Rollins Tars Make Baseball History

The Tars climaxed their most successful baseball season in the history of the college when they battled their way to the finals of the NCAA tournament at Omaha, Nebraska, finally losing to Missouri 4-1.

The amazing Tars won their right to play in the college "world series" when they easily disposed of Virginia Tech 3-0 and 9-3 in the third regional playoff, after putting together a 20-6 record for the regular season.

To say that Central Florida went baseball mad during the Omaha playoffs is strictly an understatement. The tension started immediately after Rollins defeated Oklahoma A & M 9-5 in the first playoff game and mounted as the Tars disposed of Missouri 4-1 in the second round and Michigan State 5-4.

Coach Joe Justice's men lost their first game to Michigan State 3-2 in the fourth round and then to Missouri in the final.

After the first game Orlando Radio Station WHOO carried direct broadcasts from the Omaha ball park. So completely did the Tars catch the fancy of local fans that people who had never seen the team play listened late into the night to get final results.

Don Tauscher, junior right hander won two games for the Tars and lost one. His victories were over Oklahoma in relief and Michigan State. His loss came from Michigan, in relief.

Lefty Art Brophy hurled the other victory, 4-1 over Missouri. Southpaw Bill Cary was the loser in the last game with Missouri.

The series was marked by tight pitching and defense. The infield of Bob MacHardy at first, Fred Talbot at second and Nick Vancho, shortstop and Del Helms third base miscued only four times in five games. MacHardy was the hitting star of the series.

To cap it all Centerfielder Connie Mack Butler was selected to the second All--America college team and Cary to the third team. These selections were not made from teams in the tournament but from the entire country. Both Butler and Cary also were selected to the All Southern team.

Virginia Tech, Rollins' victim in the regional playoffs proved easier than expected. Cary completely baffled the Virginians in the first game, 3-0 while

Brophy coasted on an early lead to a 9-3 victory.

Butler contributed to the scoring with two home runs and MacHardy with one.

The Tars indicated at the beginning of the season that they must be reckoned with. During the "week of baseball" at which Rollins was host, the Tars compiled the best record, 6-3, of the six teams competing. Cary blanked North Carolina 1-0 in the opener. Rollins then bowed to N. C., 0-3, beat Ohio State 5-1, lost to Amherst 5-8, bested Georgia Tech 6-5 and 6-5, lost to Ohio State 1-2, blanked Clemson behind Bob Leader and cinched the "week" by shading Ohio State 6-4.

It looks like another successful year in 1955 with most of this year's team returning.

Leader, who was signed by the Chicago Cubs, Henry Menendez, pitcher, Bud Fisher utility infielder-catcher and Helms were graduated in June. They are the only losses.

To sum up, the Tars won the State and Southern championships and were runners up for the national title.

While baseball overshadowed other Spring sports, the Tars did well all along the line.

Coach Jim McDougall's tennis team had it's usual good season, winning 10 matches and losing three, two to its old nemesis, University of Miami.

Coach U. T. Bradley's crew finished second in the Dad Vail Regatta again and won the state championship. Over the season the Tars out-rowed 15 crews and lost to five.

Coach Dan Nyimicz' golf team compiled a 3-5 record. Encouraging news for next year is the fact Frank Boyston, Florida high school champion and one of the best young golfers in the South has enrolled in this fall's freshman class.

Graduation Adds 108 To Alumni Rolls

One hundred and eight members of the class of 1954, officially became members of Rollins Alumni, Inc., Friday June 4, 1954, when degrees were conferred by President Hugh Ferguson McKean in beautiful Knowles Memorial Chapel. Ninety-eight received their Bachelor of Arts, seven, Bachelor of Science and three Bachelor of Music.

Senator Ralph E. Flanders (R-Vt) delivered the commencement address before the members of the class of 1954 and a crowded chapel. He urged the graduating seniors to examine the various patterns of thought including the "practical and ethical content" of American capitalism, but not to let the pattern selected become too rigid; and to hold to the moral law recognizing its significance and usefulness.

