Felder Elected

Irving M. Felder '40 was elected president of Rollins Alumni Inc., to succeed J. Sands Showalter '38 at an election meeting of the board of directors following the Founders' Week annual alumni meeting. Other officers for 1954 are William G. MacGuire '47, first vice-president; Gwen (Bartholomew) Patterson '32, second vice-president; Rebecca (Coleman) Wilson '34, secretary; and Robert F. Stonerock '41, treasurer.

Elected by ballot to serve three year terms on the board of directors were Gwen Patterson, Robert Stonerock, Shirley (Bowstead) Evans '43; Thomas W. Lawton, Jr., '34; and David J. McCreery '47. Others with unexpired terms on the board of directors are J. Sands Showalter, Raymond O. Holton '49, Bernard R. Bralove '34, H. Gordon Robins '31, Aurora McKay '30, Frank L. Williamson '48, and Joseph D. Johnson '40.

George M. Waddell '38 was named by the alumni ballot to serve on the College Board of Trustees. He joins Dr. Nelson Marshall '37 and Rebecca Coleman Wilson as alumni representatives now serving as Rollins Trustees.

Member of the American Alumni Council

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Seven new members have been elected to the Board of Trustees. They include: F. Monroe Alleman, Orlando investment banker; William B. Mills, Jacksonville attorney; Lowell C. Wadmond, New York, president of Metropolitan Opera Association; J. Roy Dickie, Pittsburgh attorney; Dr. George H. Opdyke, Winter Park, mining engineer; Coulter Craig, Winter Park, former duPont executive; and George M. Waddell, Ohio manufacturer.

Alleman, who has been interested in Rollins for many years, was instrumental in putting through the College's refinancing program five years ago. He is president of Leedy, Wheeler, Alleman Inc., chairman of the board of Central Title and Trust Co., and president of F. Monroe Alleman Inc., real estate holding company of Orlando.

Wadmond, an attorney, besides being one of the most influential men in New York music circles, served as chairman of the executive committee of the National Republican Club from 1943 to 1947.

Dickie, a distinguished Pittsburgh attorney, now lives in Winter Park. Before retiring, he was a member of the law firm of Dickie, Robinson, and McCamey. He also had served as president of the Board of Education, Pittsburgh; as trustee of Carnegie Institute; and is a past president of the International Association of Insurance Counsel.

Colonel Craig, now a resident of Winter Park, has behind him a long career as a construction engineer. He also served in the Ordnance Department of the U. S. Army and in an executive capacity with the dePont Company.

Dr. Opdyke, for a number of years a resident of Winter Park, was both a mining engineer and author. For ten years prior to his retirement in 1930, he was closely interested, as a petroleum geologist, in oil development in the Southwest.

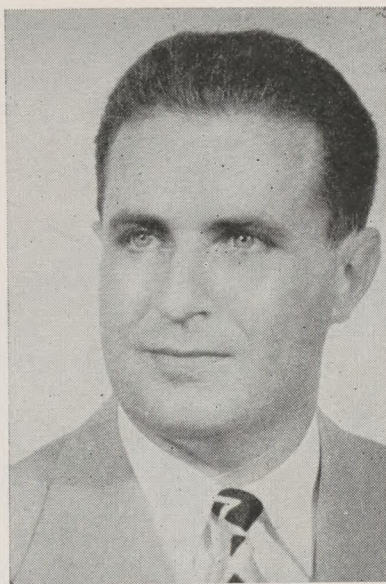
Waddell, Greenfield, Ohio, was elected by the Alumni. He has been active in alumni affairs since graduation in 1938 and has taken part in civic affairs in his home state. He is a past president and former district governor of Rotary, past district commissioner of Boy Scouts of America, and a member of National Rollins Alumni Council. He is General Manager and Treasurer of the Waddell Company, Greenfield.

Felder Reports to Alumni

There need be no apologizing for Rollins College, your Alma Mater. Just a few weeks ago your board of directors of Rollins Alumni, Incorporated, met with a gentleman who is nationally accredited as knowing more about colleges and universities than any person in the country. This gentleman made a remarkable statement which astounded the group present. In essence he stated, "that Rollins College was the best in the State of Florida, bar none, and it need not concern itself relative to its position nation-wide. Within its hallowed walls there exists one of the greatest small colleges in the United States." This is not a coincidence, it is merely a matter of not keeping itself informed of its great potentialities.

