## Fund Support Urged

Just before Commencement Week at Rollins last spring, I as your president, told the members of the class of 1955 that we planned to adopt the Annual Giving Plan of alumni assistance to Rollins College. I explained to them what other colleges had done and were doing. I told them what they, as Alumni, could do to help with the plan. In fact I was told that I was a little blunt when I said that they had not paid the full cost to Rollins for their undergraduate work. Blunt or not they accepted the idea unanimously and as you will see in another story in this issue of the RECORD, each and every member of the graduating class contributed an average gift of \$5.60 for a total of \$573.15—before they were even officially Alumni of Rollins.

In February I had an opportunity to talk to the members of the class of 1950 who had returned for their twenty-fifth reunion. The plan was only briefly outlined to them for it had not been fully decided upon at the time. They liked the idea so well that they immediately named **Stella Weston Tuttle** as the class fiscal agent. Already, and she has not sent out a single appeal to her classmates, they have given \$190.00 to the Alumni Fund.

I have talked to many individual Alumni, and each one has been highly in favor of the plan. They believe, as we your officers believe, that it is time for the Alumni of Rollins to take their rightful place among other Alumni groups and join themselves into a powerful, active, participating organization for the betterment of Rollins.

This year I have been more closely associated with Rollins College than ever before, even during my undergraduate years. I have received a new conception not only of Rollins but of the whole picture of higher education. Rollins, like all other colleges, must look to her Alumni for the extra financial help that is necessary if she is to continue to grow and take the important place in roll of colleges that we all actually want for her.

When we set an annual membership dues of \$3.00, it was a calculated risk. We knew this token payment was not enough to pay our way, but we wanted to get a greater number interested and active. We did this. Our participating members has been the largest in the history of Rollins Alumni.

This year we are taking another calculated risk. We are seeking primarily a large number of contributing alumni. The number of Alumni who support the Annual Giving Plan is more vital than the actual amount each contributes. We believe that once you have felt the satisfaction of a thoughtful contribution to higher education through Rollins you will continue to maintain your place on the Rollins Alumni Team and through the teamwork of a great number we can accomplish great things.

I am going to be blunt again. The average tuition charges for colleges like Rollins covers only 68% of the cost to the college. The balance must be made up from gifts from Alumni,

foundations, industry and friends. Institutions like Harvard, Princeton, Dartmouth, Yale, could not continue under their present system if it were not for the annual gifts from their Alumni.

We as your officers and directors ask you to give the plan serious thought. I believe you will agree with me in this: We who have had the opportunity to attend Rollins College owe it to future Rollins students to see that they have the best there is to be had educationally, and keep Rollins a leader among the smaller colleges.

# Rollins College Can Become One of "Top Few"

## A Year In Retrospect And Years In Prospect

Just a year ago, as this is being written, I accepted the position as Dean of Rollins College. I did so because it appeared to me at that time that Rollins, already a fine College by every standard, had those attributes which could place it among the top few in the country. It had a forward looking administration bent on moving standards higher while maintaining the sound basic philosophy of small classes and vigorous student participation. It intended to remain reasonably small with emphasis on quality, not quantity. It had a devoted faculty and a sound student body. Financially, it had improved its position in recent years even though it still faced major problems in balancing the budget.

These things appealed to me so much at the time that I severed a happy connection of twenty-two years to become a part of the Rollins team. I must add in all honesty that had Rollins been situated in Alaska I might have hesitated longer, but this is purely secondary.

I have now gone through a "shake-down" year and it is time to ask myself, "is it all that I thought?" Inevitably one finds differences between the unexperienced and the experienced concept. Each institution has established traditions and patterns which differ from all others. I have had to try to learn what these are, to adapt myself to them, and to examine them in terms of both the experience of Rollins and my own experience. But this is minor and concerns my own adjustment to the College.

At the end of a year I find myself with the same fundamental enthusiasm for the future of Rollins, along with the personal satisfaction of now knowing that my earlier concept was substantially correct. I know now of weaknesses and of strengths which I did not know of before. Even during one year I have seen some of these weaknesses strengthen and **none** of the strengths weakened. I have seen the highly intelligent way in which the Faculty and the Administration can work together at mutual problems. I have seen the large core of our student body working most constructively at their own education, their problems of self-government, and their several college activities. I have noted what seems to me to be a major weakness in the virtual absence of all-college assemblies. I have seen a devoted group of Trustees working actively and regularly with the President and his advisers to lick some tough financial problems. I have seen a senior class "catch fire" as it reached its final days and flame into solidarity and

loyalty to the College as alumni.

