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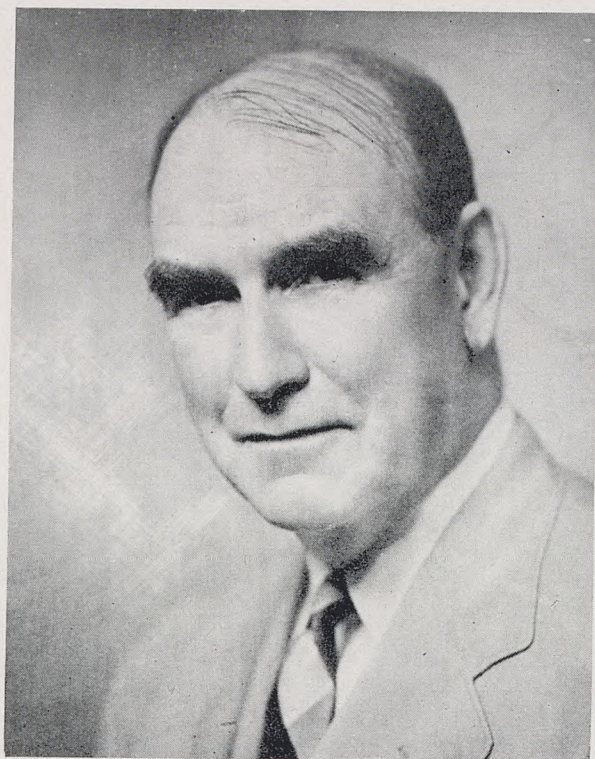

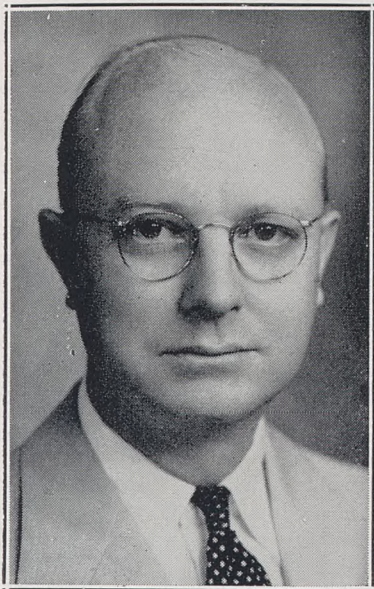

ADMISSIONS

The alumni deserve an explanation of the reluctant but persistent "no's" which have been given to students you have recommended.

By late fall of 1945 it became apparent that we would reach capacity for 1946 by late January. Applications outran our expectations but we postponed the selection of the class of 1946 until mid-March in order to give the most desirable applicants a chance. After that date we "closed shop" and allowed the already long waiting list to multiply geometrically. When cancellations occurred we selected the most promising applicants from our waiting list and thus the long awaited Natural Selection came into its own.

There was one exception to this general method: We felt obligated to readmit our own service men. It was this factor which caused the Trustees in the late spring to allow the enrollment to go above the ideal limit of 500 stu-

dents. They set an upper limit of 550 for the total enrollment for 1946-47. We have struggled to adhere to this limit because if it is exceeded we will have to pitch tents on the horseshoe, allow classes to go above twenty, and throw the conference method out of the window.

We have secured new faculty to balance this increase so that we believe we can hold the line in 1946. If we continue to bombard you with "no's" we are sure that you will understand and sympathize with our predicament.

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NEW FACULTY

Keeping pace with the Rollins Victory Expansion to handle a capacity student enrollment the following additional faculty has been appointed.

DR. C. WENDELL KING, Assistant Professor of Sociology, graduated from Yale in 1940 with a B. A. degree, received his master's in 1941 and his doctor of philosophy degree in 1944. Instructor in sociology at Yale since 1943, he is a member of the American Sociological society. His article, "Social Cleavage in a New England Community", was published in the spring issue of *Social Forces*.

DR. PAUL G. TRUEBLOOD, Assistant Professor of English, comes here from the faculty of Stockton Junior College, California, having previously taught modern literature at the University of Idaho. He graduated from Willamette University with a bachelor of arts degree in 1928, received his master of arts in 1930 and Ph.D. in 1935 from Duke University. He has had numerous essays, reviews and poems published in scholarly periodicals. Last year his critique of Lord Byron's *Don Juan* was published and he has recently completed a historical novel of pioneer Oregon dealing with Jesse Applegate.

WILBUR DORSETT, Instructor in Theatre Arts, is a graduate of the University of North Carolina where he received his master of arts degree in 1936. He has had 10 years of experience in the theatre, having held the Rockefeller fellowship in playwriting and served as assistant to Samuel Seldon, now director of the Carolina Playmakers. Appointed to the dramatic faculty of the University of North Carolina Women's College in 1938, he was also an assistant director of the Play-likers. He is a World War II veteran.