Out of this remarkable statement we are reassured of the fact that our Alumni, and the public at large are not well informed, and that a vast area of necessary persons is not adequately informed, which creates an immediate requirement. The Board of Directors of your Alumni organization agrees with this precept and promises to endeavor in the future with the mutual cooperation of all to keep our Alumni informed and we trust that you will accept this issue of the Rollins Alumni record as the first attempt to accomplish this factor.

It appears at this level that our Alumni and College are as good as any by way of loyalty but the spirit of pride has been undeveloped. If the Alumni of Rollins would realize that there is a great interdependence between their lives after college and the college itself, they would be in a better position to understand a psychological loss in their every day life. Irrespective of the thoughts of many, the Rollins Alumni need Rollins College, and Rollins College needs its Alumni. In every walk of life the alumnus of a college as self-serving as he may attempt to be will have to eventually explain a gap in his life relative to his education and his educational background. You may now accomplish this explanation as you could have in the past with a spirit of pride because unquestionably it is justifiable, and in the future, by way of information, you will see why. But start now for it is yours to have. It is my hope that you can see why Rollins College needs you.

In our planning for this year's operation your board of directors has approved one major and important committee, and that is a standing committee on under-graduate activities. The basic purpose of this committee is to inform the under-graduates of the alumnus and also of his college. If this activity had been accomplished prior to this date it would not be necessary to spend as much money, time and effort to inform the alumnus of the college and his own organization. The pride would have already been instilled in the individual, and, therefore, the confidence would have been assured that Rollins College is great and so is its Alumni. At the present time I am ashamed to state "that the feeling is otherwise."

With your cooperation, therefore, I believe that you will find that the board of directors of Rollins Alumni, Incorporated, will join me in adopting the Columbia University Alumni Federation's seven-point policy to be adopted so as to bring its Alumni proudly behind its College:

1. To keep the Alumni up to date on what is going on at the College.
2. To give the Alumni sufficient information on their various clubs and College functions of high level so as to make it possible for them to be intelligent advocates for the College and the public.
3. To engender among the Alumni pride in the College as a National Institution.

4. To correct misconceptions of the College, its doctrines, its aims, its wealth.

5. To reply to any criticisms of the College and bring out the true facts.

6. To enlarge the number of Alumni who feel they are members of the family and develop an esprit de corps and solidarity among the various groups of Alumni by geographical areas.

7. To give the Alumni specific information on the cost of education, the opportunities and needs of the College and any new plan of support for the College.

To accomplish this and to get off on the right foot, you as alumni of Rollins, must insure the economic self-sufficiency of your own organization. In the past we have accepted the financial support from the College and usurped its very life strength. This is not necessary. Please join your own organization.

As a final thought in passing, please be reminded that your college is solidly behind you and your organization, and if reassurance is necessary I feel quite sure that the president of Rollins College will supply you with this assurance personally upon your request. And to prove the Alumni's support behind the college the board of directors of Rollins Alumni, Incorporated will pledge in behalf of the members of Rollins Alumni, Incorporated full support of the program spelled out in President Hugh McKean's report to the Board of Trustees at the February 1954 annual trustees meeting.

Our Alumni are essential to our College in helping it to meet the large and complex problems of higher education today. Our Alumni have the power to help. It is my sincere hope that you concur and that you will take the time to pledge your support.

New President

The new president of Lawrence College, Appleton, Wisconsin, is Douglas Knight, assistant professor of English at Yale. He attended Rollins in 1938 with the class of '41.

Endowment Funds Doubled

Rollins College will benefit from trust funds currently valued at \$1,516,314, established by the late Mrs. Frances Knowles Warren. Mrs. Warren was the daughter of Francis B. Knowles, a charter trustee.

President McKean said that Mrs. Warren's action would, in effect, double the endowment funds of the College. He pointed out that the trusts will provide funds not only to continue the maintenance and operation of the buildings which Mrs. Warren gave the College but also would add to the scholarship and other funds of the College.

