Academic Affairs Committee Meeting Minutes February 22, 2007

In Attendance: Sharon Carnahan (Chair), Jay Yellen, Hoyt Edge, Dana Hargrove, Thomas Moore, Marie Shafe, Ed Cohen.

1. The minutes from the February 15th, 2007 meeting were approved.
2. Old Business:
 - a. Honors Proposal revision update: The Honor proposal will be put into action for this coming Fall only, with a reworked proposal anticipated.

b. Internship Proposal update: The amended proposal was submitted to the AAC. In depth discussion meetings have taken place involving Sharon Carnahan, Career Services, Sherry Fischer, Hoyt Edge and Toni Holbrook where they agreed for now to leave the 'in good academic standing not on academic probation' in the proposal and change the 'not on social probation' to 'not on community probation'. Community Probation is a smaller subset of social probation and represents a more significant offence. This is the compromise that was arrived at within this new proposal.

AAC went on to discuss this amended proposal in great depth. Tom asked if there are set guidelines for what a Social Probation is and what a Community Probation is? Hoyt answered saying there are some guidelines, but it seems to be a judgment call in many cases, for instance if the student is a repeat offender. Jay, Ed and Marie offered similar revised proposals while Tom questioned the statement of standards that this revised proposal brings. We came to vote on two options:

- I. The revised proposal is accepted with an addition: Academic and Community probation prohibits students from taking an internship and all appeals go through Academic Appeals Committee.
- II. Rejection of the proposal with the proposal by AAC that it becomes 'both academic and all social probation prohibits students from taking an internship and that all appeals go through the Academic Appeals Committee'

The vote went 2 to 4 in favor of option 2.

Ed Cohen made a suggestion about whether the policy should be written in terms of when we give credit, not when we allow them to register for an internship. If we had all social probations coded in Banner, then it could check automatically whether the student should get credit or not. No students would be awarded credit for internships if they are on academic and/or social probation. Hoyt is going to talk to Toni Holbrook and Donna Lee about developing this system.

AAC will send a memo to Donna Lee and Student Affairs committee saying the reason why we have adopted the policy as is, is because we have a lack of clarification about what constitutes social probation and as soon as this is clarified we will entertain option 1.

The next AAC meeting will be on March 1st 8:00 am in the Warden Dining Room the 4C committee will be joining with us.
