## 1955 Officers Named

William G. MacGuire, '47, assistant cashier of the First National Bank of Orlando, was elected president of Rollins Alumni, Inc., at the first meeting of the board of directors, following the annual meeting, when the result of the election of directors and Alumni member of the Board of Trustees of Rollins College was announced.

Dr. Florence Stone '19, associate professor in the College of Medicine, State University of New York and a recognized authority of Microbiology and Immunology, who was nominated by the Alumni, was appointed the third Alumni member of the Board of Trustees.

New members of the board of directors of Rollins Alumni, Inc., who will serve for a three year term are: Charles E. Arnold '41, Orlando; William J. Brant '40, Winter Park; R. A. Robertson '34, Orlando; John Fluno '37, Winter Park, and James R. Sewell '44, Winter Park.

Three new members, appointed by the Board of Directors to fill vacancies from resignations, are: Frances (Daniel) Divine '39, Alice Egan '52, and Eleanor (Sheetz) Carter '35. They replace Shirley (Bowstead) Evans '43, Frank L. Williamson '48 and Joseph D. Johnson '40, who resigned because of pressing personal interests.

Gwen (Bartholomew) Patterson has been named first vice-president; John A. Fluno, second vice-president; Bob Stonerock was reelected treasurer and James R. Sewell secretary.

Retiring directors are: Irving M. Felder '40, Sands Showalter '38, Bernard Bralove '34, Raymond O. Holton '49, and H. Gordon Robins '31.

The two other Alumni representatives on the College Board are George M. Waddell '38 and Howard Showalter, Jr., '36.

Dr. Nelson Marshall '37, whose time as Alumni member of the Board of Trustees expired, was reelected by the Trustees for a three year term. Other Alumni who are board members are: H. George Carrison '33, Olcott H. Deming '35, Thomas P. Johnson '34, Mrs. Osburn C. Wilson (Rebecca Coleman) '34.

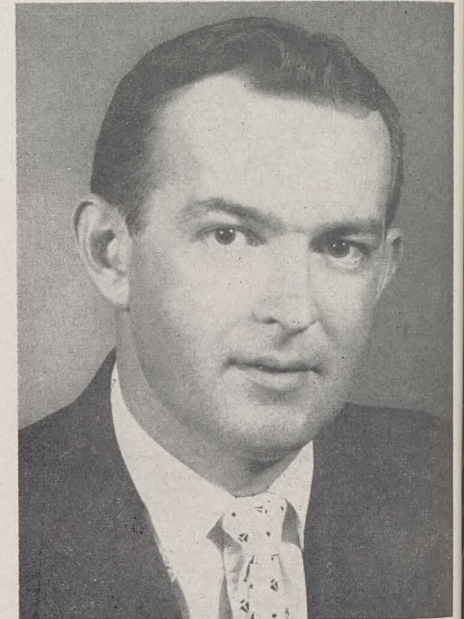
## PRESIDENTS MESSAGE

This year I was given, what I think, a most important job, the presidency of Rollins Alumni, Inc. It is important because I believe that this year will mark the turning point in the active interest of YOU graduates and former students of Rollins College in the affairs of our Alma Mater.

No college can remain static today. It must progress and keep abreast in educational progress or it will recede into relative unimportance merely by standing still. We as Alumni cannot sit idly by and either refuse or fail to do our part in making Rollins Col-

lege greater each year. We must fulfill the obligation we owe for our opportunity to benefit from a college education. You and I, along with the millions of other college and university alumni are the beneficiaries of a college education. The cost of participating membership is low. If the number is great, then we have made a step forward and Rollins College will have made another step forward.

Let's make Rollins College greater.



# Report To The Alumni

The annual report of the president of Rollins Alumni, Inc., presented at the Annual Meeting on the Campus, February 26, 1955, by Irving M. Felder is reproduced in full below.

The year 1954, in so far as Rollins Alumni, Inc., is concerned, could well go down in our records as the year of uncertainty. It was one of frustration and progress, set-backs and victories, disillusionment and great satisfaction. To say the least it has been an interesting year for those of us who have given our time and efforts as your directors and officers. The final analysis will show that the brighter side of the picture far overshadows the darker side.