Perhaps the one thing which distressed me most, soon after my arrival was the seeming apathy I sensed in many of the Rollins alumni. I had been accustomed to a situation in which alumni loyalty and support were vital to the very existence and growth of the institution. Here it seemed that a small but loyal few were attempting to do those many things which a great and loyal body should be doing. There seemed to be a gulf of stormy waters between the College and most of its family. Instead of a help to the College, the alumni activities were helping to drain what slender funds the College had.

Now the storm, whatever its origin, has blown itself out. There has developed a happy working relationship between the College and Rollins Alumni, Inc. There is a strong surge forward to bring all alumni into the family. The decision of the officers of the Corporation to establish and conduct a program of annual giving is the most heartening one I know of.

If Rollins is to be one of the top few colleges it can be so only with the very major help of its alumni. Today, every outstanding private college depends upon its alumni for living endowment. No college has sufficient capital endowment to carry it, but the interest

on amounts representing endowments of many millions of dollars comes to hundreds of colleges through the annual giving program of alumni organizations. These funds are vital in maintaining standards, raising faculty salaries, and meeting the perennial, but necessary, deficits of today.

No one, I am sure, expects Rollins alumni to contribute in the same generous measure at first as do the alumni of many other colleges which have had programs of annual giving for many years. This must be a gradual process of growth less concerned with large gifts than with regular, steady, giving year by year on the part of **all** who can give. Just as something is earmarked for the Red Cross, the Community Chest and other worthy causes, so Rollins alumni add the College to their annual list as their means and consciences permit.

Annual giving represents something more than turning over a few dollars to the College each year, something more than the major help it can be in balancing the budget. It can create a tone, a quality, a loyalty, an interest which is otherwise missing. It even tends to remove the irksome feeling that every time a communication comes from the College it is a plea for help. Once a year the College is **asking** its alumni to contribute to its living endowment. At all other times it is concerned with giving the alumni reports on the progress of the College and the doings of its graduates.

I know of no finer means for alumni to develop that loyalty and active interest in their Alma Mater, which can mean the difference between a good and a top College, than through annual giving. It is the kind of loyalty which carries over into selling Rollins to the best prospective students to be found, into the formation of local and regional groups coming together for something more than a mere social hour, into a common bond of pride in every step of progress the College takes.

I wish Rollins Alumni Inc. every success in this new venture launched in behalf of all of us who are concerned with seeing that Rollins takes its rightful place among the top few—and "all of us" includes every alumnus and former student of Rollins College.

### SENIOR BREAKFAST

Do you, any of you, know the history of the annual Alumni Breakfast for the graduating class, which is held each Commencement Day at the Old Family Tree, on Lake Virginia? This year when local Alumni followed the tradition of playing hosts to the seniors, the questions were raised as to when the custom was begun and under what circumstances. There was a variety of opinions and no one seemed to be able to come up with the actual facts. Alumni House is anxious to have some authentic information about this Rollins tradition and would appreciate any light you may be able to throw on the question.



# Annual Alumni Fund

In the future graduates and former students of Rollins College will be asked to join with the thousands of alumni of other colleges and universities in the U. S. and Canada who contribute to the growth and development of their Alma Mater, through the Annual Giving Plan. At their June meeting the officers and directors of Rollins Alumni Inc. decided to inaugurate a Rollins Alumni Fund among the more than 4500 Alumni who make up the membership of Rollins Alumni Inc. and to give up the annual dues system now in effect.

Solicitation will be by classes and class officers will be asked to help promote the plan among their own classmates.

This method of alumni support to higher education is almost universal with private, independent colleges, universities, and secondary schools. Alumni generally have come to realize that they, who are the recipients of the benefits of higher education owe to future generations the same privileges and opportunities for education that they enjoyed. Rollins, like all independent colleges, is suffering from the effects of inflation and taxes. The gap between income and expenses continues to exist. If colleges charged each student the actual cost of educating him, they would soon become schools for only the children of the rich. The American college alumnus, within a very few years, has stepped into this gap and through thoughtful, not token giving is materially aiding his college or university fulfill its obligation to American youth.

