U. S. PRESIDENT JOINS ROLLINS LUMINARIES

On March 8, Rollins conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Humanities on President Truman. The solemn and impressive ceremony was held at special convocation in Knowles Memorial Chapel, where 13 years before President Roosevelt received the degree of Doctor of Literature.

It was a tribute to the President. But in many ways it became an even greater tribute to Dr. Holt.

"It gives me special pleasure by my presence here to bear witness to the debt which we owe to the man who has guided the destinies of Rollins College for almost a quarter of a century," Mr. Truman declared in his address.

"Since he assumed the presidency . . . he has made it a focal point in our efforts to educate American Youth in the principals of freedom under true Democracy.

"Dr. Holt has brought to his work distinguished leadership with a background of accomplishment in many fields. Although he will soon retire from active academic work, he will continue his labors for peace and international good-will," the President said.

In delivering the public oration during the degree ceremony, Governor Fuller Warren described Mr. Truman as a man who "has already played the role of leader (in) the race issue, the economic issue and the peace issue. They are all fundamentally issues of justice."

The hood was slipped over the President's shoulders by Dean Stone and Dean Enyart. As a symbol of their participation, Prexy passed the honorary diploma to representatives of five other Florida colleges and universities before handing it to President Truman.

Mr. Truman arrived at the Orlando Army Airforce Base at 10:30 a.m. and was cheered by a crowd estimated at 100,000 on his eight-mile trip through Orlando and Winter Park to the college.

Enroute he stopped briefly on Mills Street to dedicate a causeway in honor of the late Senator Charles O. Andrews. After the convocation he was escorted by Prexy and members of Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity to the Walk of Fame where he laid a stone from his boyhood home in Grandview, Mo. He completed his visit with a luncheon at Dr. Holt's home, attended by Governor Warren, Senators Pepper and Holland, Rep. A. S. Herlong Jr., representatives of Florida colleges and universities, Trustees of the College and others.

The convocation in honor of the chief executive was the second held within a month. On February 21, eight distinguished Americans, including Mary McLeod Bethune, founder-president emeritus of the Bethune-Cookman College, were given honorary degrees at the Mid-winter Convocation.

In commenting editorially of Mrs. Bethune's degree, THE NATION said: "It is the first honorary degree ever awarded to a Negro by a white college in the deep South. For seventy-four years old Mrs. Bethune . . . the degree is but a crowning honor in a life of enormous achievement. So the occasion we think, will be remembered even more as an honor to Dr. Holt and Rollins College."

Others receiving degrees were President Karl Taylor Compton of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, who delivered the convocation address, Alfred J. McCartney, director of the Chicago Sunday Evening Club, Serge Koussevitzky, conductor of the Boston Symphony Orchestra, Edward R. Murrow, the radio newscaster, Commander Leonard H. Dyer of Winter Park and Eugene R. Smith and Paul E. Stillman of the Board of Trustees.

To Cynthia Eastwood, assistant to the Dean of the College, and the late Dr. Edwin L. Clark went the Sullivan Medallion, which was awarded by Rollins for the first time posthumously.

The Animated Magazine, published February 20, was one of the most entertaining of the 22 issues.

Contributors included Dr. Compton, Mrs. Bethune, Mr. Murrow, Dr. Koussevitzky, Dr. McCartney, Elbert K. Fretwell, chief scout of Boy Scouts of America, Leo. G. Carroll, Soo Yong Huang and Kathryn Collier Bodkin of the stage, Ross Allen, the Florida naturalist (who milked a rattlesnake of its venom) Rabbi Morris Lazon, Martha Sharp, vice-chairman of Palestine" for rescuing Jewish refugee children, and John Lair, founder of radio's Renfro Valley Settlement.

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NEW COUNCIL RE-ELECTS LAUTERBACH TO PRESIDENCY NAMES JACK HOWDEN 1949 ALUMNI FUND CHAIRMAN

At the annual meeting of the newly-elected Alumni Council on Alumni Day, the following Association Officers were named to serve for the coming year; Henry S. Lauterbach '37, president; P. Richard Kelly '42, vice-president; Frederic H. Ward '21, treasurer; and Aurora McKay '30, executive secretary.

Webber B. Haines '26, Rodman J. Lehman '29, Frances C. Montgomery '41, Mrs. Wendell C. Stone (Marita Stueve '38) and Donald C. Vincent '21 were chosen to serve with the officers of the Alumni Association as the Executive Committee of the Council. Mr. Lehman was elected chairman of this Committee.