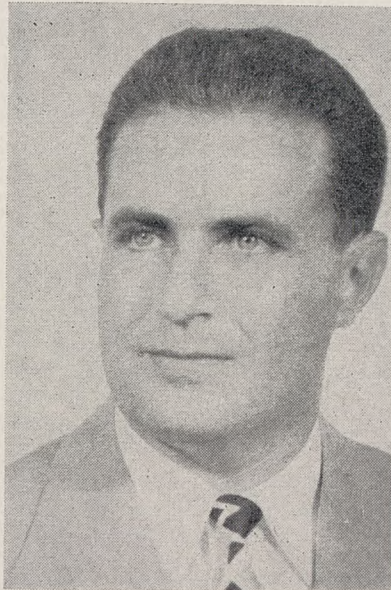
As all of you know our Corporation was confronted with an unexpected set-back, when the legality of this form of organization was questioned at the last annual meeting. This of course came as a surprise and shock to those of us who had worked long and hard to make this a reality, believing, as we still do, that it was for the best interests of the Alumni body and Rollins College. With this shadow of uncertainty constantly over us we nevertheless carried on as best we could under the circumstances. The results can speak for themselves. Rollins College and Rollins Alumni have been through the fire on other occasions and each time both have come through stronger than before.

I give you the debit side of the ledger first. It can be put very briefly. During the entire year we have labored under this dark cloud of uncertainty. Much time, energy and money were expended in clearing this away. Many of our plans and hopes were held static while the question of our corporate form of organization could be settled. It has been settled! Each of you received, or should have, if your address has been kept current in our files, a copy of the report of the committee which was named to make a survey, evaluate the corporate form of organization and report to the Alumni body at large. This was done and the resulting vote in favor of the corporation has finally given us the go-ahead signal. It now remains for all of us, not only your elected officers, but every Alumnus, to look to the future and to work as a strong and unified group for the best interest of Rollins College. No individual or small group can do it. The success we strive for can only come from the efforts and interest of a great majority of Rollins Alumni.

The year was far from a total loss. We gained in interest, in participation and a new awareness of our Alma Mater and her problems.

The credit side of the ledger is far from what we would like to report. Still it shows a definite trend toward

an increasing number of interested, active and participating Alumni. These were interested enough to become active, paid-up members of the Corporation even while its fate was in doubt. Life memberships still came in until today there are 70 members who have paid or are paying for this form of membership. We think this is a good healthy sign of growing interest in our Alma Mater and her organized Alumni. Increasing interest has been evident in every letter from our members. To be sure they all did not contain bouquets, but any criticism was constructive and still further convinced us that interest has been reawakened and that our members are becoming more aware of the importance of their place in the affairs of Rollins College. All along this aware-

ness has been with those of us who are here and close to Rollins College. Now it is spreading out in ever widening circles and becoming apparent among those Alumni who are scattered all over the United States and in the distant parts of the world.

I would like to repeat that our condition is a healthy one.

Here are some figures that appeared in the December issue of the RECORD. They, too, will bear repeating here.

We have 4571 Alumni with correct addresses on our mailing lists.

1133 of these were paid-up members for 1954. This is 24.7 percent of this total.

1401 paid dues in 1953 and 1954. This is an active participation of 31.8 percent.

2037 paid-up memberships have been received during the two years of our charter form of organization.

There was an increase of 225 paid up members in 1954 over 1953.

There were 495 NEW members in 1954.

This last figure is significant. More than 10 percent of our current list of Alumni were added to the list of active members during our year of uncertainty.

These percentages, while they exceed the national average (Approximately 23 percent) of participating members in the hundreds of other alumni groups, still is not large enough for us. We can and must increase this as time goes on. Already this year we have a paid-up membership of 511 as of this morning. This number of Rollins Alumni have become active this year without solicitation other than a statement that dues are due for 1955.

