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Colorful Rites Mark Inauguration

On the afternoon of February 18 Rollins officially celebrated the Inauguration of Dr. Paul A. Wagner as President of the College and conferred an honorary Doctor of Laws degree upon Dr. Robert Maynard Hutchins, chancellor of the University of Chicago. Some 1,500 people attended this most impressive ceremony during the 1950 observance of Founders' Week.

Delegates representing 194 colleges, universities and educational organizations throughout the United States, including the presidents of every institution of higher learning in the State of Florida, were guests of the College at a luncheon in the Rollins Center that noon. A profusion of seasonal flowers were artistically arranged throughout the foyer and Center for the occasion.

Shortly after 2 o'clock the visiting dignitaries marched in Academic Procession with Rollins Trustees, Faculty, Alumni and Students to the terraced lawn in front of Knowles Memorial Chapel, final scene of the Inauguration.

Chancellor Hutchins, first principal speaker, chose the Idea of a College as his topic. Stressing the intellectual functions of the college, he said that the purpose of education is not to adjust students to their environment but to prepare them for any possible environment and to induce them to attain a better one. "Industry itself is the place in which the young should learn how to work in industry," Hutchins stated. "We should give every student the education that is appropriate to free men or we should abandon universal suffrage." In concluding, Dr. Hutchins told the audience, "Paul Wagner was one of my students, but a very independent one. He is a stalwart and original man. I do not know what course he will take. But I predict that you will have an exciting and rewarding time and that Rollins is entering upon a stirring and significant phase of its distinguished career."

Preceding the inaugural ceremonies Benjamin Aycrigg, representing the Alumni, gave a brief history of Rollins College. Hugh Davis, president of the Student Council, read the section of the By-Laws defining the duties and responsibilities of the President of Rollins. Mr. Halsted W. Caldwell, secretary of the Board, certified that Dr. Wagner was duly nominated and elected by the Trustees of the College.

Mr. Winthrop Bancroft, chairman of the Board of Trustees, then inducted Dr. Wagner into the office of President of the College. And Dr. Hamilton Holt, honorary president of Rollins, presented him with the charter, which states that Rollins College, now 65 years old, is the oldest privately endowed college in the State of Florida.

In his Inaugural Address, President Wagner declared himself "a conservative in education, with a faith that democracy demands that all men be educated to prepare themselves for citizenship." He called on colleges to adopt the group thinking that will coincide with human

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New Policies and Appointments Announced

High Cost Ousts Football at Rollins

Initiating the policy of making an annual report following the meeting of the Board of Trustees so that important decisions can be communicated promptly, President Paul A. Wagner met with the Faculty and Staff on March 21 and the Student Body later in a 2-hour assembly to explain certain actions taken this year.

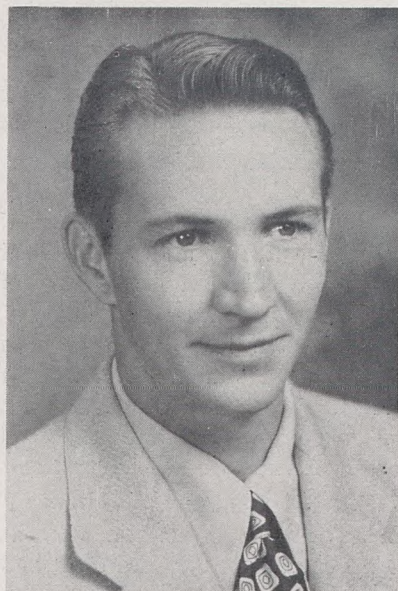
Using slides and placards, President Wagner pointed out that Rollins could not continue to absorb the annual deficit resulting from football, which amounted to \$57,000 last year, and remain financially sound. This expense plus the fact that the College is starting to fund the debt it incurred during World War II left the Board no alternative and they voted unanimously to discontinue this sport at Rollins. Football scholarship students, 18 of whom are Seniors this year, will be continued until they graduate from or leave Rollins. Dr. Wagner met with the football team an hour before the Student assembly and offered them the option of playing out the 1950 schedule. They voted to drop football now. Rollins was the fifth college to abandon football that week.