During the ceremonies President Hugh Ferguson McKean conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities upon Senator Flanders.

Honors conferred included the Algernon Sidney Sullivan Medallion for high quality of character to Faith Rockefeller Emeny, Princeton, N. J.; and the Rollins Decoration of Honor

for outstanding service to Mrs. Leone W. Hallenberg, housemother, and to Harold A. Broda, Jr., Canton, Ohio, president of the student body.

Gen. Reeve Awards for scholarship of \$100 each were awarded to Ethel Ilene Deikman, Pueblo, Colo.; William Thomas House, Orlando, Fla.; John Richard Joy, Taunton, Mass.; Sidney Katz, Bronx, N. Y.; and John Phillips, Brownsville, Tenn.

Commencement Day activities were officially opened at 6 o'clock Friday morning when the members of Rollins Alumni Inc. were hosts to the graduating class at the traditional breakfast at the "Family Tree" on Lake Virginia. No official count was made but the largest number of soon-to-be Alumni were present at this annual affair since its beginning far back in the past. Irving Felder president of Rollins Alumni Inc., presided and President McKean and Ray Kirk spoke briefly. Retiring faculty members were recognized.

The initial affair of the season was the annual dinner for the class of 1954 given on May 18 at the University Club in Winter Park by the members of the Central Florida Alumni Club.

'54 Class Gift Honors Plumer

The Colonel Richard C. Plumer Memorial Award will be the formal title of the class Gift of the Rollins College graduating class of 1954, according to an announcement made June 29, by Jerome Edward O'Brien, chairman of the gift committee for this newest class of Alumni.

Class funds amounting to \$800.46 have been turned over to the treasurer of the College and the income from these funds will be used to make an annual award to the "student of Business Law who has shown himself or herself to be the most outstanding in the qualities Colonel Plumer represented in the eyes of those who knew and loved him: Scholarship, service to his fellow men, integrity of mind and humbleness of soul, rendered in a spirit of kindness and dignity.

The award each year will be in the form of a gift that will be both functional and utilitarian, one that may grace the desk of the recipient in good taste and usefulness. A plaque is to be

affixed to the gift to read as follows:

The judging committee will be composed of three persons: the faculty member teaching Business Law, the chairman of the Business and Economics Department and the secretary and advisor of Alpha Iota Circle of Omnicron Delta Kappa. Selection of candidates will be from the top three per cent of the class academically. The award will be made at Commencement if the recipient is a graduating senior, if the recipient is not a senior the award will be made on Honors Day. If the course of Business Law should not be offered at any time, the recipient will be selected from all those students who have majored in Business Administration.

Plaque Unveiled

A plaque commemorating the beginning of Rollins College 69 years ago was unveiled at the Florida State Bank Building in Sanford, April 28 of this year. The ceremony was attended by Rollins and Sanford officials.

Dr. Frederick L. Lewton, '90, gave a short dedicatory address. Other speakers were Dr. Fred P. Ensminger, '97, who spoke on the founding of the college; Dr. A. J. Hanna, on the "Development of Rollins College" and President Hugh F. McKean on "Rollins Today."

The plaque is a permanent fixture to the side of the Florida State Bank, which was known on April 28, 1885 as the Lyman State Bank. It was on the second floor of the Lyman bank that leaders of the Congregational Church gathered on that date to found Florida's first college. Mount Dora, Daytona Beach and Orange City lost out to Winter Park as the site for the school.

Prominent Educator Is Named Dean

Appointment of Dr. Sidney J. French, dean of the faculty of Colgate University, as dean of Rollins College has been announced by President Hugh F. McKean.

He is well known nationally for his work and writings in the field of general education.

Dr. French succeeds Dr. Edwin R. Walker, who left Rollins June 10 to become president of Queens College, Charlotte, N. C.