Mrs. Warren, who died in Boston October 25th, had announced at the 1953 Founders' Week Dinner that, in keeping with her belief that donors should establish endowment for their buildings, she was providing for the perpetual maintenance and care of the Knowles Memorial Chapel, the Administration Building, and the Student Center. At that time Mrs. Warren did not make public the amounts of the trusts involved.

Dr. A. J. Hanna, Director of the Diamond Jubilee Program of the College, pointed out that with Mrs. Warren's recent bequest nearly \$1,800,000 of the 10 million dollar goal had been realized since 1951.

The Diamond Jubilee Program, as announced in 1951, was a \$10 million plan in which the quality of the College was to be emphasized to a point where it would attract the endowment and buildings needed by the College. The year 1960, when the College will celebrate its seventy-fifth anniversary, has been dedicated to stressing the achievements of the institution, and it is hoped by the Diamond Jubilee Commission that the \$10 million necessary for

building the College to completion will then be within sight.

President McKean, who recently reported to the Board of Trustees that Rollins had balanced its books for the past three years without begging for funds, said:

"We have been conducting, I suppose, a rather unusual 'campaign' for support. For three years we have been seeking only to make our education more effective and to do so in the traditions of the College. We have selected new students and faculty with care. We have sought new ways of finding a personal education for each student. We have adhered to small classes and an

interchange of ideas between instructor and student. We have attempted to expand only one aspect of the College, its stature as an educational institution. We do not presume to take credit for funds we have not 'raised'. The College is either solving its own future, or it is blessed with particular good fortune. The Diamond Jubilee year (1960) may be an auspicious one."

Appraisal of the Frances Knowles Warren trust funds from which Rollins will benefit was made by the Boston Safe Deposit and Trust Company and Rufus S. Frost, co-executors of the will.

Mrs. du Pont

A gift of more than \$20,000 in stocks was received by the College in January from Mrs. Jessie Ball du Pont, Jacksonville, Fla., and Wilmington, Del. The funds will be used in connection with the program to improve instruction in the College.

Mrs. du Pont is the widow of the late Alfred I. du Pont who led in the

rehabilitation of Florida following the collapse of the land boom in the 1920's. She also is the sister of Edward Ball, manager of the du Pont interests in Florida.

"It's especially reassuring to the College that Mrs. du Pont, a former school teacher who has shown in many ways she understands the problems of a small college, has given Rollins this support," Pres. McKean said. "It also

must be gratifying to the Orlando-Winter Park community that a distinguished resident of Jacksonville has given this most appreciated type of gift — one that shows her approval of our program."

Well known as a philanthropist, Mrs. du Pont has frequently given direct assistance to small colleges. Rollins conferred on her the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws last year.

New Program Attracts Supporters

Rollins College has balanced its budget every year since he became president May 13, 1951, Pres. McKean reported to the Board of Trustees at their annual meeting February 19. He said the funds necessary to balance the budget had come in without any "begging."

"When I accepted the presidency of the College I said that I would ask no one to contribute to the College, but that if the facts ... were good and

reasonable and ... presented ... in a way that could be thoroughly understood ... the College could win its own support. Since May, 1951 when I became president, over \$954,000 has come to the College, half of which was pledged during my administration," he said.

During a period when most educators were weeping in public about "the plight of the small independent college," McKean reported that \$583,000 of the money that had come in had been added to the permanent funds of the College.

As to the objectives of a liberal arts college, the artist president declared, "it can show young people the destiny of man, it can give him a look at the world of the future."

Speaking on the academic standards of Rollins, he said "I do not believe over-long class examinations and low grades are the way to high academic standards. If Rollins is to be in fact a community for those seeking a creative life, we must not have harried students fatigued from loss of sleep. I think our students should learn to work and to work under pressure at times, but I believe creative teaching, dynamic leadership in learning, enthusiastic participation on the part of the student, and consistent and fair recognition by the faculty of the achievement of each student will achieve high academic standards in the best sense of the word."

"It is fair to say ... that the academic standing of Rollins College would and does command respect anywhere."

