Alumni Contribute \$11,988.35 In 1951

At the last annual business meeting of the Rollins Alumni Association during Founders' Week, it was voted that a special report of all funds contributed by Rollins Alumni to the College within the 1951 calendar year be printed as soon as available in THE ROLLINS ALUMNI RECORD.

Between January 1 and December 31, 1951, Rollins Alumni gave the following amounts in these three main categories:

Rollins College Endowment Fund	\$ 3,250.50
Annual Alumni Fund	926.90
Other Rollins College Funds	7,810.95
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Total Alumni gifts in 1951	\$11,988.35

The Rollins budget is set up on a fiscal, not a calendar year, but during the same interval of time upon which the above figures are based, the College spent \$7,304.26 for the operational expenses of the Alumni Department.

A complete financial statement to the Rollins Alumni Association, based upon the College's fiscal year ending June 30, is regularly printed in the fall issue of THE ROLLINS ALUMNI RECORD, since final figures are not available when this current issue of the quarterly goes to press.

McKean Accepts Rollins Presidency Sets College Sights For 1960 Goal

At 2:00 P. M. on April 9, 1952, the Board of Trustees proclaimed that Hugh Ferguson McKean, then acting president, had finally acceded to the petitions of the Faculty and Trustees to become permanent president of Rollins College. In his letter of acceptance, President McKean said he was initiating a program "which, if pursued with vigor and taste, could make it possible for Rollins College to celebrate its Diamond Jubilee in 1950 with a fund of \$10,000,000".

Mr. Winthrop Bancroft, chairman of the Board, made the announcement at an all-College assembly in the Annie Russell Theatre. The 700 Students, Faculty and Alumni present responded enthusiastically with rounds of applause.

Mr. Bancroft explained that the Trustees had carefully studied the candidacy of a number of highly qualified educators for the position but recalled with a chuckle that they had been besieged to persuade McKean to continue at the helm since May 13, 1951, when he undertook the responsibilities of acting president.

In telling of the objective for Rollins' 75th anniversary, Mr. Bancroft revealed that the College had received gifts in support of the new Administration totaling over \$100,000 within recent weeks alone. He cited the

normal enrollment of over 600 well-qualified students at Rollins this year with the additional instruction given to more than 700 members of the community and personnel at nearby military bases. "Under the guidance of President McKean," he concluded, "there have been steady and substantial increases in financial resources of the College and academic standards have been further strengthened."

When President and Mrs. McKean returned from College business in New York City a few days later, they were greeted by a typical turnout of Town and Gown at the Winter Park railroad station. Rollins students, displaying improvised welcome signs, escorted them to their home by motorcade.

Hugh McKean, first Rollins Alumnus to become President of the College is assured of the results of his projected plans. "The emphasis," he asserts, "will be on the quality of education at Rollins and not on pursuing the wealthy hat in hand."

Mrs. Hansen Now New Head Librarian

Mrs. Alice M. Hansen assumed her duties as head librarian of the handsome new Mills Memorial on campus early in June. President Hugh F. McKean announced that she had been selected to succeed Paul Kruse, who has become a member of the University of Illinois Library Science faculty this summer, shortly after commencement.

Mrs. Hansen has had 23 years experience as a college head librarian. With the Slippery Rock State Teachers College in Pennsylvania for 14 years and at Pennsylvania College for Women for nine years, she was also on the Columbia University and New York Public Library Staffs. This past

year she served as order librarian at Rollins College.

A graduate of Vassar College, Mrs. Hansen holds the degree of master of Education from Harvard University and has taught in Pennsylvania public schools. She received her degree in Library Science from Columbia University.

Her son, Lt. Wilbur Vaughan Hansen, is now on active duty with the U. S. Marine Corps in Korea. Mrs. Hansen is a sister of the late Miss Grace McBride of Winter Park.

140 Seniors Join Alumni Ranks

On June 4, the Class of 1952 marched in Academic Procession into Knowles Memorial Chapel for the last time as undergraduates for their own Commencement Exercises.

Dr. Wendell C. Stone was invited to give the Commencement Address this June 4th. Speaking from the pulpit in Knowles Memorial Chapel, "Education and the Good Life" was his topic.

President McKean then asked the families present of each candidate for a degree to stand when they were called forward individually to receive their diploma, a Rollins custom which greatly adds to the interest of this ceremony.