We have instituted an employment and placement bureau which we anticipate shall become an asset to our Alumni organization and will promote close harmony between Alumni employers and Rollins graduates and former students. Future issues of the RECORD will carry a classified section setting forth those Alumni desiring employees from our Alumni group as well as those Alumni seeking employment.

We have organized a very active committee on undergraduate activities. This committee was headed last year by Sandy Showalter, ably assisted by Dave McCreery. Great strides have been made during the past year in contacting the undergraduates to acquaint them with the Alumni organization and Alumni personally and to assist them in areas wherein Alumni as a body or individually can be of assistance to them.

You all have recognized the change in the format of the Alumni Record and we hope that it meets with your approval. Any comment we have heard has been encouragingly favorable. Our publications committee, which was headed by Gwen Patterson, should be congratulated.

The membership committee, headed by Rebecca Wilson, has done outstanding work. During the time when the corporation was without a paid director and editor, this committee mailed out appeals for membership and the response resulted in the largest paid up membership yet to be recorded.

Bill MacGuire, our vice-president who heads our finance committee and myself have met with members of the Administration of the College on numerous occasions to further the coordination of efforts of the Alumni and the College official toward a greater Rollins College.

While there is much remaining to be done to bring our overall efficiency up to our set goal, we have one spot wherein we are nearly perfect. That is in our financial records department.



# 1954 Progress Told

Our treasurer, Bob Stonerock, has done an outstanding job and I cannot pay him too high a tribute. You can rest assured that any contributions, endowments or gifts you may care to make or establish will be ably administered, for we don't plan to lose Bob in this capacity.

In June of the past year we employed a full time director of Alumni work, Ray Kirk. While he is not an alumnus of Rollins he has had previous experience in Alumni work as well as in publication, advertising and promotion fields. He has edited the Alumni Record, evaluated the work to be done to bring our records up-to-date and already has begun the modernization of our filing system. You can do much to aid in this important work by keeping him informed of your activities, achievements and above all your correct addresses. He will more than welcome any suggestions, information and advice you may care to offer.

We have under advisement plans for an annual homecoming event each Spring, during Baseball Week on the Campus. Many of our members as well as a number of undergraduates have voiced their approval and interest in such an event. There has been no formal homecoming for Alumni and friends for a number of years. You will hear more about this later.

Now let us look to the future. I would like to emphasize the statement I made in my general letter to all Rollins Alumni, December 10, of last year. "The only objective of an alumni organization is to join the Alumni body together in a practical fashion for the furtherance of the interests of its Alma Mater." This of course should be the basis upon which all our endeavors as an organized group of alumni are built.

Our broad goal should be an overall —comprehensive—long range plan whereby we Alumni of Rollins College can best help Rollins.

Of prime importance is an alumni group that is better informed as to the aims and needs of Rollins College and her plans and hopes.

Rollins Alumni should be actively concerned in the selection of the type of students that will best fit in the Rollins Plan. Students who will be a credit to Rollins College and who will become Alumni we will be happy to welcome into our ranks.

We must become self supporting and carry our own weight. This is one of the first and most important things we must do.

We must re-activate and form Rollins Alumni Clubs in the centers of large Alumni concentration. A uniform plan for this is in the making.

We must improve our public relations set up. Each member of Rollins

One more thought I would like to leave with you. Rollins Alumni and Rollins College are bound together by family ties that can never be broken. No matter what we may think, we can never divorce ourselves from Rollins College nor can Rollins College divorce herself from us. Each reflects upon the other both favorably and un-

favorably. Each Alumnus owes it to himself or herself to keep this balance very much on the credit side of the ledger.