Contributing to the high college academic standards has been a consistent admissions program, he said.

"Last fall 219 students were admitted to the college and 57 who had completed their applications were rejected. Between 8 and 10 percent of the student body were dropped, suspended or asked not to return because ... they were not ... suited to the college."

As to education itself, the Rollins president declared that it was falling short of its goal. "If the present world is the creation of the 'educated', something must be wrong with 'education' and educators should face this disquieting thought. Education should have one clear purpose. Education, and especially 'higher' education, should show men how to live good lives. If it does not do that we would be better off without it."

Walker Resigns

Dr. Edwin R. Walker has resigned as Dean of the College to accept the presidency of Queens College, Charlotte, N. C. He is the second Rollins dean to become a college president. The late Dr. Winslow S. Anderson left Rollins in 1942 to become president of Whitman College.

Dr. Walker, 47, graduated from Southwestern University and attended Vanderbilt and the University of Chicago. He has been dean of Rollins since 1952.

Dr. Walker is chairman of the Southern Conference of Academic Deans, a member of the accrediting committee of the Southern Assn. of Colleges and Secondary Schools and a former member of the national board of the Student Christian Movement.

Engineering Course

Students attending Rollins College now will be able to earn degrees in engineering through cooperation with New York University.

President McKean said that under the program students will attend Rollins three years and New York University two. At the end of five years they will receive a degree of Bachelor of Science from Rollins and Bachelor of Science in Engineering from New York University.

After studying basic courses in the field of liberal arts, with concentration in mathematics and physics, a student may choose between eight branches of engineering at New York University.

"The program will offer unusual advantages by combining study at a small liberal arts college with study in the engineering school of the largest independent university in the country," McKean said.

The program will start next fall.

New Format

The Alumni Record appears in new format with this issue. The new style was adopted by the Board of Directors last October after thorough study by an evaluation committee set up for this purpose.

Pending the appointment of an executive secretary, the current issue of the Record was edited by a committee of Rollins alumni.

Editorial, Reprinted from Orlando Evening Star

Friends of Rollins College will be heartened by Pres. Hugh McKean's announcement of a \$1,516,314 endowment established in the will of the late Mrs. Frances Knowles Warren, who during her lifetime did so much for the college.

Mrs. Warren's gift is a real endorsement of the administration of Pres. McKean, for Mrs. Warren spent much time at Winter Park since Mr. McKean assumed the presidency of the college. She had the opportunity to observe his leadership for the institution she and her family has done so much to make possible. If things were not as they should be; if Mrs. Warren was not confident the college would go on to greater achievements under Mr. McKean's administration she would not have turned more than a million and a half dollars of her estate over to it.

Few women do the good with their money that Mrs. Warren has. The college has Knowles Memorial Chapel, and its administration building because of her generosity. She virtually gave Rollins its Student Center. She renovated the Science Building, given the college by her father, the late Francis B. Knowles. Her hand was in her pocketbook all through the years helping the institution meet its budget, just as her father had done in the years past.

Mrs. Warren's magnificent bequest may move other Rollins benefactors to remember the college in their wills. It is a fitting way in which to put their money to work for them, long after they have joined their Creator.

Rollins indeed is fortunate in the friends it has made.