Last year alumni of independent, private co-educational colleges like Rollins gave \$7,846,269.00 to 150 Alumni Funds. The average individual gift was \$28.32.

It is no secret that without this Alumni support most of these institutions of higher learning would be operating either with a deficit or would be forced to curtail their activities dangerously.

Business and industry are more and more coming into the picture, and active financial support is being given to these independent colleges, for it is from them that business and industry must recruit officers, directors and future executives. However the first question asked of a college when it approaches a business, foundation or other organizations for financial aid is: "How much do your Alumni, the chief beneficiaries of your institution, contribute to your support and well being?" At the present time Rollins College could not give a too favorable reply.

Rollins College has long been fortunate in having friends who have

from time to time made important contributions to her welfare and growth. Among these are numbered a great many Alumni. Without them Rollins would not hold the place that she does in the educational scheme today. These Alumni and friends have come to her aid in difficult times and made it possible for her continued growth and development. These same men and women are still willing to help Rollins attain an even more important place in education. It is only fair that they should expect Rollins Alumni as a group to do the same.

It has been said that in the past the chief function of the Board of Trustees of a private college was to meet once a year to balance the budget. They asked the treasurer the amount of the deficit, divided it by the number of trustees and then and there made it up. That of course was before inflation and present day taxes. Today the American alumnus has come into the picture and with a larger number of smaller gifts is making it possible for private institutions to continue offering the kind of educational opportunities that keeps our nation strong and free.

The annual appeal to Rollins Alumni will be made through Alumni House. It will be planned, developed and carried out without the employment of outside or professional organizations. Every dollar realized from the effort will go directly to Rollins College. A full accounting will be made to the members of Rollins Alumni Inc., as to the use of funds. Rollins like all other colleges needs unrestricted funds to be used where most needed at the discretion of the Board of Trustees. Specific gifts are of course most welcome, but the greatest need at the present is unrestricted funds to meet contingencies that continually arise.

Present plans call for one and **only one** concerted effort among Rollins Alumni each year. This year the program will be begun in October and continue until the first of the year. All contributions will be made to the college through Alumni House, and will be deductible from your income tax return. Solicitation will be made by classes and all gifts to Rollins College from her Alumni will be credited to the class of the individual contributor. The program will be carried out entirely by Rollins Alumni Inc. through Rollins Alumni for Rollins College. The plan is primarily to raise funds for Rollins College. Each Alumnus is asked to contribute, not a token gift, but a thoughtful gift in accordance with his means. Equally vital to the success of this plan is the number of contributors. The larger the number of supporters we have the greater will be the benefit to Rollins, not only from the standpoint of actual dollars received but from the percentage of participating Alumni.

In many institutions the Alumni

Fund is thought of as "Seed Money", or money that attracts other contributions, since industry and business seriously consider this before making grants to colleges and universities.

In his annual report to the Alumni Irving Felder, last year's president, said: "With each forward step, on the part of Rollins College, your diploma and earned credits become more valuable to you." This simple statement is reason enough in itself to cause each graduate and former student of Rollins College to give serious consideration to his or her obligations to the future of Rollins College and the future students who will seek the same educational opportunities each Alumnus had.

Under the present administration your Alma Mater has made great strides. Her prestige and importance in the educational world has grown. Her prestige and importance will continue to grow if each Alumnus will help, according to his or her ability, fulfil this obligation to future generations who seek similar educational opportunities.

It has been said the only reason for the existence of an alumni organization is to join the alumni body together in a practical fashion for the furtherance of its Alma Mater. This your officers and directors are trying to do. When Rollins Alumni Inc. was formed the adoption of a set annual dues was made in an effort to induce a larger number of Alumni to become active and interested in Rollins. Since then approximately 2500 individual Alumni have been paid-up members. This gratifying response and indication of growing interest gives them reason to believe that every Rollins Alumnus will welcome this opportunity to be an active participant in the efforts to make Rollins College greater—to enable her not only to hold the place she now has but to help her attain even greater importance.

Your officers and directors, presenting this plan to you as Alumni, ask your serious and thoughtful consideration.