In the preceding months, and especially during their final weeks on campus, the members of this Class experienced together all the final events traditionally accorded Seniors at Rollins College.

Alumni in Central Florida gave an informal covered dish supper in honor of the graduating Class on May 15 at the University Club of Winter Park.

On May 27 the annual Faculty-Senior Banquet was held at the Winter Park Woman's Club. Just before adjourning to the Annie Russell Theatre for the mutual take-offs of hosts and guests, President of the Senior Class John Vereen made the six members of the Faculty who retire this spring honorary members of the Class of 1952 and in token thereof presented each with miniature scrolls.

At Honors Day exercises, in the Annie Russell Theatre on the following Friday, the entire Student Body expressed their appreciation of President McKean by presenting him with another beautifully lettered scroll bearing their signatures.

After a hearty breakfast, everyone rushed back to campus for the principal event of the day.

Six Veteran Professors Retire This Spring

Six grey-haired young men and a woman stepped down from the Rollins faculty this Spring under the College's new compulsory retirement plan.

The new plan, voted by the faculty, calls for automatic retirement at 65 with the proviso that professors may be retained until age 70 on a year to year basis.

Dr. Royal France, with 25 years on the Rollins faculty, heads the list of six who are retiring this year. All were made honorary members of the Class of 1952, at ceremonies during the annual Senior-Faculty Banquet. The others are Dr. William Melcher, Professor Florence Wilde, Dr. Theodore Collier, Dr. James E. Bell, and Dr. Norman E. Gilbert.

Dr. France came to Rollins as one of Hamilton Holt's Golden Personality professors, leaving a lucrative corporation practice to accept a position in the Economics Department here. He weathered a serious operation this winter and is now planning to actively reenter the legal profession in the New York area. At present he is acting as consultant to the American Civil Liberties Union.

Dr. Melcher rounded out his 18th year in the College's Business Administration Department this spring. Prior to his work at Rollins he was on the Florida Southern University faculty. The dapper white mustached professor holds a doctorate in Philosophy from the University of Wisconsin and for many years has headed the annual Economic Conference at Rollins.

Professor Wilde has for some eight years held forth in the art shacks on Lake Virginia. A graduate of Pratt Institute and well known as a magazine illustrator she came here in 1944 as Professor of Commercial Art.

Dr. Collier came to Rollins in 1945 after 22 years at the head of the History Department at Brown University where he was professor of History and International Relations. He holds a doctorate from Cornell University and has contributed widely to such publications as the Encyclopedia Britannica and the Dictionary of American Biography. Those students who have known him in his seven years at Rollins have been continually amazed by Dr. Collier's pin-point memory and piercing insight into the meaning of history.

Dr. Gilbert came to Rollins in 1945 after retiring from a career of 42 years as Physics professor at Dartmouth College. The Macmillan Co. of New York published a third edition of his textbook "Electricity and Magnetism" in 1950. Dr. Gilbert received his doctorate at Johns Hopkins University and studied at Wesleyan University and the famous Cavendish Laboratory in Cambridge, England.

Dr. Bell also came to the Rollins Science Department in 1945. He attended the University of Chicago and earned his doctorate at the University of Illinois. He has taught at California Institute of Technology and other leading colleges and is well known for his work in chemical research.

Dr. Shank Made Dean of Orlando Junior College

Dr. John W. Shank, former Dean of Coe College and for the past year Associate Director of Admissions at Rollins, has been named Acting Dean of Orlando Junior College. The announcement of his appointment by the O.J.C. Trustees was made with the prior recommendation and approval of the Rollins Administration.

Dean Walker Tops Fall Faculty Additions

On June 29 President Hugh F. McKean announced the appointment of Dr. Edwin R. Walker as Dean of Rollins College. "Selecting the Dean," President McKean says, "has been a joint enterprise of the Faculty, the Trustees, and the Administration. I am pleased that Dr. Walker has accepted what amounts to a call from the entire college. He has a brilliant record as an educator and an administrator. He brings us experience and wisdom; and he will be an invaluable aid in our drive to make Rollins College extend its leadership in the direction of thorough and sound education."

Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at Florida State University in Tallahassee since 1948, Dr. Walker served from January to July of last year as Consultant to Millard Caldwell, Administrator of the Federal Civil Defense Administration. He holds a B.A. degree from Southwestern University, the B.D. from Vanderbilt, and Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. Dr. Walker has served as Professor of Philosophy and Religion at Central College, Associate Professor of Philosophy at the University of Colorado, and Professor of Philosophy and Director of General Education at Oklahoma A. & M. College. During the summer of 1944 he was Visiting Professor at the University of Chicago. Articles by Dr. Walker have appeared in numerous publications. He is a member of the American Philosophical Association, Southwestern Philosophical Conference, Phi Kappa Phi and Pi Kappa Delta Fraternities, and was a Kent Fellow.

In coming to Rollins College, Dr. Walker says, "I believe that Rollins College has built through the years foundations of educational policy and tradition which can be extended to establish its position as one of America's stronger colleges. I am in complete sympathy with the desire of Rollins College to remain small, to continue its famous conference plan method of teaching, and its aim of producing the necessary leadership which a democracy must have to survive."

Dr. Dan Thomas will join the Rollins Faculty next fall as associate professor of Physics. After graduating from the University of Chattanooga, Mr. Thomas spent several years teaching in the Physics Department at Vanderbilt University while working for his Ph.D. degree. He held an Atomic Commission Fellowship at Vanderbilt. While completing work on his thesis, he taught a year at the University of the South, Sewanee, Tenn. Dr. Thomas spent last year at the Naval Ordnance Laboratory, near Washington, for further research experience and breadth of background.

An expansion of the curriculum in Political Science and world affairs at Rollins is indicated with the appointment of Dr. Franklyn Johnson as assistant professor of Political Science. A former consultant, on active duty 1949-51, with the Government's Central Intelligence Agency and one-time Fulbright scholar at the London School of Economics, Johnson recently received his doctorate from Harvard University. He is a World War II veteran, decorated nine times while serving in five campaigns in the European Theatre of Operations. After returning to the States, he graduated *magna cum laude* in 1947 from Rutgers University, where he was president of the student body. He earned his master degree in International Affairs, as well as the doctor of Philosophy degree, at Harvard. Dr. Johnson is a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

Dr. Geneva Drinkwater, member of the Vassar College faculty for 10 years, comes to Rollins next September as associate professor of History.

She has also taught at the University of Chicago as a graduate assistant, at Carleton College, Scripps College, the Women's College of the University of North Carolina, and Stephens College. A graduate of the University of Missouri, Dr. Drinkwater received her master degree and doctorate from the University of Chicago. She has also studied extensively in Italy and is visiting in Germany this summer.

Dr. Paul Hanchett, new member of the Economics faculty at Rollins, has taught at several colleges and universities. In addition, he has had diversified experience in business and directed Boys' Clubs for the Minneapolis Y. M. C. A. He holds four degrees, all from the University of Minnesota; they are the B.A. *cum laude*, B.S., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees.

Former Social Science instructor at the State University of New York and the Polytechnic Institute of Puerto Rico, Marshall K. Powers, will be assistant professor of Sociology at Rollins next year. He is currently an instructor in History at the University of Florida, where he is a candidate for the degree of doctor of Philosophy in the School of Inter-American Studies. After graduating from Marietta College, Powers earned his master degree at the University of Colorado. He served in the armored forces during World War II and with the Army Air Force in the China-Burma-India Theatre.

Donald Carroll, coming from the University of Texas, is to be assistant professor of Chemistry. He is also now completing requirements for the Ph.D. degree. A native of West Virginia like Professor Powers, Carroll attended Marshall College receiving his B.S. and M.S. degrees there.

Gordon Apgar To Direct Tar Tennis Program

Of special interest is President McKean's announcement that Gordon Apgar '43 will return to Rollins next fall to direct the tennis program. He will supervise and promote the sport under direction of the Physical Education Department.

Jim McDougall, who piloted the Rollins squad to eight wins this past season, remains as head tennis coach.

Apgar, head tennis coach at Rollins prior to his joining the U. S. Navy in 1943, plans to expand as well as continue the development of excellent men's teams and women's ladder. He coached such tennis greats at Rollins as Pauline Betz '43, Dorothy Bundy '45, Jack Kramer x45 and Eddie Alloo x44.

This spring the Student Council voted to match the College in financing the three new tennis courts on campus.