W. B. WHITAKER, Assistant Professor of Speech, received his B. E. degree from Teachers College, St. Cloud, Minnesota, in 1932. He has taught speech and dramatics at Michigan State College. Recently he was released by the U. S. Navy with the rank of Lt. Commander.

BOIT LINCOLN BRANNEN, Assistant Professor of Psychology, has a B. S. degree from Tufts College and a M. E. from the Harvard Graduate School. He most recently served as a psychometrist with the Rhode Island State Department of Social Welfare and as school and Veterans Rehabilitation Program psychologist at Gloucester, Massachusetts. From 1942-44 he served as instructor in electricity at the New England Aircraft School under AATFC. In 1944 he was invited to Harvard as a Bigelow Teaching Fellow in Psychology. He also served as research learning consultant with the Massachusetts State Child Hygiene Department.

ROBERT BURTON KLEINHANS, Assistant Professor of Biology, holds a B. A. degree from Adelbert College and a M. A. from Western Reserve University. He has been: assistant in biology at Adelbert, Flora Stone Mather and Cleveland Colleges; Department Head in Biology at Athens College, in Athens, Greece (1934-36); with the American Gas Assn. and Old Trail School in Akron, Ohio (1937-41); with the rank of Lt. Commander, he was instructor in Chemistry at the U. S. Naval Academy at Annapolis (1941-46); and served in the Allied Mission for Observing Greek Elections in 1946. While at Annapolis he taught Spanish and Russian in the Language Department, was Examiner for Greek Interpreters; Battalion football coach; and a contributor to the *U. S. N. A. Chemical Laboratory Manual*.

RUDOLPH RADAMA VON ABELE of Harrington Park N. J., Director of the new institute of World Government at Rollins will also offer courses.

RALPH HUNTLEY, who will teach science, holds a degree from Oberlin and has done graduate study at the University of Minnesota. He comes to Rollins from Pomfret School. His wife, VICTORIA HUTSON HUNTLEY, will teach art. She was Assistant Professor of Fine Arts at the College of Industrial Arts in Denton, Texas, 1921-23; taught art at Birch Wathen School; was resident teaching artist at Redding Ridge School for Boys, 1939-41, and Pomfret School, 1942-46. Elected an Associate Member of the National Academy of Design, she is also a member of the National Mural Decorator's Society, American Artist Group and a life member of the Art Student's League. Her prints are in collections at the Whitney Museum of Art, Metropolitan Museum, Boston Museum of Fine Arts, Cleveland and Houston Museums, Chicago Art Institute, Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, N. Y. Public Library and Library of Congress.

DR. JOSEPH LOUIS STECHER, recently returned to civilian practice in Winter Park, will be Infirmary Physician. He is a graduate of the University of Maryland College of Medicine and was released by the army with the rank of Lt. Colonel.

EVERETT LEE ROBERTS, back from military service, will be Bandmaster and Instructor in Brass at the Conservatory. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his work in the Philippines and Japan. Mr. Roberts graduated from Rollins in 1935 with a B. M. degree.

WRITING ROLLINS

Orville Prescott of the N. Y. Times in reviewing Dr. Nathan Comfort Starr's book, *The Dynamics Of Literature*, says: "He has tried to evaluate what makes literature great. But he has also tried to add to the average reader's understanding of literary techniques and standards so he can participate properly in the fusion of two creative imaginations necessary for literary communication. Creative reading, he believes, requires constant alertness, a receptivity to emotion, an intellectual understanding of literary methods and a scale of literary values. His explanation of the function, of the mechanics, of poetry and fiction are simple and extremely useful. More important is his outline of his critical credo: Literature should both delight and instruct, not dogmatically, but in the sense of widening experience and increasing understanding. *The Dynamics Of Literature*, in spite of its pretentious title, is a short and a good book." Dr. Starr is professor of English and chairman of the English division at Rollins.

Dr. A. J. Hanna, Professor of History and director of Inter-American Studies at Rollins, has written a biography of Achille Murat, nephew of Napoleon who lived in Florida for a quarter of a century. It is being published this month by the Oklahoma Press under the title of *A Prince In Their Midst*.

Guthrie Burton writes delightfully of Winter Park and Rollins in her *Three Parts Scotch*. Wife of the late Dr. Richard Burton, distinguished U. S. literary scholar and Rollins faculty member, she says: "He had as fine students at Rollins as he had ever been privileged to teach."

"The faculty were scholars of wide tastes and achievements." "The beauty (of Knowles Chapel) is almost indescribable." "Veteran theatre goers from all over the country express high praise." (Annie Russell Theatre).

