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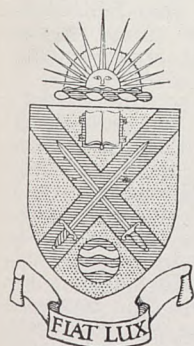

We Came Alive In '55

Alumni of Rollins College have contributed \$18,048.10 to the College since the presentation of the Annual Alumni Fund plan for financial support to Rollins, last July 1, by Rollins Alumni Inc. Solicitation began with the general mailing to all Alumni in October. Contributions have been received from all age groups, from nearly every state in the USA and from five foreign countries.

Additional gifts are expected before February 25, Alumni Day, when the 1955-56 campaign will officially end. However contributions received until June 30, will be credited to this year's campaign. No further contributions will be sought for Rollins, from Alumni, until the opening of the 1956-57 Alumni Fund drive.

The officers and directors of Rollins Alumni Inc., and the College Administration are highly gratified and deeply appreciate the response that has come from this first year under the new system.

Until this year Rollins was among the few free and independent colleges not receiving active financial support from Alumni as a group and the College was contributing funds each year to the operational budget of the Alumni organization. This year, for the first time, this will not be necessary for we, as an organized group, have paid our own way, with a balance left over to help with the ever growing costs of providing the Rollins type of education to young men and women.

The first year results are further noteworthy because, in most colleges, the returns fail to meet the additional costs of such a plan until the fourth or fifth year.

No goal was set for this year. Each Alumnus was asked to give, according to his or her means, something for Rollins. Indications however point to an average gift which will compare well with the average individual gift from alumni from all colleges and universities.

If you have not already done so, won't you join your classmates and send your contribution before February 25. Together Rollins Alumni can make Rollins greater.

Annual Meeting

The 1956 annual meeting of members of Rollins Alumni Inc., will be held Saturday, February 25, during Founders' Week. The annual luncheon and business meeting will be held, as last year, in the Student Center on the Campus. The annual reception, honoring the Gay '90s group and the members of the '50th anniversary class, 1906, will be held in the afternoon.

Registration of Alumni will be at Alumni House from 9:30 until 12:00 Saturday morning. Local Alumni and early arrivals are asked to register at Alumni House all day Friday.

The luncheon will cost \$1.50 per plate and reservations can be made at Alumni House through Wednesday, February 22, by mail or telephone. A handy reservation blank will be found in this issue of the RECORD. Alumni House telephone number is W.P. 3-8291.

President Wm. G. MacGuire will preside at the luncheon and business meeting and a brief program, is being arranged. The business meeting will follow the luncheon.

The reception and tea will be in Alumni House at 4:00 p.m., when members of the Gay '90s group and the members of the class of 1906, will be guests of honor of Rollins Alumni Inc.

Rollins Gets Ford Grant

Rollins College shared, \$369,000.00 worth, in the half billion dollar Ford Foundation gift to the nation's privately supported colleges, hospitals and medical schools. The announcement reached the Campus on the morning of December 12, in the form of a brief telegram, which left students, faculty and staff buzzing with excitement.

Rollins' share comes in the form of two grants. The first for \$246,000.00 is an outright grant for the improvement of teaching salaries. The second for \$123,000.00 is an accomplishment grant, recognizing Rollins' value as an independent college of arts and sciences and the efforts that have been made in recent years to raise the economic level of her teachers. Rollins shared with 126 other colleges in the U. S. in receiving the accomplishment grant and is the only Florida college in this selected group. This too, will be used for the increasing of teaching salaries.

The grant was announced as an effort on the part of the Ford Foundation to strengthen American higher education "at its base — the quality of its teaching." The first \$246,000.00 approximates the amount of the 1954-55 payroll for instruction in the liberal arts and sciences. That is to go into endowment with the income used for increasing faculty salaries. These endowment grants are to be held as income-producing endowments for a period of ten years, after which either capital or income may be used for any academic need.

The achievement grant of \$123,000.00, is from the \$50,000,000 grant program announced in the spring of 1955. The individual grants amount to approximately one-half of last year's faculty salaries in the arts and sciences. Only 126 institutions who have "led the way in their regions in improving the status and compensations of American college teachers" received this grant. Income from this may be spent by these institutions either for raising faculty salaries or for other pressing needs. Payment of the grants will be spread over an 18 month period ending in June 1958.

In commenting on the huge gift by the Ford Foundation the American Alumni Council said: "Although no one single purpose could be found for such grants that is so worthy as raising faculty salaries, the Ford Foundation action does not affect the needs and opportunities for gift support, and particularly for expendable operating funds, in other areas of the colleges' program, and help is still needed there now as much as before."

The New York Times in commenting on the grant pointed out, among other benefits, that the fund should serve as a rallying point for colleges, their students, alumni and friends to help raise more money for the cause of higher education.

In concluding its report the American Alumni Council quoted one college president: "Every College graduate must bear in mind that while indus-

Patrons of Rollins

We have evolved a new plan this year for bringing those who support Rollins College closer into its life and activities. How to inform the Alumni about it has been something we have been discussing a month or so. We would be remiss if we did not tell you about it because it may become important to Rollins. On the other hand, if we sent an invitation to all of you, there might be some who would misunderstand it. Hence, this statement on the new Plan for Patrons and a general invitation to all of you to participate in it if you wish.

The Trustees are inviting a number of those who support the College to become official Patrons for an academic year. Patrons will be the guests of the College at the Founders' Week Dinner and the Animated Magazine, they will be offered reserved seats at Convocations and they will receive special reports on the College. The Trustees may, and very likely will, consult them on board matters of policy. Patrons will contribute \$50 a year to the Diamond Jubilee Fund.

An explanatory letter has already gone out to many friends of the College and to some of the Alumni. The letter explains the Plan in detail and at the same time makes it quite clear that if for any reason at all, the person receiving it is not inclined to make the Patron's contribution, the letter is to be considered as an expression on the part of the Trustees that they would like to have the recipient's interest in the College.

In a few days, the invitations to become Patrons will go out accompanied by a reservation card for the Founders' Week Dinner. The reservation card is to be filled out and mailed back to the College before February 20th.

The reason some of you received the explanatory letter and some did not is this: Some of the Alumni have attended the Founders' Week Dinner each year, and it is possible that if they were not invited to become Patrons they might have felt that the Trustees were overlooking them. Others who received the letter had shown much interest in college matters and we wanted them to be informed on the plan. To have sent the letter to all of the Alumni would have cost \$200 or more.

Will all of you consider this an invitation to become a Patron if you wish. **No other invitation will be sent to the Alumni.** Your Patron's contribution will go to the Alumni Fund. If you wish to attend the Dinner, or the Animated Magazine, or have a seat reserved for you at the Convocations, a note to the Chairman of Founders' Week will assure that this is done.

In this and all other ventures we attempt at Rollins, we would be glad to have suggestions from the Alumni. There must be a better way of informing the Alumni about the Plan and there must be ways of improving on the Plan — we would like to learn them as quickly as possible.