You have it in your power to make Rollins College the most important College of its kind in the World.

# Class of 1955 Joins Alumni

President Hugh F. McKean conferred Bachelors Degrees to 102 graduates of Rollins College when he presented the members of the class of 1955 with diplomas certifying the successful completion of their undergraduate work June 3, 1955 in Knowles Memorial Chapel. Significant is the fact that this is the first graduating class that is President McKean's very own. They were freshmen in 1951 when he was appointed president of Rollins.

Eighty-six received their Bachelor of Arts, eight their Bachelor of Science and eight their Bachelor of Music degrees.

The colorful procession formed before Carnegie Hall and marched to the Chapel where the faculty lined up on each side of the walk as an honor guard to the graduates who filed in between them.

Dean Theodore S. Darrah gave the invocation after which the choir, under the direction of Robert Hufstader, sang the anthem, Let All Mortal Flesh Keep Silence.

Senator George A. Smathers of Florida gave the Commencement Address. He told the graduates that they were leaving their undergraduate status at the most opportune time in the past 15 years. He urged them to preserve their freedom of spirit and mind and said that the battle of their lives, in the final analysis, would not be fought on some far battle field but rather in the deepest regions of their hearts and souls.

He recommended that they look for their future in Latin America where there are great opportunities. However, he warned them that the opportunities would not fall into their laps. They would have to work and work hard.

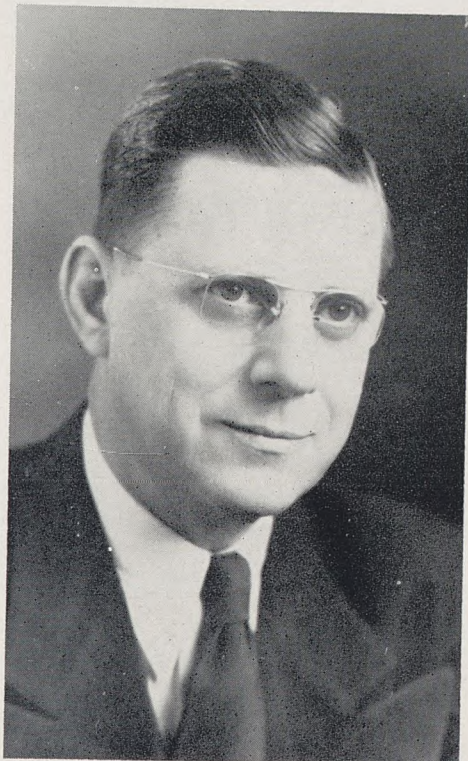
He ended his address with these words: "The opportunities are great, your preparation was good, the time is right, the rest is up to you."

President McKean, showed his pride in this his first very own class, when he presented them with their diplomas. He left the rostrum on two occasions to present diplomas to Stavros A. Demopoulos and James A. Graaskamp, both in wheel chairs and who both received the General Reeve Award for maintaining high academic standing during their last three years at Rollins.

For the first time in the history of Rollins one student received three major awards for seniors. This is Carol Farquharson of Memphis, Tenn. She was awarded the Algernon Sydney Medallion for high qualities of character, the Libra Cup for outstanding campus leadership, and one of the five \$100 General Reeve awards for academic standing.

Daniel P. Matthews of Canton, N. C., also received the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallion. Others receiving the General Reeve Awards were Christine Chardon of Winter Park and Jane Laverty, Frankfort, Indiana.

## Class Of 1930 Votes For RAF

The class of 1930, at its twenty-fifth reunion last February voted to support the Annual Alumni Fund for Rollins College, named a class representative and already have started their class fund for the first year. Stella Tuttle was named class agent and she is preparing to contact all the members of her class when the first annual drive gets underway.

When Bill MacGuire presented the, proposed plan for an annual fund to them, he did so mainly to get their reactions to the idea. The plan still was in the formative stage. Their response was immediate. They were actively in favor of the plan. So much so that numerous contributions were made before the members left Winter Park.

With these two classes, 1930 and 1955, already actively contributing to the fund it is felt that the other classes will be equally in favor of the Annual Alumni Fund for Rollins.

To date the 1930 class funds is \$190.00.