President Wagner says that basketball, crew, tennis and golf will be stressed at Rollins since they cost only a fraction what it takes to play football. "Because of McDowall's and Justice's ability and long association with Rollins College we all feel they are the men to do this job," he declared.

Dr. Wagner also took this occasion to announce the appointment of H. A. Tollefson as his executive assistant. Mr. Tollefson will continue

as College Librarian but take over much of the detail of the President's office. A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Tollefson received his master degree there in 1940. He came to Rollins as librarian in 1946 from the University of Michigan where he had earned his A.B.L.S. degree and was serving as chief circulation librarian. Since coming to Rollins he has contributed several articles to professional library journals. The December 15, 1949, issue of LIBRARY JOURNAL carried his interesting article, "Ease of Control is Rollins Keynote," about the projected plans for the Mills Memorial Library now under construction. Mr. Tollefson was elected secretary of the Florida Library Association early in April.

President Wagner has announced two more popular appointments recently.

William R. Shelton '48 will return to the campus next fall as a member of the English Faculty. His story "Snow Girl," based on his experience while piloting a B-25 up the Brenner Pass, won THE ATLANTIC MONTHLY first, a MGM \$1,500 award and the O'Henry award in 1948. After earning his B.A. degree at Rollins, Shelton was awarded the eighteenth Eugene F. Saxton Memorial Trust Fellowship. This Fellowship was granted on the quality of the synopsis of his projected novel, which he recently finished at the University of Iowa where he is doing graduate work and teaching modern literature. Several of his short stories have appeared in national magazines.

Benjamin Aycrigg '49 has already taken over his duties as assistant to the Director of Admissions, John O. Rich '38. An announcer for radio station WDBO for more than 3 years, Aycrigg is continuing as director of a program sponsored by the Orlando Junior League. The coveted Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallion was conferred upon him when he graduated from Rollins. Ben says: "It's a great pleasure and a stimulating experience to work under President Wagner; this job of talking about Rollins is easy for me because I believe in it."

Other innovations to become effective next fall will be elimination of resident heads in all men's dormitories at Rollins and reconversion of Pinehurst into a girls' dormitory. A male member of the Faculty will be in charge of the Freshmen men's dormitory. Mrs. Ruby Marshall, present housemother at Rollins Hall, will be retained as housemother at Pinehurst. Classrooms in Pinehurst will be transferred to Carnegie Hall upon completion of the new library.

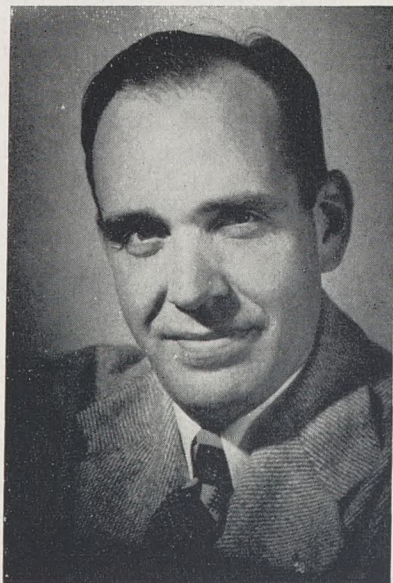
With 5 resident heads leaving, approximately 13 additional beds will be open for boarding students. This would mean \$1400 increase per each additional boarding student.

George M. Waddell of Greenfield, Ohio, was named new vice-president of the Rollins Alumni national organization; while Aurora McKay, executive secretary, and Fred-eric H. Ward, treasurer, were both re-elected.

Raymond W. Greene was nominated as the third Alumni representative on the Board of Trustees of the College. Due to the Inauguration on Alumni Day, the Trustees met the following Monday this year and he was elected by them to serve the 1950-53 term.

