FOUNDERS' WEEK CONVOCATION

The recipients of all honors at the Convocation on February 26th were faculty, staff or trustees. This was in keeping with President Holt's wish that the celebration of the 60th anniversary of the College and his own 20th anniversary be kept "within the family".

Before making any awards, President Holt announced that in order to qualify for an honor, the person must have been at Rollins at least ten years, must have received no other honor from Rollins or any other college, and must not have any Doctor's degree either earned or honorary.

Edwin Granberry and Willard Wattles received the degree of Doctor of Literature. In his citation President Holt said in part: "Edwin Granberry, prize-winning novelist and playwright, back yard agriculturist, zoologist, and ornithologist, you have already made a name for yourself beyond the Rollins campus second to no other member of the faculty". Willard Wattles indicated in his who's who that when he was young he turned under 100 acres of Kansas prairie behind a team of five mules. He believes this experience has given him valuable insight into the moods of college presidents and Rollins students and therefore it is the mules that should be decorated and not himself.

Helen Moore and Herman Siewert were honored with the degree of Doctor of Music. The citation for Helen Moore said "beloved and accomplished musician, brilliant concert pianist, efficient teacher, you are a woman endowed with the highest professional and personal qualities". For Herman Siewert President Holt said, in part, "no member of the Rollins faculty has been more cooperative in all the common tasks that have to be performed in a college than you."

Four alumni were honored at the Convocation: Fred Hanna, '17, Bernice C. Shor, '24, Fred Ward, '21 and Thomas W. Lawton, '03. In giving Fred Hanna the Doctor of Humanities degree President Holt said it is for "your indefatigable services to Rollins College in virtually every one of her activities, for your competence as an executive, for your scholarship as a student of history, and best of all, for your undeviating loyalty to Rollins College and her ideals." T. W. Lawton was given the degree of Doctor of Pedagogy for "your distinguished professional record as an educator and for your personal life of public-spirited service." Bernice Shor and Fred Ward received the Rollins Decoration of Honor.

Other recipients of the Decoration of Honor were Ellen V. Apperson and Mrs. Georgia E. Enwright, housemothers, Chloe M. Lyle, Cashier of the College, Anna B. Treat, Registrar, Donald S. Allen, Associate Professor of Theatre Arts, Mrs. Antonia Gonzales Lamb, Associate Professor of Spanish, and Audrey L. Packham, Associate Professor of Education.

BOOK REVIEW

SONNETS ON IDENTITY, by Carolyn Naught Saxton. *Wagon and Star Publishers Box 21, Bijou (Lake Tahoe) California.* 20 pages, 50 cents.

Carolyn Naught has added the Saxton to her name since she was with us here in Rollins, with Richard Burton and Jessie Rittenhouse, in days that seem longer ago than they are since they were before Pearl Harbor. Those who knew her then will possess the clues, or some of them, to this group of 24 solidly constructed sonnets, that wear the unmistakable impression of reality. And so one reads the riddle, delicate, lovely, intense, imperishable. "Let Merlin stand, his magic like a broom Sweeping the clouds along." I return again and again to a reading of these sonnets.

"Look to the sky, nor turn your head in shame
For having sought to live in magnitude
Who are tremendous in your solitude . . ."

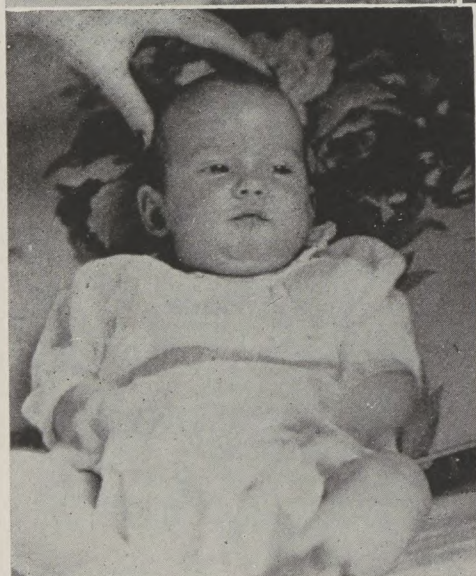
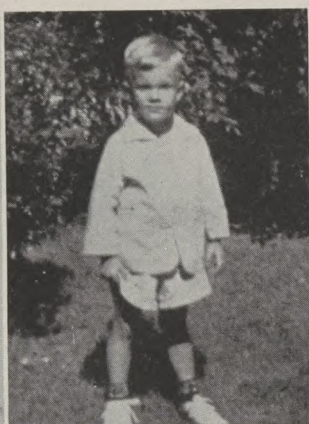
Ralph Tourtellotte has accepted a call to become Director of Physical Education at the Williamsport, Pennsylvania Y.M.C.A.

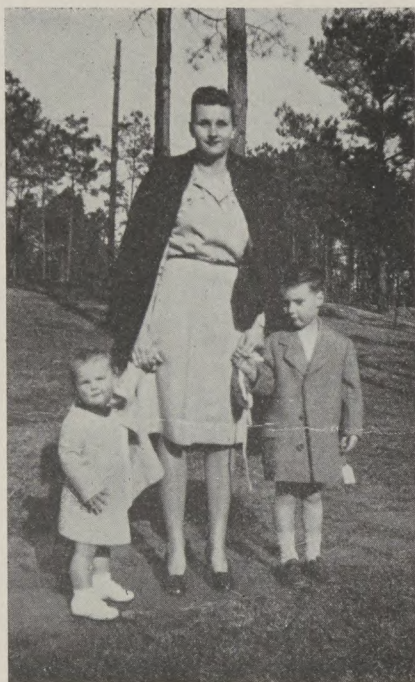