Miss Sally Monsour, who joined the Conservatory Faculty this year, revived the Rollins Glee Club this spring with such success that it seems certain to share the fame of the Bach and Chapel choirs in the future. Fifty-two students and several members of the Faculty and Administrative Staff make up this organization.

Dual State honors are now on campus. Bruce Lee, sports editor of *THE SANDSPUR* was elected president of the Florida Intercollegiate Press Association and Jon Dunn-Rankin walked off with the presidency of the Florida Student Government Association at the group's joint convention in Miami.

Delta Chi and Kappa Kappa Gamma won the annual Independent Women's Campus Sing this year. Delta Chi retires the trophy with this, their third straight win.

After Rollins "Sand Letter" fell into *NEW YORKER* hands, the Administration was besieged by humorous underclassmen. Ace *SANDSPUR* writer Tom Pickens was set to send them the "Super whopper size, one beach umbrella, and a co-ed." *THE NEW YORKER* got their sand but the details on the co-ed and beach umbrella just weren't worked out in time. One detail can't be overlooked though—the original idea of the Sand Letter has added over fourteen thousand dollars to the Rollins Endowment Fund.

Libra presented the annual outstanding Woman of the Year award to Mrs. Frances Knowles Warren.

This spring Rollins had the most successful sports season experienced here for many years. Coach Bradley's crews can boast one of the finest records ever sported by Tar oarsmen with a 14-3 Varsity and Jayvee score. Rollins, stroked by Sophomore Don Weber, won 6 out of 7 dual races, finished second by 1 foot behind Florida Southern in the State Championship Regatta and reached the flood marker by coming home second to LaSalle by 8 feet in the 9-shell Dad Vail classic in Boston. The Tars defeated LaSalle and the Boston University eight, one of the big league American Racing Association crews, in a dual meet earlier this spring.

Tar netmen, after a defaulted match by Miami, proceeded to garner 7 straight wins against stiff competition, including a 5-4 conquest of the Southern Conference champion Duke, but Miami stopped our bid for an undefeated tennis season in a final return match, 5-4.

Our diamondmen also came through in good fashion. They won 17 and dropped 14. A Freshman trio of Carey, Hutsell, and Tauscher gave the

Tars much needed pitching strength and are responsible for the invitation of the NCAA to play in the regional baseball tournament of District III in Kannapolis, N. C., June 5-7. Rollins won a game from the Florida Gators and held Duke, winners of this double elimination tournament, to a one-run victory. According to Coach Joe Justice '40, his charges "Did very well for a bunch of Freshmen."

Our golf team dropped from 5-2-1 to 8-9-1 against its toughest schedule ever, but again boasted one of the top college golfers in the South in Billy Key '52. Athletic Director Jack McDowall has announced that a second Southern high school champion from Columbus, Ga., like Billy will enter Rollins next fall. His name? Cecil Calhoun. Under the able tutelage of Clyde Kelly '51, Tar linksmen are looking forward to next year.

In the Sandspur bowl, X Club and Kappa Alpha Theta won the Intramural trophies for 1951-52.

The drama season on campus closed with "Power Without Glory" at the Fred Stone and a popular revival of "As You Like It" at the Annie Russell. As in the past, the annual Shakespearean production at the A.R.T. was distinguished for good diction, and adroit acting. Of unusual interest, however, was the special sets designed this time by President McKean and executed under the supervision of Dick Verigan '41, technical director for Rollins' varsity theatre.

This year the Independent Women presented a brilliant musical comedy called "The Prince of Errata." Howard (Dick) Richards, Rollins undergraduate, wrote both the tuneful minor-key score and equally original book. He also directed the orchestra, an innovation for these all-student productions.

The critics couldn't agree as to whether the music was done in a Cole Porter or a Gershwin manner, but it didn't matter for everyone was singing the snappy tunes. And, by popular demand, recodings have been made of the show's hit music.

Audiences applauded nightly May 7-10 this musical love story with warming human interest. The show overflowed with sparkling dance numbers, colorful costumes and sets. Fred Taylor '51, remembered for his comedy role in "Mexican Heydaze" (Dick's first musical at Rollins before he was called back into the Army for another year) and Jack Reardon '52, who

Rollins Clubs Reorganize In Key Cities

Chicago, New York, Washington—no matter where you go Rollins is never very far away.