By 10 o'clock on Alumni Day, Saturday, 150 Rollins Alumni had registered at the Alumni House for the annual business meeting during Founders' Week. The usual day-long Alumni program had to be completed by noon to permit everyone to participate in the inaugural events that afternoon. The annual message from the retiring president of the Alumni Association, Henry S. Lauterbach, and the treasurer's statement were therefore printed and distributed before the general meeting began. Rodman J. Lehman, 1949-50 chairman of the Executive Committee of the Alumni Council, presided and announced the results of the annual Association elections by mail ballot.

Beginning with the 8 members of the Gay Nineties present, Chairman Lehman asked all those who had attended Rollins within each

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Dean Enyart To Retire In June

Rollins Dean of Men, Arthur D. Enyart, will retire at the end of this college year. He has asked to be relieved of his duties for reasons of health and will receive an emeritus rank upon his retirement.

"During his 28 years here, Dean Enyart has made an invaluable contribution to the progress of Rollins," President Wagner said in making the announcement. "No man will be remembered with greater affection. He has been a fine teacher, a wise counselor and a loyal friend to thousands who are now Alumni. We accepted his resignation with regret, but his health and well being mean much to all of us."

With the official announcement of Dean Enyart's coming retirement the April 20 issue of THE ROLLINS SANDSPUR featured an entire page of tributes to him from Students, Dr. Cecil Butt '43, Professor Willard Wattles, Professor Edward F. Jones, President Paul A. Wagner and Honorary President Hamilton Holt.

Dr. Holt's message read: "I am glad to welcome our beloved Dean of Men to the Rollins shelf where, wrapped in cotton batting and sprinkled with camphor, we can pass the coming days together, and watch the happy life in the little College we both so love.

"It will doubtless be something of a wistful experience but, like grandparents with grandchildren, we shall have all the fun and none of the responsibility.

"If I could describe Arthur Delano Enyart in two words (which of course no one can do) I would say he is a 'lovable personality.' In that personality perhaps the chief characteristics are a wise head, a warm heart, a gentle spirit and, when the occasion warrants, some righteous indignation.

"I think the Dean is about the most human being I know. He has ever stood bravely for the right as he sees it. He has ever been a father confessor to the heavy laden. Many an erring student on our campus owes his salvation to him. Many a soul, sick of heart and mind, has been healed by his understanding counsel.

"Dean Enyart has always been loyal to the ideals of Rollins. He has always been a good colleague to his fellow members of the Faculty. He has always been a great leader and teacher of the Student Body.

John O. Rich '38, Director of Admissions, has just completed a successful trip through the eastern states and is now personally interviewing interested students in the middle west.

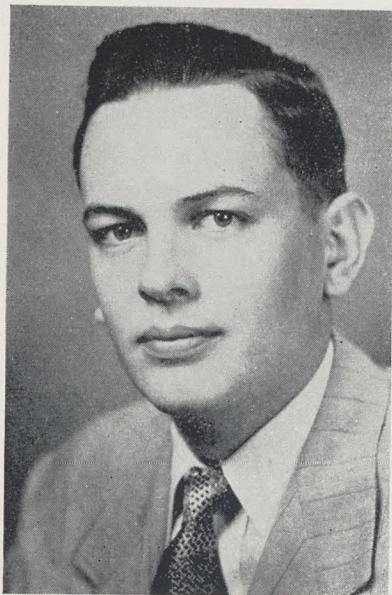

Sports Review

Best sports news to hit the Rollins campus in 1950 was the return of intercollegiate basketball after a 10-year lapse. The Tar squad, handicapped by a late season start, developed sufficiently under the tutelage of Coach McDowall to make it quite rough on State opponents by the end of the campaign. With one season under their belt, and many lettermen returning, prospects for next year's Tar quintet look brighter.

An underrated Tar golf team surprised everyone, including the University of Miami, by copping the State team championship held in DeLand. Miami was so certain of repeating last year's victory that they neglected to bring the trophy along when they checked into DeLand to defend their State title.

Rollins, perennially strong in tennis competition, ran true to form this year. The Tar netters ran up a total of 27 consecutive victories before bowing to a fine Miami squad.