Over 100 Rollins Alumni from Florida, Illinois, New York, Maryland, Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, Minnesota and Wisconsin registered at the Alumni House beginning at 8:30 A.M. on February 19. Approximately half of these

arrived in time to attend the annual meeting of the Rollins Alumni Association in the lounge of the Alumni House that morning. Weather conditions in the north prevented Alumni President Hank Lauterbach from reaching Winter Park until early afternoon. He had left Delavan, Wisconsin, by plane the day before and the morning proceedings were delayed pending a final wire from him en route advising that he could not arrive as expected.

Jack Howden, of the 1948-49 Executive Committee of the Alumni Council, was therefore asked to preside at the general business meeting. Results of the recent Council elections by mail ballot, which appear on page 4 of this issue, and the nomination of Webber B. Haines '26 by an overwhelming majority to serve as Alumni Trustee 1949-52 were officially announced. To save time, mimeographed copies of the Treasurer's financial statement for the year had been distributed before the business meeting and Mr. Ward was called on first to discuss the reduced budget under which the Association is trying to operate. Alumni Secretary Aurora McKay reported on regional reunions as well as those at the College, publications, special mailings and other activities carried on during the past year through the Alumni Office. There was a general discussion from the floor of the necessity of better support of the Alumni Fund in order to maintain and develop the Association program and services.

Ray Greene '23 offered a resolution in memory of Dr. Winslow S. Anderson, Dean of Rollins College 1928-42; and the Secretary read a resolution for Dr. Henry B. Mowbray '97 in memory of Mrs. Caroline

Hills Abbott, who was a member of the Rollins Faculty for 15 years between 1887 and 1908. It was unanimously voted to include both resolutions in the minutes of the meetings and send copies to the families of the deceased.

The representative Council met following the general business meeting and elected Franklin L. Williamson '48 to succeed Jack F. Howden '34 as head of the Homecoming Committee next fall. Howden was unanimously chosen 1949 Alumni Fund Chairman.

Chairman Howden's approach to his new duties has been direct and businesslike. He plans to issue a frank statement at an early date to enlist all-out support of the 1949 Alumni Fund.

Referring to the forthright appeal to "Give Us The Tools" in the December issue of THE RECORD, Howden points out that the success of the 1949 Fund can be assured by the increased number of Alumni receiving this quarterly magazine sharing the increased cost of publishing and mailing.

"Let's cooperate," he says, "by every one of us contributing as generously as we can individually!"

NBC BROADCASTS BACH FESTIVAL ON MARCH 5

The National Broadcasting Company presented the initial coast-to-coast broadcast of The Bach Festival Society of Winter Park on March 5 as a community service program. The entire College Choir and many Rollins Alumni have sung in this annual musical event in the Knowles Memorial Chapel during the past 14 years. This was the first time, however, that their singing of the sacred music of Johann Sebastian Bach has been offered to a nation-wide audience.

NBC broadcast a portion of the Saturday Morning Student program from 12:15 to 12:45 P.M. (Eastern Standard Time) with Dr. Christopher O. Honaas, Director of the Rollins Conservatory, again conducting.

YMCA and YWCA groups in 1300 colleges and universities organized young people to listen throughout the United States.

Messages of praise and congratulation began coming in by telegraph and telephone immediately following the broadcast and letters of appreciation are still being received.

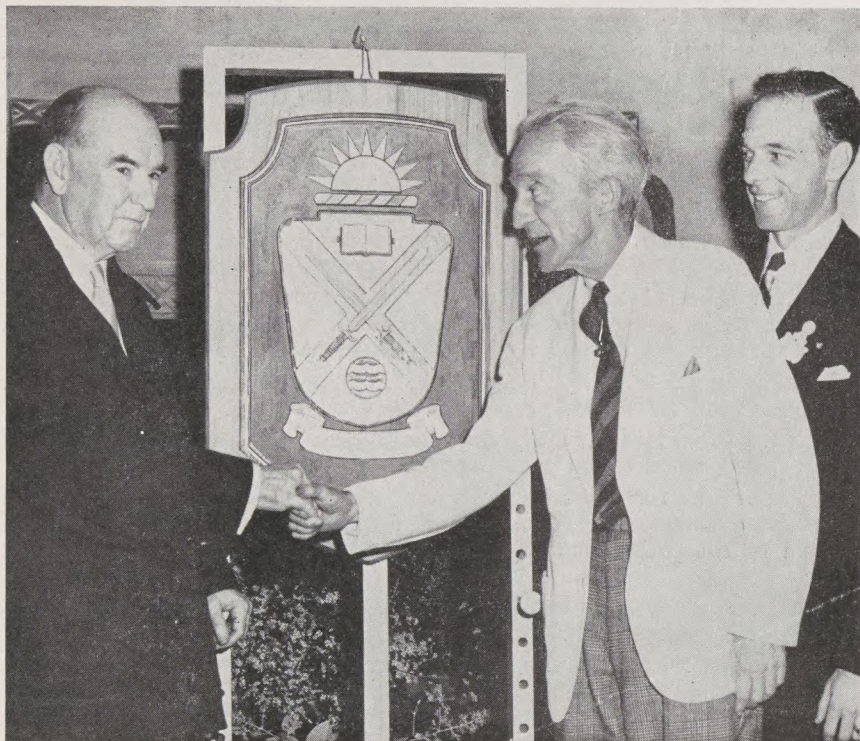
Alfred Greenfield, conductor of the New York Oratorio Society who conducted the Mass in B Minor at the Winter Park Festival in 1946, wired his congratulations and reported the reception excellent there.