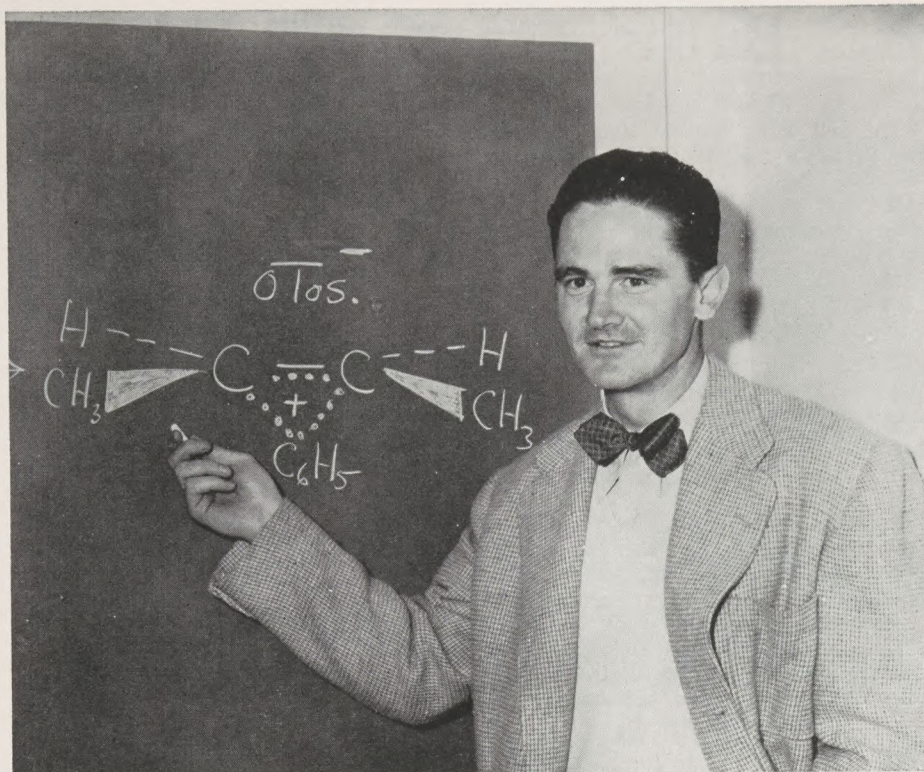
Cincinnati

Donald Cram

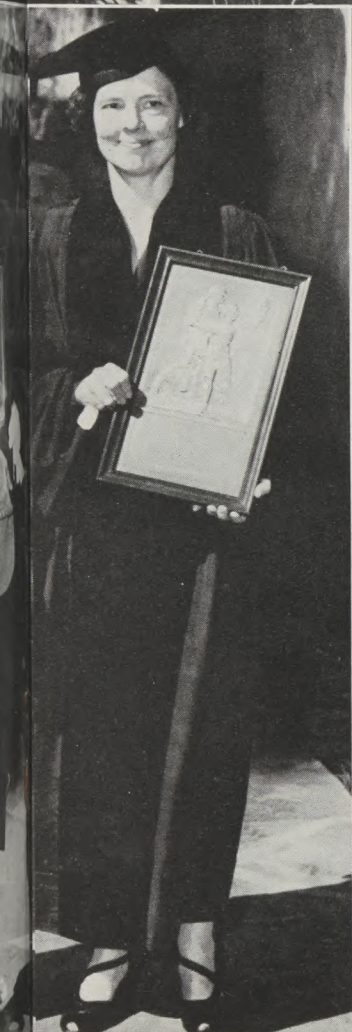

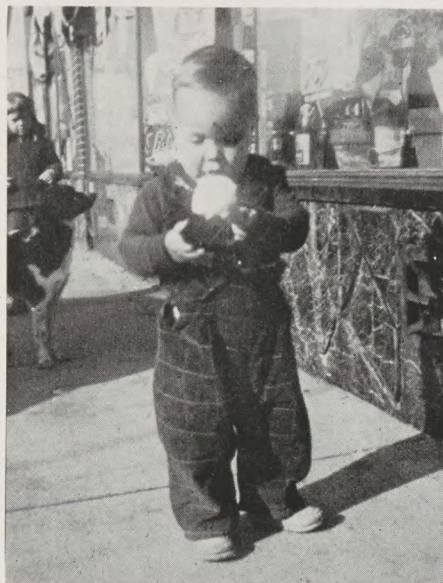

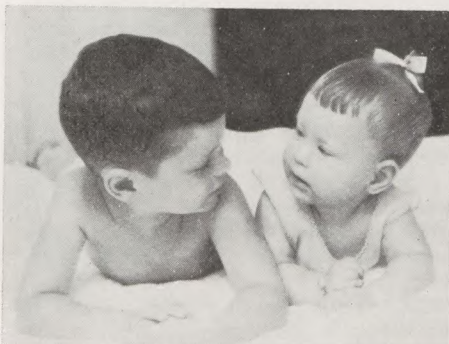