The Rollins Alumni Club of Chicago has been holding meetings in the Palmer House. Late in April Chicago Alumni received cards saying that Harry (Bub) Orr, their local Rollins Alumni Councilmember, had made arrangements for members to "talk Rollins" with President Hugh F. McKean and Dr. A. J. Hanna there on May 1.

At a later meeting that same month, the Club listened to tape recordings made at Rollins and viewed movies of campus activities. After this relaxation serious business was undertaken. Permanent officers were elected to take the place of the temporary ones. Ted McElwee '49 is president; Dan Draznik '50, vice-president; and Anita Rodenbaeck '47, secretary-treasurer. Discussion of future meetings ended with plans for a summer picnic tentatively set for Sunday, July 27.

The Town Hall Club has been the scene of a number of recent meetings of the Rollins Alumni Club of New York. All Rollinsites in the N. Y. City area received notices preceding the May 14 "Election of officers—News of the College—Statement from Hugh McKean, now President, and other highlights of the good news from Winter Park." On June 18 the New York group convened at the Lotus Club for the first showing of some beautiful new color slides of the campus, with President McKean as honor guest. The next New York Club meeting is slated for October 1.

The Washington, D. C., Rollins Alumni Club was reactivated February 18, 1952. Dottie Aubinoe Griffith '48, was unanimously elected president; Leon Stackler '39, was named vice-president; Jane Freeman '49, secretary; and Ed Friedman '43, treasurer.

One of the first projects of this Club was to set up a centrally-located register of Rollinsites in the Washington, D. C., area at the Hotel Dupont Plaza, Dupont Circle, N.W. So that visiting as well as resident Alumni may contact each other.

At a subsequent meeting the Washington Club proposes to invite prospective students and their parents to see films of Rollins as soon as they become available.

In Memoriam

With sorrow we record the passing of these friends of Rollins College.

In April we learned that Antonio Soto Navarro had died in Vedado, Havana, Cuba, on July 10, 1949. He is survived by his brother, Julio, also of Vedado, with whom he attended Rollins in 1900.

Another Alumnus of whose passing we have just received word is Charles Partin on June 18, 1950. A Student at Rollins College from 1890 to 1891, he was a truck farmer and celery grower in Longwood, Florida.

Mrs. O. H. Ohlinger, the former Mary Carson, died on December 2, 1951. She attended Rollins in 1892 and has had some of her verse published. Her husband survives her in Babson Park, Florida, and they had five children. The late Mrs. F. E. Ohlinger (Sophronia Carson), who graduated from the former Rollins Academy in 1894, was her sister.

Mrs. James E. Dexter, the former Laura May Walker, passed away in Lima, Ohio, January 8, 1952. Mrs. Dexter studied music at Rollins from 1890 to 1894, earning one of the first certificates issued by the Rollins Conservatory. She later received her B.M. degree from Oberlin College Conservatory and returned to Rollins in 1908 and taught piano for the next two years. Besides her husband, she is survived by their two sons, James Alfred and Robert Morton. Her sisters, Miss Flora Walker and Mrs. Nina Walker Devoe, attended Rollins 1890-93 and 1893-97 respectively.

Dr. James Brooks, chancellor of Rollins College 1920-21, died at the age of 80 on April 14, 1952, in Alexandria, Virginia. Born in Orrington, Maine, Dr. Brooks attended Harvard University, Ohio Wesleyan and the University of Georgia. He was headmaster at a number of schools, including Burr and Burton Seminary, Hamden Academy, Bacon Academy, Grove Park School and Lucy Cobb Institute. He served in one of the three administrative offices at Rollins, under the late President George Morgan Ward.

Jack Sloane Willson, who attended the former Rollins Academy from 1909 to 1912, suffered a fatal heart attack in May, 1952. A varsity letterman in football, crew and basketball at Rollins, he received his A.B. degree at the University of California in 1918. Returning to Florida he established the J. S. Willson Construction Company in Palm Beach in 1920. Besides his wife he leaves a daughter and two sons. His brother, James M. Willson who attended Rollins from 1905 to 1909, is an internationally known artist.

On June 3, 1952, Harold Rodner, vice president of Warner Brothers motion picture firm, passed away at the age of 62 in New York City. A Winter Park visitor, he was in charge of the Warner Brothers' eastern office. In 1943, Rollins College conferred the honorary L.H.D. degree upon him.