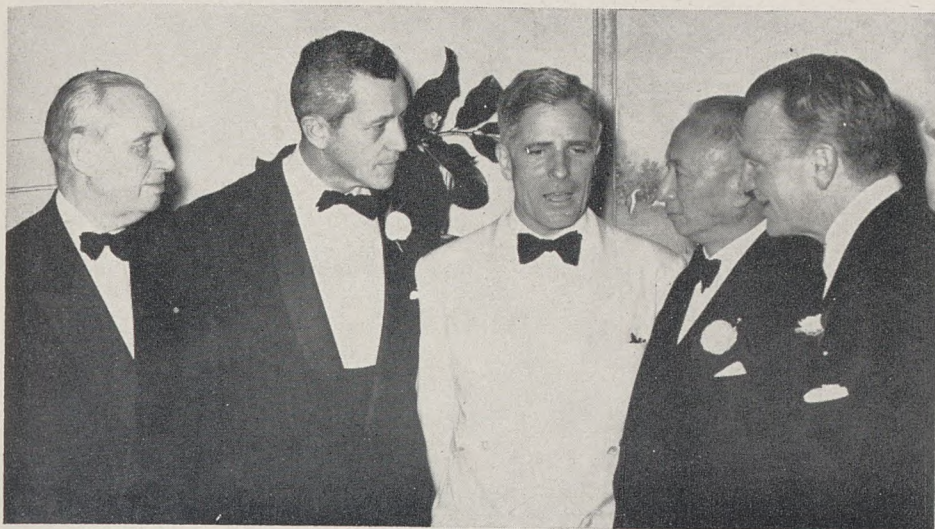

# Founders Week Colorful Event

Rollins concluded one of its most successful Founders' Week celebrations with the awarding of four honorary degrees at the Mid-Winter Convocation in Knowles Memorial Chapel, Monday February 28, 1955. The convocation climaxed a full week of activities commemorating the 70th anniversary of the founding of Rollins College.

Receiving degrees were Florida's Governor LeRoy Collins and Dr. F. S. C. Northrop, Yale University philosopher, Doctor of Law; James Cagney, movie actor, Doctor of Humanities; Dr. Howard F. Lowry, president of College of Wooster, Doctor of Humane Letters. The Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallion, awarded on the basis of high qualities of character, went to Maud Neff Whitman, Orlando civic leader, who is an alumna and member of the class of 1896.

Dr. Northrop and Dr. Sidney J. French, dean of Rollins College, each gave addresses during the Convocation. Dr. Northrop declared only a foreign policy based on respect for the cultures of other nations, supported by a community police force, will keep peace in the world. Dean French urged that a broader role in modern civilization be played by the small liberal arts college.

"The college must continue to serve the learned professions, prepare for the technical fields, and provide the ivory tower for potential scholars. These things we must never sacrifice," Dean French said.

The annual Founders' Dinner was held Saturday night, February 26, at the Orlando Country Club, the 200 present contributing more than \$20,000 to the \$50 a plate dinner. During the dinner J. Roy Dickie, member of the

Board of Trustees, announced that Mrs. Hgh McKean had given \$25,000 to the funds of the college. Dr. V. K. Wellington Koo, Chinese Ambassador to the U. S., was awarded the Rollins Decoration of Honor. He received the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities from Rollins in 1947. In commenting on the subscriptions to the Founders' Dinner, President Hugh McKean called it "a tremendous vote of confidence in the College. I wish to express my great gratitude."

On Sunday afternoon more than 2100 persons attended the 28th edition of the Animated Magazine. Featured speakers were Governor Collins, Dr. V. K. Wellington Koo, James Cagney, Eddie Dowling, Broadway producer; Edgar Kaufmann, Jr., Director of Good Design, Museum of Modern Art; William F. Rolleston, vice-president of Marineland Studies, and Dr. Evelyn Newman, writer, lecturer and publicist.

The annual Alumni Day drew a large number of Alumni back to the Campus, many for the first time since graduation, and from great distances. Features of Alumni Day were the annual luncheon and business meeting and the Gay '90's tea and reception.

## EMPLOYMENT

The Rollins Placement Bureau will welcome listings of job openings from Alumni who are employers, according to Dr. W. D. Robbins and Dr. Melvin L. Greenhut, co-directors. More than 20 nationally known firms already have interviewed Rollins students this year, they say. The campus bureau has a complete file of available men and women students and Alumni seeking employment.