It was a different story with the Tar crew. Usually a strong contender for the State title, Coach U. T. Bradley's men found the going rough in its early outings. However, the tide has turned, and at the time of this writing the Tar eight has scored 4 consecutive wins at the expense of Dartmouth, Washington & Lee, LaSalle and American International. Tar oarsmen hope to cross the finish line on Lake Maitland first again in the Florida Championship Regatta on May 13. They then go to Poughkeepsie, N. Y., for the Dad Vail Regatta on May 20.

Another fine Tar baseball nine is in the making. Holders of the mythical Florida championship for the past 2 years, this year's squad is undefeated in State competition as we go to press. Outstanding pitching and fine hitting are the main reasons for the success of Coach Joe Justice's boys.

Last, but not least, is the outstanding record achieved by the girls' varsity basketball team. This fine group, coached by Sara Jane Dorsey, was unbeaten in regular season competition.

William R. Smythe, Jr., Rollins College Senior and candidate for honors in mathematics, presented his special study topic, The Brachistochrone Problem in the Calculus of Variations, at the Southeastern Section meeting of the Mathematical Association of America in Gainesville, Fla., on April 7-8.

Rollins Professor of Mathematics George Saute was invited to preside at the session in which Smythe and 3 others spoke.

Dealing this year with "Our Critical Economic Problems and the Outlook for Solutions," the Economic Conference in February was well attended. Student participation made for heightened interest, in the form of a debate.

Our debating team as a whole has done itself proud, returning to the field of intercollegiate debating after a lapse of so many years. Rollins won 6 of 8 debates at the Southern Collegiate Debate Conference at Agnes Scott College. And at home, debaters Dan Eastwood and Bob Harding upheld the negative and defeated the Princeton pair who came down to Rollins more recently debating that same national intercollegiate question, "Resolved: That the U. S. Should Nationalize Basic Non-Agricultural Industries."

More speeches, this time the paying kind, were made as one of the opening attractions of Founders' Week. The winners of the Gen. Charles McCormick Reeve Literary and Oratorical Competition vocalized upon their winning essays.

February was a month bursting with important ideas. Some of the finest of these were brought to us by Dr. Edwin Mims, who stopped in his Florida tour to deliver a series of lectures for students, at the Annie Russell.

Our Theatre was the scene of a great deal of hustle and bustle all through the month of February while Professor Granberry's new play was in rehearsal. When Founders' Week rolled around, "The Falcon" was in top-flight condition, and the cause of many favorable speculations as to its Broadway prospects. Besides its poetically moving script, the play was enhanced by an excellent cast, directed by Howard Bailey, and headed by John O'Hare, who was imported from a New York show for the express purpose of helping "the Granberry play" to the success that it enjoyed.

March didn't come in at all like the proverbial lion, but nightingale-like, with the 15th Annual Bach Festival at Knowles Chapel scoring its arrival. The musical forces under the lead of Conductor Harvey L. Woodruff, were praised as setting a new high in choral achievement. In particular, the Mass in B Minor, one of the world's great music masterpieces, was to everyone present in the beautiful Chapel an emotional experience of the most profound.

A highlight of the theatre year came with the meeting of the Southeastern Theatre Conference on March 10 and 11 the first regional

theatre conference ever held in Florida. Its purpose was to discuss ways to improve the method of teaching in the Theatre and acting professions. This week-end also marked the final performance of the current Annie Russell production, "Medea," which featured Clarence Durwent as Creon. The Rollins family took particular pride in viewing the fine portrayal of Medea by Nan Van Zile, at her intense best in the sublime emotional experience of great Greek tragedy.

From the sublime to the ridiculous was the about-face maneuvered in the next big production, "The Torchbearers." Judging from the hilarity of audience and players alike, George Kelly's slap-stick satire of the mid-twenties still has plenty of appeal to a fun-loving group.