Dr. French, whose appointment becomes effective Sept. 1, joined the faculty of Colgate in 1932, was appointed professor of chemistry in 1938, and dean of faculty in 1945. He also is serving as director of the division of science at Colgate.

Recognized as one of the nation's leading educators, the new dean of Rollins College was instrumental in setting up Colgate's plan of general education. Known as the core system, it requires a student to take a "core" of required subjects during his four years of undergraduate work.

In 1950-51 Dr. French was drafted by the U. S. government to serve as consultant on Japanese higher education.

Dr. French also served as chairman of the Colgate committee which made a survey of ROTC in U. S. colleges for the air force.

Born in Superior, Wis., March 1, 1894, Dr. French received his B.S. degree from the University of Chicago and his master's and doctor's degrees from the University of Wisconsin.

After teaching and serving as assistant principal in Superior, Dr. French joined the faculty of Superior Teachers College where he remained until called to Colgate.

Dr. French also is chairman of the board of governors of the Co-operative bureau for Teachers, a non-profit bureau concerned with teacher placement and education research; member of the general education committee of the Association for Higher Education; a member of the American Council of Education Committee on Testing and Evaluation, and other professional and scholarly organizations.

Directs Program

Ben Aycrigg, '49, is directing a series of radio programs which are being presented over two Orlando, Fla., stations during the summer. The weekly program "Art For You" is being sponsored by the Orlando Art Association. Mayor Ray Greene, '23, of Winter Park, had a part in one of the early programs and interviewed J. Gamble Rogers on art in architecture.

'54 Scholarship

President Hugh F. McKean has donated the proceeds from his introduction to art courses for a scholarship to an outstanding art student in the Orlando-Winter Park area. Proceeds from the course which is a part of the Rollins College Courses for the Community program, amounted to \$250. The scholarship is offered for the academic year of 1954-55 and the applicant must be approved by the Art Department.

Rollins-Tuck Join In Training Plan

Rollins College and the Amos Tuck School of business Administration at Dartmouth, recently announced their association in a business administration program.

The program calls for three years of undergraduate study at Rollins and two years at Tuck.

The student will receive an A.B. degree from Rollins at the end of four years and a degree of Master of Business Administration from Tuck at the end of five years.

Tuck has this arrangement with one other college, Dartmouth, with which it is closely associated.

"I am especially pleased to have this close association with one of the outstanding graduate schools of business administration," President Hugh F. McKean said. "I am pleased that our students can complete this program in five years."

Rollins now has similar arrangements with Duke University in Forestry, and New York University in Engineering.

'54 Grad Chosen

Edward W. Scheer, Jr., Milton, Mass., member of the '54 graduating class, was chosen for the Harvard University summer school scholarship which is given annually to a Rollins Student or Alumnus. The scholarship covers all tuition, registration and laboratory fees for the summer session and is part of a cooperative scholarship arrangement between Rollins and Harvard. Edward was on the tennis team, treasurer of the Scientific Society, member of the Speech Society, International Relations and German Clubs. He was chosen by a committee of faculty members.

Named To C of C

Robert F. Whiston, '42, was appointed a member of the Florida State Chamber of Commerce, Inter-American Division, according to an announcement received in June by Dr. A. J. Hanna, who is chairman of the division. He was proposed as a member of the group by Dr. Hanna, because of his interest in this work. Bob is head of Robert F. Whiston & Co., Chamber of Commerce Building, Miami 38, Fla.

Television For The Kids

"It is barely possible that mid-century children are not little monsters as you and I had begun to fear, in view of their addiction to TV fare featuring mayhem, murder, gallons of Gore and Gyp, the Blood. At all odds a new community TV station WQED with headquarters in Pittsburgh is operating on the interesting principal that kids are human, too, and not necessarily bloodthirsty, if given a chance."