## Historical Data

An appeal is being made to all Alumni of Rollins College for historical data, letters, old catalogues, photographs, programs, Tomokans, Sandspurs and all similar information published or issued concerning Rollins College, during the first 40 years of Rollins history, 1885 to 1925. There is a deplorable lack of such information and a determined effort is being made to locate and assemble as much as possible.

As a means of preserving such historical information that has been saved and located, the Board of Trustees has set up the Department of Archives and Historical Records. Dr. Frederick L. Lewton '90, retired from long and distinguished service on the staff of the Smithsonian Institute, has been named archivist and a depository has been set up in the Mills Memorial Library.

Plans of the Diamond Jubilee Commission are being seriously handicapped by the lack of early records and information. The commission is preparing to publish a series of sketches of presidents, officials, professors, events and movements, aimed at unfolding the achievements of the past. The first such publication is to be a biographical sketch of Dr. Edward Payson Hooker, the Founding President. Letters by him and information about him are greatly needed.

# Annual Meeting Held On Campus

The annual Alumni Day luncheon and business meeting of Rollins Alumni, Inc., was held Saturday, February 26, in the Student Center on the Campus. There were 136 present at the meeting which began at 12:00 noon. Retiring president Irving M. Felder presided at the business meeting and made the annual report of the progress of Rollins Alumni, Inc., for the year 1954. Robert F. Stonerock, treasurer, presented the financial statement of the corporation. Both the president's and treasurer's reports will be found in full in other columns of this issue of the RECORD.

President Hugh McKean '30, made an informal report on the condition of Rollins College and the progress that had been made during the year. He pointed out that the academic standing of Rollins was gradually rising. He spoke briefly of the problems confronting the College and the plans and aspirations for the future. Expansion and increased enrollment is essential, he said. He also stressed the important part that the Alumni, as an organization and individually can and must take in the future of Rollins. At the close of his remarks he was given a rising vote of appreciation for his outstanding work for Rollins College.

Sarah (Harbottle '34) Howden, was general chairman for the day and acted as master of ceremonies at the luncheon. She was assisted by Betty (Wheatley '30) Johnson, luncheon chairman and Fanny (Robinson '10) Cheney and Lillian (Wilmott '06) Fishback, who were co-chairmen for the tea and reception.

Motion was made by Thomas W. Phillips '40 that the minutes of the 1954 meeting be accepted and the motion was seconded and carried. George Garrison '33 moved that the treasurer's report be accepted. It was seconded by Olcott Deming and carried.

Robert F. Stonerock, who heads the committee revising the by-laws, took the floor and explained the by-law situation and touched on the contemplated changes to be included in the revision. He explained the situation in regard to tax exemptions and moved that the by-laws as presented and tabled at the 1954 meeting be adopted, subject to revision. This motion was seconded by Rebecca Coleman Wilson '34 and carried.

Nelson Marshall '37 asked for a report on the action of the Alumni-Trustee-Administration committee set up in accordance with recommendations of the evaluation committee. Wm. G. MacGuire '47, who was chairman of the committee, reported on the meeting of this committee and presented the various changes in the charter that had been recommended. (See story in this issue of the RECORD). At the

conclusion of his report he moved that the suggested changes be adopted by the meeting. George Garrison '33 seconded the motion and it was carried, without a dissenting vote. The question arose as to whether the wording of the charter should specifically include the former Rollins Academy. Nelson Marshall recommended that the charter be left as it is, and that power be extended to the charter committee to include the former academy in the wording if it seemed necessary. (Note: Graduates and former students of the Academy are now and always have been considered Alumni and eligible to all rights and privileges of the Corporation.)

Katharine Lewis Lehman '27, chairman of the teller committee, announced the five Alumni who had been elected to serve on the Board of Directors and the one Alumnus elected Alumni Representative on the Board of Trustees.

Sandy Showalter '38 reported that an offer of property in North Carolina last year by Mrs. Belle Abbott Roxby '94 (now deceased) and her daughter, Evelyn Haynes '22, which from necessity was refused at the time, had been renewed by Miss Haynes. The matter was referred to the Board of Directors for consideration.

