# \$500,000 Library Gift Challenge to Rollins

I know all of you are just as excited and happy as we on the Rollins campus about the conditional grant of \$500,000 by the Davella Mills Foundation for the construction of a new library building and its equipment.

As you know the grant is contingent on our reaching the \$575,000 goal of the Victory Expansion program by Commencement Day, June 4, 1947. It's a challenge to the entire Rollins family but we will meet this one as we have met every challenge of the past.

For whom does the Rollins College Library exist? It exists for all of the Rollins family. As members of that family you are entitled to full library privileges. You may charge books for home use just as when you were undergraduates and there is no fee for the service. If you have questions or problems which might be solved through the use of library sources, write to Mr. Tollefson, our librarian, and he and his staff will do their best to help you. If there are books or pamphlets which you need and which your local library does not have, he will send them to you. There is no set time on the circulation of these materials unless they are in demand, and we ask only that you pay postage charges.

And in return you can help. Recently, Dorothy Wilson '45, gave 1,000 books to the library. Other alumni have made similar gifts.

Through your continued loyalty and good will we can make it one of the finest in the South.

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## INSTITUTE OF WORLD GOVERNMENT AT ROLLINS

Rollins' contribution to the cause of an enduring peace, so notably and effectively begun last March by the Conference on world government, is being continued and increased in scope by the activities of an Institute of World Government, which was set up, under the direction of Dr. Rudolph Von Abele, at the opening of the fall term. This Institute is undertaking a comprehensive program whose important features are: the offering of courses on problems of world federation, the circulation of the Rollins Appeal of March, 1946, the collection of a reference library relating to world government, and the presentation of panel discussions and important speakers to the citizens of central Florida. Dr. Vernon Nash, director of field work for World Federalists, USA, visited Orlando and Winter Park in mid-November, giving several addresses at Rollins, Orlando, and Winter Garden. World Government was Dr. Holt's main theme in a chapel address on October 20. Dr. Von Abele has spoken on the subject before Rotary clubs in Orlando and Cocoa. The Institute will intensify this work as the year goes on, and hopes to make a real contribution to the establishment of a world government in the near future. George C. Holt, who was director of the March conference on world government, is now state representative in Connecticut for World Federalists, USA.

Alumni who wish to know how they can aid in the Institute's work are urged to communicate with Dr. Von Abele.

## HOMECOMING REUNION

Radio and press carried U. S. Weather Bureau warnings when a hurricane threatened the middle of that week, but Rollins alumni gathered nearly 300 strong for our first postwar Homecoming Day on October 11th and Victory Reunion Week-End. It is reputed to be the largest gathering of out-of-state alumni in Rollins history.

Celebration started with Coach Jack McDowall inviting all 'Has-Been' R Men to come out to the Harper-Shepherd practice field and meet the 1946 Tars in the afternoon and a student Pep Rally around a bonfire on the campus shores of Lake Virginia the night before our first football game since the war.

Over 200 alumni attended the pre-game dinner at Orlando's Orange Court Hotel honoring Arthur Delano Enyart, No. 1 Tar Fan and beloved Dean of Men, since his return to Rollins in 1930. Robert Hayes, president of our Alumni Association, presented the college with an oil portrait of Dean Enyart, as a token of the affection and gratitude of 25 former men students for his human understanding, friendly counsel and continuing wise influence. One of Enyart's Men, Eugene Coleman, who was commissioned to paint him, unveiled the picture and the assemblage broke into spontaneous applause. Dr. Holt cleverly took off the pomp of formal academic occasions in accepting the



gift for the college. Dean Enyart then spoke from a full heart and there were eyes that filled with his at the individual memories.

With precision timing, a motorcade left under police escort for the Greater Orlando Stadium to arrive before the kick-off. Rollins bowed to Geo. Washington University, but the 13-0 score does not tell the thrills of the contest that memorable night. Our all World War II veteran team showed potential power but it was sporadic and a Tar touchdown, early in the second period, was recalled on a penalty.

Everett Roberts presented a colorful array of 7 high school bands on the field at the half. Brightly uniformed and led by high stepping majorettes the following bands participated: Orlando Sr. High, Winter Park, Orlando's Memorial-Cherokee Jr. Highs (combined), Kissimmee, St. Cloud, Leesburg and Avon Park. Prof. "Reilly" Jones was in his element marshalling the event.

An all college dance after the game by the Student Council, with alumni as honor guests, brought a full day to an enjoyable close. The effective use of songs and silhouettes of the decades since the founding of Rollins for decoration added much to the merriment of the occasion. Other games and years were happily recalled that night.