Art, particularly in its more modern sprouting, had another kind of appeal, but achieved a grand prominence at the Morse Gallery in a striking series of exhibits arranged by the McKeans. These began with the "New Look" as displayed in a collection of modern furniture, lamps, wall paper panels, and mural scrolls. And a later exhibit, although somewhat puzzling to the uninitiated, "Contemporary American Art," a March exhibit of painting and of modernity.

April brought Easter and student Elections. After a fast and furious campaign, the two most hotly contested offices were settled at the polls. Our new Student Council Prexy is Ken Horton, and Sandspur Editor, Derek Dunn-Rankin.

Waterman & Richards, general contractors of Winter Park, began making this big hole in the 'Shoe early in April upon being awarded the contract to construct Mills Memorial Library for Rollins.



A series of Holy Week services prepared by students Hank Gooch, Jack Sayers, and Scotty Witherell prefaced the Easter devotionals. On Easter Sunday, the traditional Sunrise Service included Dr. William Fort as speaker. And if we believe in omens, we might take it as a good one that the sun stayed out all day.

Peering into the future, several predictions may safely be ventured. A successful Student Carnival is one, for it is being planned this year on a grand scale. A spirited "Taming of the Shrew" is another, the last Theatre offering of the year. Rollins Debate Team Reactivated

Intercollegiate Debating returned this year to Rollins College after nearly 6 years of absence. Professor of Speech, William B. Whitaker, organized a Rollins Debate Team consisting of 14 students who participated in intercollegiate debates on campus and toured the southeastern colleges.

The Rollins Debate Team competed against Princeton University of Princeton, N. J., and Centre College of Danville, Ky., at home. They won the decision over Princeton but, since no professional judge was available for the Centre College contest, there was no decision.

Resuming intercollegiate debating on a wider scale, Rollins competed against 40 competitive debaters. "During the season we had a batting average of 500," Dr. Whitaker informs us, "winning 50% of all the debates in which decisions were made."

Among the colleges we debated against in a meeting of the Southern Association of Teachers of Speech were: University of Alabama; University of Virginia; University of North Carolina; University of South Carolina; Vanderbilt College of Nashville, Tenn.; University of Tenn.; University of Georgia; University of Florida; Stetson Univ.; and Tulane of New Orleans, La. One Team debated at Agnes Scott College in Decatur, Ga. This winter Rollins Students have debated current issues before the Rotary, Kiwanis and University clubs of Winter Park.

This year Dr. Whitaker formed the Debate Team from the students in his Discussion and Debate classes. Next year he plans to have a Debate Team made up of all interested students on the campus, and establish Debating as an extra-curricular activity.

Guests were handed dance programs as they arrived and music was furnished by Carl Hallberg and his orchestra for this gala occasion. Handsome floral arrangements and graceful palms added to the attractiveness of the spacious lounge and ballroom. Mrs. Jack F. Howden was general chairman of the Alumni committees in charge of all arrangements.

Dean Enyart to Retire in June

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"In his retirement Rollins College suffers a loss that would be irreparable, did we not know that each best when past, makes room for another best, in an age which is forever renewing itself."

In Memoriam



In December, 1949, Miss Lela May Niles died in Daytona Beach, Florida. Miss Niles was a member of the Rollins Conservatory Faculty from 1923 to 1928. She came to the college as head of the Piano Department.

Irving Bacheller, distinguished novelist and Honorary Trustee of Rollins College, died in White Plains, New York, on February 24, 1950. Most famous of his voluminous literary works is the novel "Eben Holden," which sold over a quarter of a million copies within a year of its publication in 1900. In 1918 he moved to Winter Park where he was a leading and benign citizen for many years. Mr. Bacheller became a Trustee of the College in 1922, was largely responsible for Dr. Hamilton Holt's coming to the presidency in 1925, and established the chair of creative writing at Rollins. The College held a special service at the Knowles Memorial Chapel on March 12 in his memory.