George Garrison announced that Dr.

Nelson Marshall, whose term as Alumni representative on the Board of Trustees had expired, had been re-named by the board to serve for the coming three years. # Charter Changes Voted

As a result of the returns from the poll of Alumni of Rollins College, in which the majority favored the corporate form of organization and the revision of certain features of the charter, a committee was named to study the charter and by-laws and to make amendments to, or rewrite the charter. This committee was composed of Wm. MacGuire and Tom Lawton for the Alumni; Dean Sidney French and John Tiedtke for the Administration and Roy Dickie and Olcott Deming for the Trustees. A meeting was called in the office of Dean French on February 16, 1955 and the following amendments to the charter and clarification in the by-laws were recommended.

## Article II, Section (a)

To read: "To further and promote by all proper and legitimate agencies and means the banding together of those persons who attended Rollins College and qualify as Alumni of Rollins College for the furtherance of the interests of their *Ama Mater*."

## Article II, Section (d)

To read: "To sponsor and assist in the organization of endowment funds for scholarships at Rollins College in all academic endeavors and related areas."

## Article II, Section (e)

To eliminate this section in its entirety and to substitute the following: "To help support Rollins College by raising monies for the general needs of the College."

## Article III, Section 2

To eliminate the following: "Is in sound mind, is in good standing in the city of his residence, is not a member of any publicly recognized subversive group, activity or organization."

The Committee suggested the following clarification in the by-laws.

## Article VI, Section 6

To re-word that portion of this section which reads: "A percentage of all Alumni dues, donations and bequests shall be paid into this fund unless otherwise specified by the donor. The percentage to be paid may be adjusted from time to time at the discretion of the Board of Directors but in no case shall such percentage be less than ten percent of dues and donations."

The Committee recommended that this be further clarified so that the

donor or payer would clearly understand that he had a choice, but that unless he so specified this percentage would be deducted and paid into the Rollins Alumni Endowment Trust.

The proposed amendments to the Charter were submitted to the annual meeting of Alumni in February and were accepted without a dissenting vote. The by-laws which were tabled at the 1954 meeting were resubmitted and also adopted subject to revision. It was announced that the by-laws were in the process of being revised and that when this work is completed they will be submitted again to the membership either by mail or in a copy of the RECORD.

## RILEY JONES BACK

Edward F. "Riley" Jones, emeritus professor of mathematics, has been elected a consultant to Rollins College by the Board of Trustees. He retired from active teaching last year after teaching for 32 years at Rollins. He was back at his old stand last month when he helped organize the Fiesta Parade.

## Charter Student Jacob Gazan Dies



**Jacob Gazan**, a charter student at Rollins, 1885-1888, and prominent attorney in Georgia, died in Atlanta, March 26, 1955, after a lengthy illness. Funeral services were held March 28, in Savannah, where he had long been a leading member of the legal profession.

Mr. Gazan entered Rollins November 4, 1885, the day the college opened its doors for the first time. Upon leaving Rollins, he entered the law office of Garrard and Meldrin in Savannah where he studied law and was admitted to the bar in 1890. He continued the practice of his profession in Savannah continuously until his retirement a few years ago. On the occasion of his fiftieth anniversary as a member of the Savannah Bar Association he was honored by his fellow members and presented with a handsome silver tray. He was awarded the Rollins Decoration of Honor June 7, 1940.

He was active in all civic and charitable enterprises in his home city, and one of Rollins College's most distinguished alumni.

He became a life member of Rollins Alumni, Inc., in 1953 and was a generous contributor to the alumni organization and to the College all during his lifetime. From the time of Rollins Semi-Centennial in 1935, he had not missed an annual meeting of the Rollins Alumni until he became ill two years ago.

## Scoreboard

With the annual Baseball Week headlining the sports picture for Rollins athletic teams the showing of the Tars so far has been better than average. They took four of their six games during the spring meet at Rollins. To date they are still ahead in all fields. Crew five wins out of six starts; Tennis four in six; Golf three in five. The first sixteen games of the season were reported in the last issue of the RECORD. The Tars took ten and lost six games.