Campus-wide Open House was held on Saturday afternoon for informal gatherings of former students at the Alumni and fraternity houses, as well as individual tours of college improvements.

Our Victory Week-End closed appropriately with a Sunday morning service at the Knowles Memorial Chapel, dedicated to the 26 Rollins alumni who died in World War II. Robert Robertson '34, Charlotte Stienhans '30, Ira Yopp, Jr., '44, and Nonita Cuesta '46 were the readers; Hazel Darlington Yarborough '29 sang the Offertory; and all former members were invited to sing with the Chapel Choir. A Moment of Silence was observed and Dean Henry M. Edmonds gave the sermon. The flowers were placed on the altar in memory of Lt. L. Maxwell Harrington '38.

## *Around The Horseshoe*

Rollins college opened its sixty-second year, September 29, 1946. On that day, as in previous years, the freshmen were met by an upperclassmen Welcoming Committee, and were given a hectic time during their orientation into the Rollins Family. Along with arranging schedules and meeting house-mothers and roommates, the freshmen had the memorable experience of an afternoon trip to Sanlando.

Classes began Thursday, October 4, and among the new faces were sixteen new professors. Everyone became actively aware of the record enrollment of 593.

The post-war Rollins football season officially opened Thursday night, October 10, with a bonfire and pep rally in honor of the tilt between the "Tars" and George Washington University.

One of the most important social functions of the year took place October 11, when Dean Enyart was honored by over 200 alumni in the Orange Court Hotel at a pre-game dinner, which was the initial event of the Homecoming Week-end.

The "Tar" defeat of 13-0 was somewhat off-set by the enjoyment of a post-game dance at the Orange Court hotel that was given by the Student Council, and to which alumni were invited.

The Homecoming week-end kept its pace, when a total of sixty-four teas were given by the seven sororities and the independent group in honor of the new women students.

Thursday night, October 17, football once again took the spotlight at Rollins. Paced by Hansen and Peacock, Rollins downed Stetson 20-0.

Activities took a more serious trend, when the Matriculation Convocation exercises were held Monday, November 4, at the Knowles Memorial Chapel. President Holt delivered a message announcing that Rollins had received a grant of \$500,000 for a new library and its equipment on condition that the college successfully complete its \$575,000 Victory Expansion program by commencement day, June, 1947.

On November 8, the campus was buzzing with the excitement of freshmen elections. A run-off on November 15, gave Bill Shafer the presidency and Harry Hancock vice-presidency. Dot Nolan is the new secretary-treasurer.

The "Tars" traveled Saturday, November 9, to Pensacola Naval Air Station. The "Gosling" eleven handed Rollins its second defeat of the season 20-14. On Saturday, November 16, the "Tars" again tangled with Stetson, winning 19-0.

On Wednesday evening, November 29, day students and their parents were guests of the student deans at an informal reception in the student center, to meet members of the college administration and the students' faculty advisors.

Next on the Rollins football schedule was the experienced and cocky Ohio Wesleyan "Battling Bishop" squad, which Rollins defeated 21-13, on Friday, November 22.

The first play of the season was Thorton Wilder's "Our Town", an all student production which was presented November 27, 29, and 30, in the Fred Stone theatre under the direction of Mr. Donald S. Allen.

### MORE NEW FACULTY

The enrolment of nearly 600 students at Rollins this year made additional faculty necessary if the personalized teaching of the Conference Plan was to be maintained. Ten new faculty members were announced in the ALUMNI RECORD in September. Seven more are listed in this issue.

DR. DAVID MIERS BEIGHTS, Professor of Business Administration, was both Professor and Head of the Accounting Department at the University of Florida for 10 years prior to coming to Rollins. He holds a B.A. degree from the University of Colorado and M.S. and Ph.D. from the University of Illinois. His previous experience includes one summer (1942) as Chief Accountant for the Rent Division of OPA in Washington, D. C., and he has taught at the University of Illinois, Marshall College in Huntington, W. Va., University of Texas and the University of Colorado. He is a Certified Public Accountant.

DONALD CARLISLE GREASON, Assistant Professor of Art, studied at the Academie Colarossi in Paris and the A.E.F. Art Training Center in Bellevue, France. A member of the New Jersey Cavalry during World War I, he painted abroad afterwards. He has been Resident Instructor at Phillips Academy in Andover, and Resident Artist at Deerfield Academy, in Massachusetts. Formerly director of the Artist's Gallery in New York City, he is a member of the Art Students League of New York. He is well known for his paintings of the Boston Symphony Orchestra and series on athletics for Harvard University.