Judge Thomas Henry Morrow passed away on February 27, 1950. Judge Morrow attended Rollins College 1903-04. A veteran of both World Wars and a United States prosecutor of Japanese war criminals in Tokyo after the second World War, Judge Morrow was named to the Common Pleas bench in 1927 and served until his death.

Elmer E. Brooks, who enrolled at Rollins in the Class of 1953 in January, 1950, died at his home in Sarasota, Florida, on March 4. Funeral services were held in St. Petersburg, Florida.

Richard Meriwether Batchelor passed away on March 17, 1950. Member of one of the pioneer Winter Park families, Mr. Batchelor enrolled at Rollins College in 1919 with the Class of 1923. He is survived by his wife, mother, two sons and a grandson.

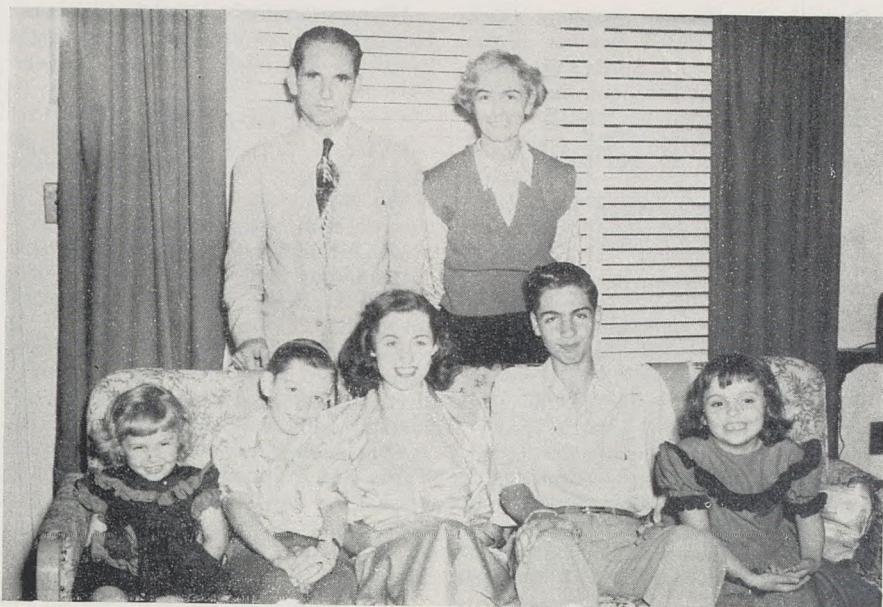

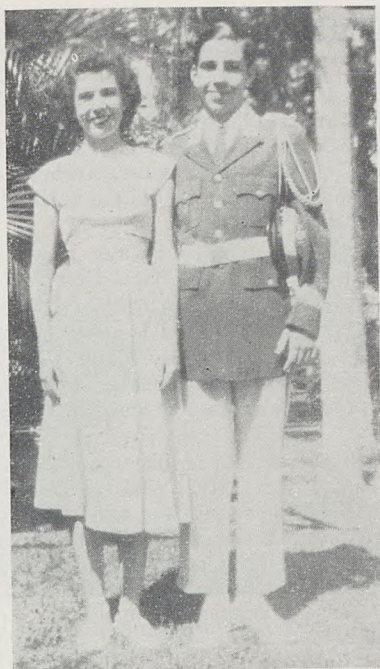

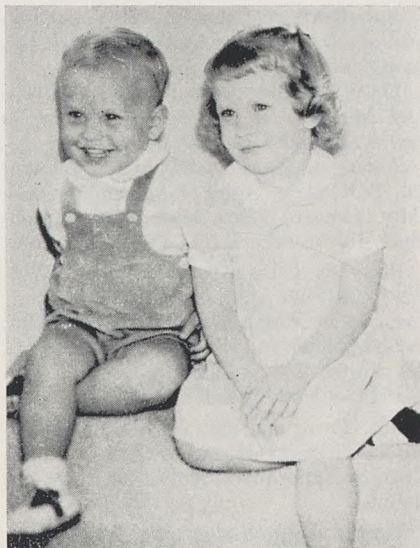