## College Must Increase Size

Rollins College eventually will increase its size to 800 students to help meet the demands of educating the vast number of young people who are expected to enter colleges within the next 15 years.

Under the administration of the late Dr. Hamilton Holt, the college was built and organized to handle 500 students.

In making the announcement, Hugh F. McKean, president, emphasized that Rollins would maintain the quality of its teachers and students and retain its small classes, despite the larger enrollment.

"We won't sacrifice academic or admission standards," he said.

"The student-teacher ratio, now 1-9, will remain about the same."

McKean anticipated no great immediate increase in students. It will be a number of years before the new limit is reached.

Announcement of the higher enrollment limit, which has been approved by the Board of Trustees, was made at this time so campus planners will know how many more dormitories and classroom buildings will be needed eventually.

Drawing up plans for the future Rollins are Cram and Ferguson, Boston architects, who designed the campuses of Princeton, Sweetbriar and Boston University.

"In making plans to educate more students, we hope to help in a small way to take care of the many students who will attend college in the next 15 years," McKean said.

According to a survey by The Council for the Study of Higher Education in Florida, enrollment in Florida colleges is expected to go up by 300% by 1970.

## Fiesta

Members of the Central Florida Alumni Club were instrumental in enabling Rollins students to give a non-subscription dance marking the close of 1955 Fiesta and Baseball Week on the Campus. The dance, held at the Mt. Plymouth Hotel, near Apopka, featured Johnny Long and his orchestra. A part of the program was broadcast over a CBS national hookup. The latest figures from those in charge of the Fiesta show a return of \$886.52 for the Fiesta Scholarship fund. This came mainly from the operation of booths at the mid-way and from the Rollins Woman's Association Card Party and Bake Sale.



# Financial Statement

The following statements reflect the financial results of the operations of Rollins Alumni, Inc., for 1954 and its financial condition at December 31, 1954. In addition, at the request of the Board of Directors, I have included figures to show the operations from January 1, 1955 to February 24, 1955, and the financial condition at February 24, 1955.

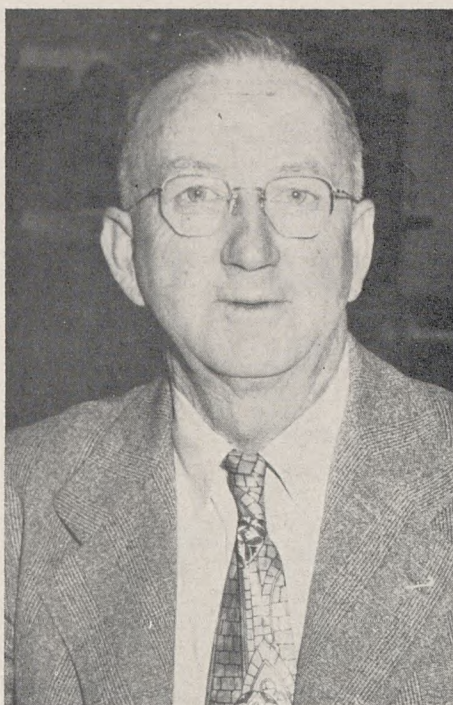

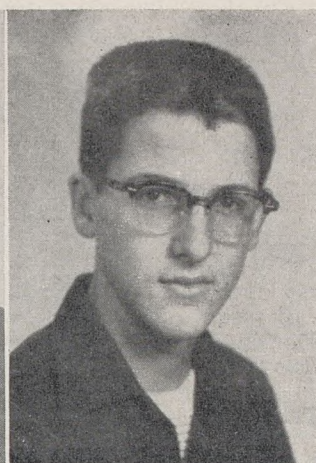

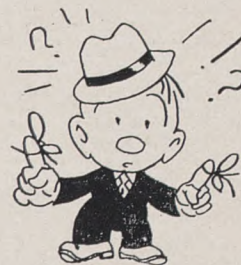
