a gift, whether large or small, to some worthy cause, such as an educational institution, you have missed a rewarding experience.

Many people forget that the Federal Revenue Act of 1935 recognized this, and permits a person to contribute 15 per cent of his net income to such causes, *before calculating his income tax for any year*. Through the oversight of taxpayers only two per cent of the 15 per cent was deducted for a recent year by those paying a Federal Income Tax. Why not take *full advantage* of this legal exemption to make a gift to Rollins "Student Aid"?

If you would like to make a gift *in excess* of the annually deductible 15 per cent, the gift may be paid *in installments* over a period of years. For example, if your taxable income is \$50,000 and you would like to make a gift of \$15,000 to Rollins College, you would secure the maximum deduction by making *two payments* of \$7,500 each in successive years.

If your income is in the still higher brackets, your "saving by giving" will be increasingly greater, and your gift of greater service.

The State of Florida has no inheritance tax, no estate tax, no income taxes. These are prohibited by the State constitution. Only the *federal* taxes apply to Florida. If a person has retired from active business and spends a considerable part of the year in Florida, he could well consider transferring *his legal residence* to Florida, and then *share the savings* with Rollins College, the oldest College in the State.