Thus wrote Inez Robb, widely read columnist and feature writer in the Pittsburgh Press about a new television approach to children. The program "The Children's Corner" is produced by none other than Fred M. Rogers

of the class of 1951. Fred says: "It's most interesting work, getting together enough 'fun yet educational' material for an hour—5 until 6—each day. We've had good response, 100 letters a day from children and parents."

Violence in the program is strictly taboo, yet the kids "eat it up." The setting is a wonderful attic crammed full of oddities and has no difficulty competing with the whodunits and assorted horror types.

At the moment, it is a pilot project and still in the experimental stage. But, according to Miss Robb, if it does nothing more than prove that children are harmless and safe to have in the home it will have served its purpose.

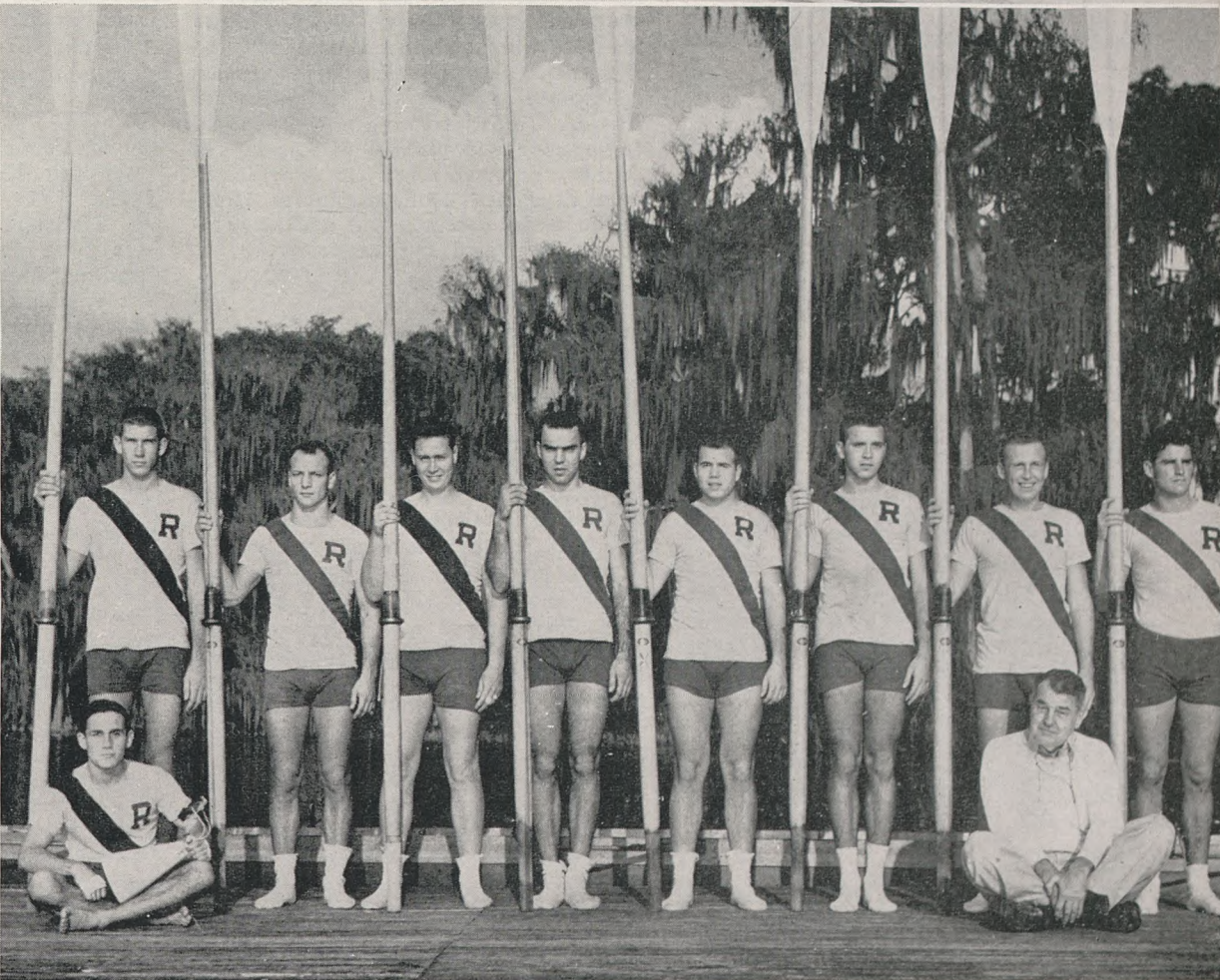
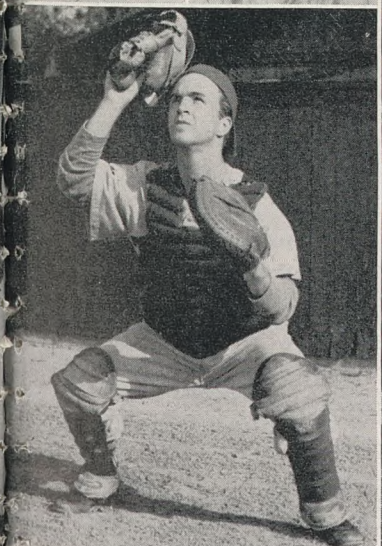
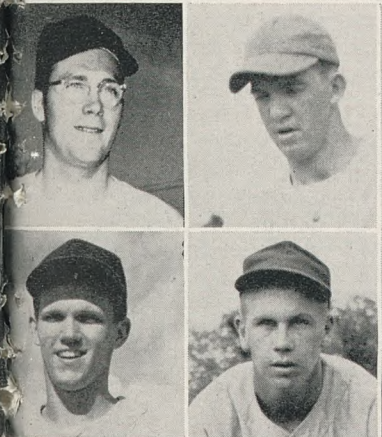
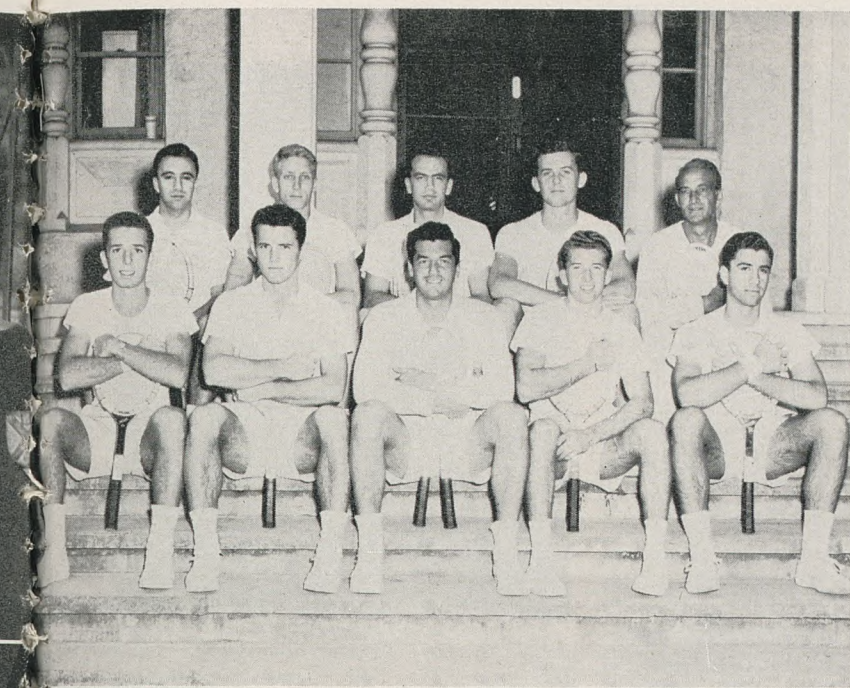