Good Housekeeping, nationally known magazine, claimed Frances Perpenete Wright '37 as their "happy discovery" when they published her first short story *Louise* in June. They go on to say: "She majored in English at Rollins College, edited the college magazine, wrote verse and stories in typical undergraduate profusion. While there she won a national short story contest sponsored by Golden Book Magazine . . ."

Stella Weston Tuttle '30 has not only had poetry in the March Saturday Evening Post and June Ladies Home Journal but will appear in print again in the October issue of the last named magazine as well as the December Good Housekeeping.

In Memoriam

Ray Stannard Baker, distinguished man of letters, died at his home in Amherst, Mass., on July 12. Personal friend of President Woodrow Wilson, he was his official biographer. For this celebrated work, in 8 volumes, he was awarded the Pulitzer Prize in 1940. Author of 27 volumes under 14 titles, published under his real name, he was equally known for the 9 books issued under the pen name of David Grayson. Graduate of Michigan State College, he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws from that institution. Amherst and Duke University honored him with Litt. D. degrees. In February, 1937, he was the recipient of the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallion at Rollins. A winter resident of Winter Park for many years, he appeared in a number of issues of The Animated Magazine.

W. Hamilton Johnson, died on June 15, 1946, while attending his fiftieth reunion at Vanderbilt. He and Stuart V. R. Hooker were the first male students to receive degrees from Rollins, being fellow graduates in 1893. B.E. and M.E. degrees were later conferred on Mr. Johnson at Vanderbilt. At the time of his death, he was the retired head of the Louisiana State University department of mechanical engineering, having taught there for many years. He was a member of Phi Beta Kappa and Rollins bestowed the Decoration of Honor on him in 1939.

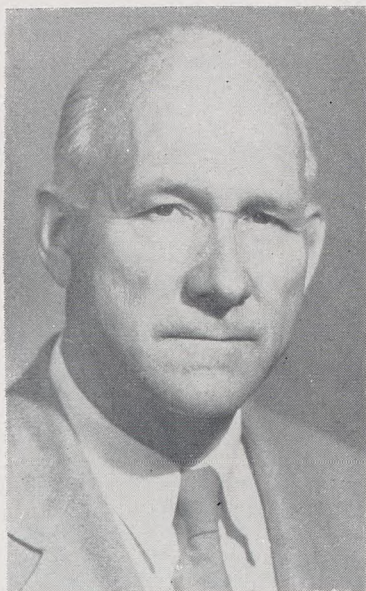
Mrs. Margaret (Hunter) Collicutt, charter student, passed away on June 7, 1946, in the Orlando General Hospital, at the age of 80.

Word was received this summer of the death of Albert Warren Akers, Nashville attorney, on April 1, 1946. Mr. Akers entered the Academy at Rollins in 1887.

Rev. Robert Benedict passed away in August. He attended the Rollins Academy in 1890-93, and was always a loyal alumnus.

Their memories will be honored at the Annual Memorial Vesper Service in Knowles Chapel next February.

JUDGE DONALD A. CHENEY JOINS THE ROLLINS STAFF



Rollins welcomes Donald A. Cheney, (A'07), who has been a member of the Board of Trustees since 1923, as special assistant to President Hamilton Holt.

Mr. Cheney first became connected with Rollins when he entered the academy in 1903, graduating in 1907. He later obtained his bachelor of arts degree from Dartmouth College.

One of Orlando's outstanding civic leaders, he was judge of Juvenile Court in Orange county from 1921 to 1933. He was instrumental in establishing the first parental home and school in Florida for local custodian care of dependent and delinquent children. For several years he was also general secretary of the Orange County Y.M.C.A., was first president of the Orange County Juvenile council, and was a member of the board of governors and

treasurer of the Orange County Hospital association.

Mr. Cheney has the distinction of answering the first football call issued by Rollins. A backfield star, he scored the touchdown in 1906 that gave Rollins its only victory in history over the University of Florida. He also played four years of football at Dartmouth.

During the war Mr. Cheney was field director of the American Red Cross, with services to the armed forces, at Drew Field, Camp Murphy and the Orlando Army Air Base.

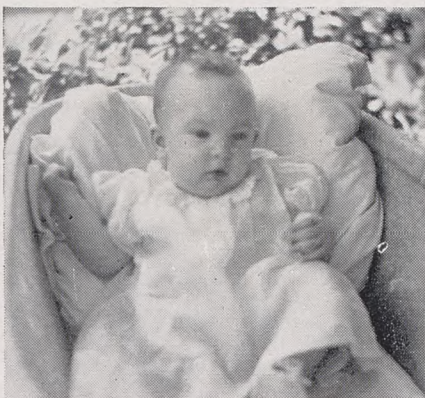