## \$6,700 In Grants

Two grants totaling \$6,700 to Rollins College have been announced by President McKean. One for \$5,700, a Frederick Gardner Cottrell grant the other \$1,000 grant from the U. S. Steel Foundation Inc.

The Cottrell grant is to help support the experimental studies of Isotop shift in the spectra of elements of intermediate atomic number, and is under the direction of Dr. John S. Ross, assistant professor of physics at Rollins. In awarding the grant Charles H. Schauer director of the Research Corporation said: "This is a well conceived program which has real promise of providing the groundwork for a much needed theoretical understanding of the properties of the nuclides."

The \$1,000 U. S. Steel grant will be used to send faculty members to meetings of learned societies, to contribute to the enrichment of teaching at Rollins. A \$25,000 loan fund for Rollins was established in 1926 by Judge E. H. Gray, then U. S. Steel Corporation president.

## '55 Graduates Give To Fund

The entire class of 1955, 102 in all, voted to support the Annual Alumni Fund for Rollins College and on Commencement day presented a check for \$573.15 to President Hugh McKean as the first annual contribution from the class. This was an average gift of \$5.60 from these newest members of Rollins Alumni Inc.

This year at the dinner, given annually by Alumni in the Central Florida area, Bill MacGuire, president of Rollins Alumni Inc., spoke briefly to the members of the class and outlined the plans for the establishment of the Annual Giving Plan for Rollins by her alumni. He pointed out that they, as the first class to graduate under the plan, had an opportunity to set an example for the other classes in this endeavor on the part of Rollins Alumni to be of real and concrete service to their Alma Mater. The 100 percent participation by the members of the class resulted.

It has been said that it takes about five years for a graduate to become a good alumnus. (This is a general statement by alumni workers). If this statement is true then the class of 1955 will by 1960 be a real force in the future of Rollins College.

Their whole-hearted endorsement of the plan and their full participation is a most heartening indication that the Annual Giving Plan as it is being worked out, will be the success that the officers and directors of Rollins Alumni Inc. hope for and are working for.

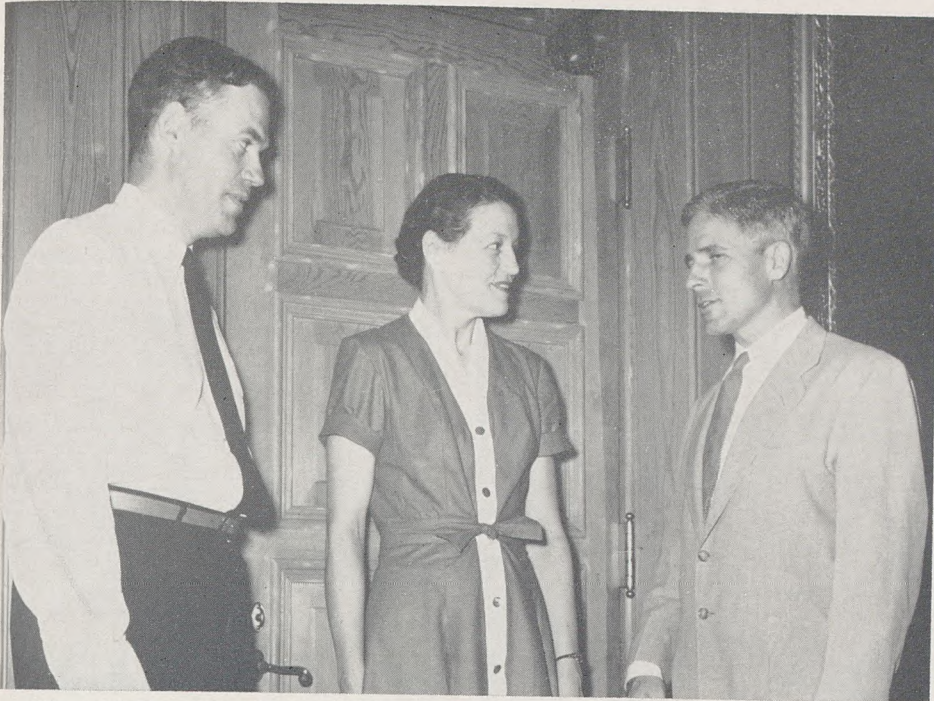
They should serve as an inspiration to us who have benefited from the college they helped so greatly to build.