Austin Walter, conductor of the Chapel Choir at Rutgers University in New Jersey who also conducted part of the Bach Festival in 1946 while a member of the Rollins Conservatory Faculty, wrote:

"The Broadcast came over superbly this noon. The chorus, organ and orchestra were balanced and blended beautifully. The whole half-hour program was a triumphant success. If the broadcast portion was a sample, then the entire Festival was undoubtedly an overwhelming achievement. What a wonderful thing it is to have this music go out to the nation!"

UNIV. OF N. C. AWARDED ACKLAND ART MUSEUM

On February 3, the U. S. Court of Appeals reversed the decision of a U. S. District Court in Washington, D. C., and ruled that the \$1,250,000 William Hayes Ackland bequest in trust for the establishment and maintenance of an art center in the South go to the University of North Carolina rather than to Rollins College. This case has been in litigation since the death of Mr. Ackland in 1940.

RECORD CROWD ATTENDS ALUMNI LUNCHEON FOR PREXY

In tribute to President Holt, guest of honor, a record-breaking turnout from California to New York thronged the Rollins Center on February 19 for the 1949 Alumni Luncheon during Founders' Week.

The Board of Trustees adjourned their annual meeting on campus to join several hundred Alumni and Faculty with their wives or husbands there.

The original Luncheon table was set up to form an enormous Horse-shoe around the dance floor. But the entire Center had to be filled with additional tables to accommodate the last minute arrivals from out-of-town.

The white clothed tables were appropriately centered with delphinium and yellow spring flowers generously arranged and provided by Miss Loretta Salmon '18, Mrs. Ray Greene (Billie Freeman '27), Miss Helen Steinmetz '04, Mme. Eugenie Grand '33 and Dr. and Mrs. Willard A. Wattles. A miniature fleet of Traveller Palm blooms, ranged to resemble small ships passing in review at the President's table, suggested "Sailing Ahead" as the theme.

Mrs. W. J. Johnson Sr., manager of the Rollins Center, deserves special mention for expert serving of the delicious chicken luncheon. The College colors were featured in the individual cups of fresh orange

juice at each place and napkins printed in blue with "Rollins College, 1885-1949." Hot coffee was served as soon as all guests were seated and again with the fresh apple pie dessert.

George E. Fuller Jr. '39, popular master of ceremonies, began by reading a cordial telegraphed greeting from Alumni President Hank Lauterbach '37. Lauterbach had planned to arrive by plane the day before from Delavan, Wis., but was unavoidably delayed en route by weather conditions. Congratulatory wires from Alumni throughout the Country continued to arrive and were read during the Luncheon.

Remarking on the wonderful representation of Classes from 1890 forward, Fuller asked several at the Gay 90's table provocative questions about their student days at Rollins and was answered wittily.

Saluting the Faculty, he invited Dean Stone, Dean Enyart, Dean Cleveland and Dean Darrah to stand and take bows.

Mr. John Tiedtke, newly-elected treasurer and business manager of Rollins, was asked to say a few words.

Senior Class and Student Council presidents, Joe Friedman and Art Swacker, were introduced next and admirably expressed the wholehearted esteem of the present undergraduate for Dr. Holt and all that he has accomplished at Rollins.

Mrs. Frances Knowles Warren, Trustee, spoke gracefully in appreciation of President Holt.

Speaking for the Alumni, Toastmaster Fuller then turned to Dr. Holt beside him and sincerely thanked him for his selfless devotion to Rollins during his unparalleled 24-year administration. He closed by informing Prexy that a surprise token of this day awaited his unveiling of the velvet-draped easel in front of the great fireplace. Paging Mr. John Rae, former member of the Rollins Art Faculty, Fuller asked him to present the handsome replica of the College coat-of-arms he had painted especially for the event.

Dr. Holt was given an ovation as he accepted the large shield of solid cypress.

When the applause subsided, Prexy thanked everyone for their presence and said with deep humility that he had received far more from Rollins than he had given to the College through the enduring friendships of his colleagues and of former as well as present students.