FLORA LINDSAY MAGOUN, Assistant Professor of Business Education, holds a B.A. degree from Wellesley College, M.A. from Columbia University, and was Director of the Greater Boston Student Aid Survey, under the Harmon Foundation, Inc., of New York. She has been both former Assistant in Charge of the Art Library here and Executive Secretary at the Rollins Conservatory of Music. During the war years, Mrs. Magoun was secretary to the Commanding Officer and librarian of the Anti Aircraft Artillery Group at the Army Air Forces station in Orlando, Fla.

CAROLINE BAUMAN WHITAKER, Assistant Professor of English, has taught at Michigan State College and high schools in New Jersey and Bremerton, Washington. She received her B.A. degree at the University of Akron, M.A. at Northwestern University and has done graduate work at Western Reserve. She and her husband, William B. Whitaker (Associate Professor of Speech announced in our September issue), are Resident Heads of the Park Avenue Annex for overflow veteran housing.

PAUL EDWARD FENLON, Instructor in Economics and Business Administration, served for three and one half years with the U. S. Army as orientation lecturer under I. and E. Program and taught business management and allied subjects at Battalion School in Austria. He has a B.S. degree from Holy Cross College and has done graduate work at the University of Illinois, Boston University and L'Universite de Nancy in France.

CHARLES GORDON REX, Instructor in Music, received his B.M. and B.A. degrees at Rollins in 1946. He was awarded the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallion at June Commencement.

DR. ROBERT ERNEST HUME, visiting Professor of History of Religions for the Fall Term, was born in Ahmednagar, Bombay Presidency, India. Dr. Hume received his B.A., M.A., and Ph.D. degrees at Yale; his

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## DR. HANNA WRITES COLORFUL BIOGRAPHY

Dr. A. J. (Fred) Hanna '17, in his well documented and precise style, has brought to life as bizarre a character as ever called Florida home in his new book "*A Prince in Their Midst*" (University of Oklahoma Press 1946).

Achille Murat (1801-1847), son of Napoleon's youngest sister and Joachim Murat, King of Naples, and husband of a great grandniece of George Washington, in his eccentric span of existence was prince, pauper, emigrant, pioneer, plantation owner, philosopher, promoter, speculator, debtor, world traveler, author, revolutionary, aristocrat, democrat, diplomat, politician, lawyer, judge, Catholic, Mason, roue, duelist, soldier, settler and wanderer. In only two matters could he have been said to be consistent: his dislike of water taken internally or externally, and his love of self. His own words "I have spent the best years of my life in misery running after a shade of fortune which will, perhaps, never be realized . . ." were prophetically true if one were to judge his measure of success by his own standards and not the intangible standard of having led a full and interesting life. As Dr. Hanna says of Murat: "The American trait of being ever on the move, avid for new sights and experiences, was a trait he never had to learn; it was his by nature." The character delineated by the author is so interesting that Murat's own opinion of himself as a failure in material matters fades into insignificance. Dr. Hanna is to be commended in not incorporating in his pages certain of the more unauthenticated old-wives tales about Achille's eccentricities such as his asserted near approach to cannibalism; and his experimentations in chemistry which allegedly led to the tinting of all his wife's clothes pink.

As an author, writing for an eager European public about American democracy and customs, Achille attained his highest measure of personal success. Indeed, his Freudian account of an early American "Camp Meeting" incorporated in the book should have set at rest any doubts as to the existence of "Twelfth Nights" in the new republic. Dr. Hanna, as in his successful recent book "Flight into Oblivion," has continued to make American history readable and enjoyable by meticulous attention to the fact that it is men and the character of men that make history. The lovely illustrations of John Rae serve all the more to make this excellent book delightful reading.

B.D. at Union Theological Seminary; matriculated in the University of Göttingen, Germany; and his D.Theol. in Strasbourg. Ordained a Congregational minister, he returned to India as missionary A.B.C.F.M. He was Professor of History of Religions at Union Theological Seminary, 1914-43, and has been professor emeritus there since then. He has lectured at Bombay University, University of the Punjab, Hindu University at Benares, the Moslem University at Aligarh, Greater India University at Bolpur, College of His Highness the Maharajah of Baroda, and the Indian Institute of Oxford University. He is a member of the American Oriental Society, American Theological Society (president 1939), American Association for Advancement of Science, and Phi Beta Kappa. His writings include: *The World's Living Religions*, *Treasure House of the Living Religions*, and *Thirteen Principal Upanishads*, with an Outline of the Philosophy of the Upanishads. He is also a contributor to religious and theological journals both in India and America. According to WHO'S WHO IN AMERICA, Dr. Hume's book, *The World's Living Religions*, is the only religious book beside the *Bible* to be placed in "time capsule" (50 feet below ground), at the 1939 New York World's Fair, to be opened in 6939.

