
In other words, we propose to enrich the lives and characters of our students by the personalities of teachers and by beauty of environment.












I have a special feeling for the class that graduates this June, for "1929" and I entered Rollins together, and for four strenuous and happy years we have shared in common the trials and triumphs that have blessed us. 

If that is the case I suggest that when you get to be old enough to be something of a "sage" (no matter how little you really know you really know), you will repeat this testimony to the next generation for whatever inspiration it may be worth.


In one of his first addresses as head of Rollins College President Holt said: "My ideal of a college is based upon SERVICE. First, of course, to the students who have paid their tuition and who have gathered on this campus to continue their search for Truth. Second, to the community in which the college is located, and third so far as resources permit, to the general public. We are all debtors to the world. We owe for everything we have in life. We know we can never pay this debt but the only real happiness in life is in trying to pay it."

In every branch of its activities, Rollins co-operates with the community and general public. One of the greatest calls upon the college is for lectures and addresses. The Public Service Committee of the Faculty acts as a clearing house for rendering this service. A booklet is issued in the autumn listing the teaching staff and the subjects upon which they have chosen to speak.


This year—or—(In 1928-1929) thirty-two faculty members with a total of one hundred and eighty seven—or—(187) topics were included.

Addresses that were given totalled over one hundred fifty and included cities as far south as Miami and as far north as Macon, Georgia.








Coach Berry came to Rollins as Freshmen Coach from Clarke College, Mississippi. He has succeeded this year in turning out creditable teams in football and basketball.


Swimming instruction has been very capably carried on under the direction of "Bill" Rice.

From a standpoint of games won and lost the football season this year was a failure. However, from the point of view of building up a future team it was decidedly otherwise. Coach Bailey started the season just closed with twenty-one men eligible for the varsity team. Of these, sixteen showed sufficient ability to rate places on the first squad. But winning football is not played in this modern day with a squad of sixteen men.







In nearly every game the first half ended with Rollins holding its own, but after the opponents had withdrawn their "shock troops" and bolstered up their first-string by a number of substitutions our boys were gradually worn down. There is at least one ray of light to cheer us from the season's games, namely, that Stetson beat us only 19 to 6 this year compared to 75 to 0 last year. So our team is improving.

The Freshmen squad showed up well this year, and their seventeen members will be a great help in varsity athletics next year.







While four men are being lost by graduation, namely, Burhans, Goodell, Warner and Zoller, indications now point to a varsity squad next year of at least thirty-five, with such additions from the Freshmen squad as Gee, Levitt, Orr, Miller, McKercher, Palmer and Spencer, and an upperclassman not eligible this year, Reid. With this greatly increased reserve strength, it is confidently expected that Rollins will next year enjoy a prosperous season.




Basket-Ball

Tennis





Girls' basket-ball this year claimed many old players and several new ones who greatly strengthened their respective teams.



#### **Volley-Ball**


Volley ball was the major sport for the spring term. Class teams were chosen from the squad material. Near the close of the season odd and even teams were selected and the combats for championship fought.

# Alumni Association

The Alumni Association has closed another successful year of service. During the past year the Alumni office has been able to keep approximately 1,500 former students and graduates informed of what was being done on the campus and of President Holt's unique plan which is being so successfully carried out. An effort is also being made to secure the addresses of over 1,000 former students who have been "lost." This work is carried on through the Alumni magazine, *The Record*, personal contact and voluminous correspondence.

The Alumni Association continues to foster the traditions of the College. The annual breakfast in honor of the Senior Class was held at the Family Tree on the morning of June 8th. The Annual Reunion, with the meeting and luncheon held at the Seminole Hotel, was one of the important events of Founders Week. Rex Beach, President of the Alumni Association, presided at the annual meeting, which was attended by a large number of Alumni and at which time the increasing pride which all felt in Rollins was made manifest. Rollins is today standing out against "bigness" and all that the term signifies and her Alumni have an unbounded pride in the efforts of their own "small" college and the ideals for which she is standing.

An important step was taken in the financing of the Alumni Association at the annual meeting. This was the elimination of dues and the substitution therefor of the Rollins Loyalty Fund. The purpose of the Loyalty Fund is to support the College both directly and indirectly. This fund enables every former student to give something. In other words, "Something from Everyone Given Gladly!"

There was also instituted a plan whereby a member of each class would act as Secretary for his class. It is the hope of the Council that this will be of great assistance in keeping members of the class informed of the activities of each other and of the College.

The work of the Rollins Alumni Association has been recognized during the past year by the American Alumni Council through the appointment of A. J. Hanna, Executive Secretary, as Director of District III of the American Alumni Council. This District includes Alabama, Georgia, Florida, North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia. As director, Mr. Hanna has arranged two regional meetings in this district, one at Macon, Georgia, and one at Richmond, Virginia, supplementing the general meeting of the American Alumni Council to be held at Toronto, Canada.

A new Rollins Club has been formed during the past year, "The Rollins Orient Club." This club was formed by Rebecca Caldwell, '25, who is teaching in the Silliman Institute in the Philippine Islands. This brings the number of Rollins Clubs to eleven and includes the Rollins Clubs of Boston, Chicago, Cuba, Daytona Beach, Fort Meyers, Jacksonville, Miami, New York, Ohio, Orient and Tampa.



## THE ALUMNUS AND ROLLINS

I have never until lately stopped to think what an alumnus is or what he stands for at his college reunions. I assume he stands for something in the romantic eyes of the undergraduates, but I don't know just what. To the professors he is the arch-enemy of their teachings in the class room, partly because he is a horrible example of what education actually accomplishes when allowed to take its course, and partly because he is likely to run to reminiscences and dwell too vividly upon his own illicit and perhaps imaginary undergraduate escapades. To the college president he is the big game upon which there is no closed season. He is an ovis poli whose head may be captured and capitalized for the benefit of the college exchequer. To the world at large he is what Horace Greeley must have had in mind when he referred to all college graduates as "horned cattle."

In the pilgrimages I have made to Rollins during the past three years, I have observed a noticeable change has come over it. The old game of outwitting the common enemy, the professor, which we played with youthful gusto, seems to have become unpopular. Instead there is a conference plan of study, where the students are on good terms with their teachers, discussing with freedom and with high intelligence this serious business of fitting themselves for a useful and congenial occupation. I have a deep conviction that the exercise of common sense in educational methods and a greater independence of thought on the part of the student, as illustrated at Rollins, will result in a tremendous thinning out of that useless, wasteful, tragic standing army of misfits and failures, and result in the production of an alumnus entirely worthy of that good Latin name.