Mrs. Walter Johnston (Edna Wallace '25) was spontaneously drafted to lead the crowd in a song. And everyone rose in final tribute to sing "Rollins Goes Rolling Along!"

UNKNOWN FRIEND INITIATES HOLT SCHOLARSHIPS

In Memoriam



We are saddened to receive word of the deaths of these former Rollins Associates.

Mrs. Dwight A. Whitaker (Hazel B. Wiley) passed away on November 13, 1948, in Clearwater, Florida. Mrs. Whitaker attended the former Rollins Academy 1903-04. She is survived by her husband, Dwight A. Whitaker '07A and four children.

Dr. Laurence Duggan, Trustee of Rollins College since February, 1947, died on December 20, 1948, in New York City. Dr. Duggan, president of the Institute of International Education, was chairman of the Rollins Trustee Committee on the presidential succession. He received an honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from Rollins in 1947. He is survived by his widow and four children.

Richard (Chubby) Oelkers, Jr., died in Coral Gables, Florida, on December 28, 1948. A member of the class of 1931, he attended Rollins College 1928-29. Richard owned and operated three millinery stores in downtown Miami and was State Representative to the Florida Legislature from 1945 until his death. He is survived by: his wife, Camille Beach Oelkers '30; their daughter, Camille; and son, Richard 3rd; his parents, and a sister.

Richard Parker Hollister passed away in Rye, New York, on January 6, 1949. Dick attended Rollins 1946-48, and was graduated from Middlebury College. His parents, two brothers and a sister survive him.

Mrs. James Lees Laidlaw (Harriet Burton) died in New York City on January 25, 1949. Rollins conferred the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws on her in 1930. Mrs. Laidlaw was a leader for more than forty years in woman suffrage, civic reform and international cooperation. She is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Dana Converse Backus.

On February 7, 1949, Dr. Thomas Pearce Bailey passed away in Winter Park. Dr. Bailey was appointed to the Faculty in 1926 as the first known professor of Ethology (practical psychology of character) in the history of American colleges and universities. Dr. Bailey became professor emeritus of philosophy, psychology and ethology in 1944. Survivors include his wife, two sons, two daughters, a brother and two sisters.

Mr. John Powers died February 11, 1949. Mr. Powers attended the former Rollins Academy 1891-93 with the class of 1896. He is survived by a daughter, Mrs. Fred W. Diehl (Joyce Powers '40), of Miami.

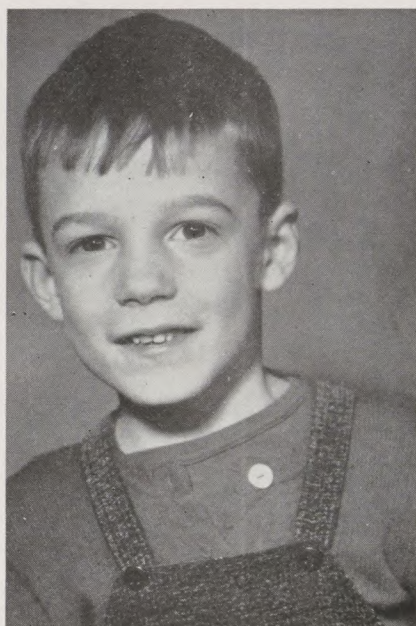

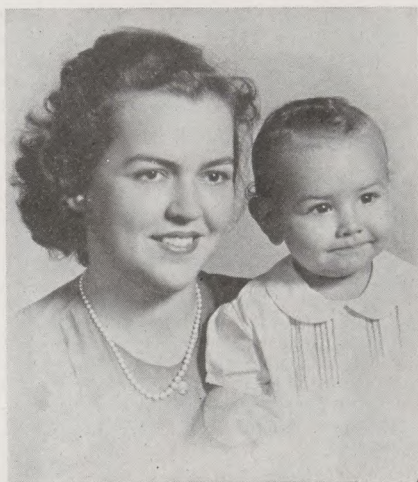

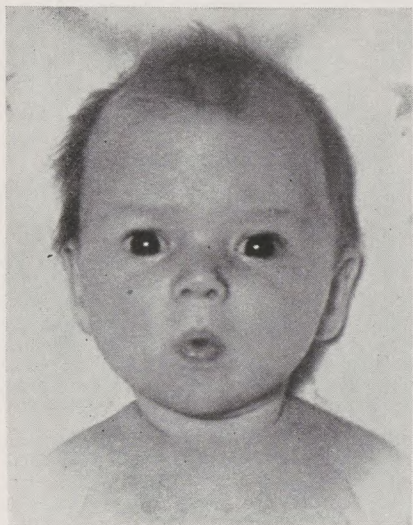