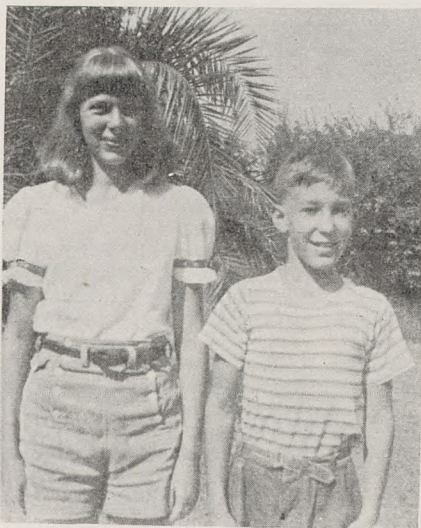

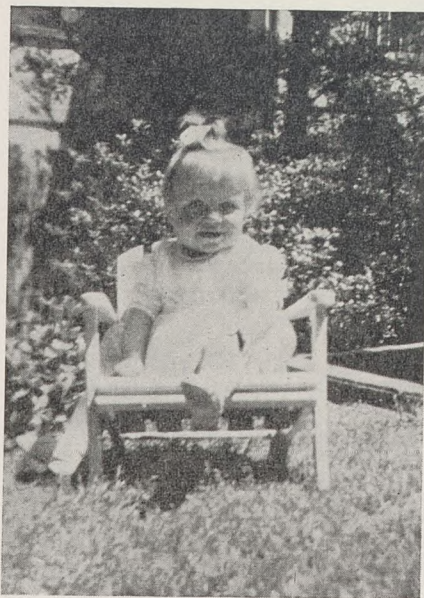

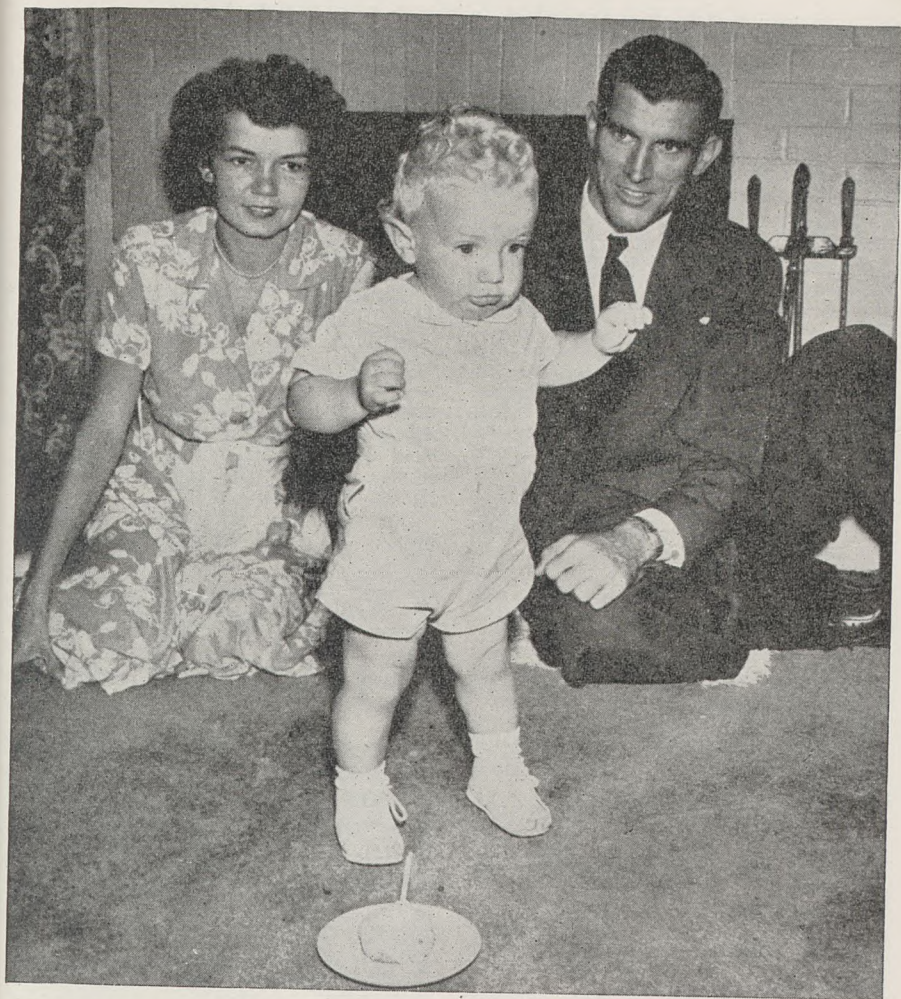
