Around the Horseshoe

ROLLINS WAR SERVICE

Few people realize that Rollins has been engaged in specific war service since 1939. At that time the Civilian Pilot Training Program was inaugurated. When war was declared, this program was put on a full-time basis and only members of the Army or Navy Reserve could qualify. Many of the men are now full-fledged Army or Navy pilots.

In August, 1943, Rollins College, in cooperation with Stetson, was assigned an Army STAR unit. Stetson classified the trainees; Rollins offered refresher courses in the sciences, language and physical education. The STAR contract with the Government is terminated as of March 20. The reason for the termination of the contract is the general decision to curtail the whole AST program. It has been indicated, however, that Rollins maintained one of the finest units in the Fourth Service Command.

Rollins has also conducted evening courses for AAFSAT personnel and their families which have proved popular and useful.

WAR TIME COMMENCEMENT

For the first time in its history, the College had commencement exercises in December. Six seniors completed their work under the accelerated program and were granted their degrees in a brief service held in the Chapel during one assembly period. Although there was no speech, everyone was dressed in full academic regalia and a procession was held. The graduates were: Phyllis Baker Cashore, daughter of Mayor and Mrs. R. C. Baker of Winter Park, Barbara Brown Peddicord, daughter of Treasurer and Mrs. E. T. Brown, Erma Van Gilder Pugh of Lakewood, Ohio and wife of Samuel Pugh, x'44, Sarah Macfarland Yopp of Orlando and wife of Ira Yopp, x'44, Walter Beard of Winter Park and A/S James Richard Sewell of Winter Park. Sewell received his degree in absentia, for work completed under the Navy V-12 program at another college. Beard and Sewell earned the Bachelor of Science degree and the others were all Bachelor of Arts degrees.

ACADEMIC HONORS

At the Commencement service the Fraternity and Sorority scholarship trophies for 1942-1943 were awarded. Pi Beta Phi won the sorority cup and Phi Delta Theta the fraternity cup.

Each year 600 leading universities and colleges in the United States select the names of their students for inclusion in the official "Who's Who among Students in American Universities and Colleges". Students are selected on the basis of high scholarship, academic achievement and leadership in campus activities. Only seniors are chosen. The Rollins seniors elected this year are: Walter C. HONORS FOR ROLLINS GRADUATES

Two of the College's newest graduates Walter Beard and John Bistline, have been awarded, as a result of their work at Rollins, excellent positions at the Metallurgical Laboratory of the University of Chicago. Both are research positions doing confidential war work. Walter was graduated in December with a Bachelor of Science degree in Chemistry. He has already begun his work at Chicago. John, the son of Adelaide Niemeyer Bistline, '10, was graduated this month with a Bachelor of Science degree in Physics.

John M. (Red) Harris, also a March graduate, won a fellowship to Oberlin College. He left the campus on March first. Red will be a graduate assistant in Chemistry, will teach the Oberlin Navy V-12 unit and will also work towards his Master's Degree in Chemistry. Red's home is in Clearwater, Florida.

FOUNDERS' WEEK ACTIVITIES

The traditional Founders' Week activities were held in simplified war style. Alumni Day was on Saturday, February 19th. The Alumni Association meeting was held at 2 o'clock in the afternoon with Frances Daniel, Association President presiding. She introduced Marita Stueve, Acting Alumni Secretary. Again, because not enough nomination ballots were returned by the alumni, candidates for officers' position and for the Council were presented by a nominating committee. The following were elected to serve for 1944. Miss Frances Daniel, re-elected Association President; Katharine Lewis Lehman, Vice-President; Marita Stueve, Acting Alumni Secretary and Frederic H. Ward, Treasurer. Members of the Council chosen were: Jack Carter, '36, Manley Duckworth, '32, Isabel Greene Tanner, '28 and Virginia McCall Shaw, '35.

Wendell C. Stone, Dean of the College, was guest speaker at the meeting. He talked very informally on "Rollins Today", describing in detail the Individualized Curriculum and its application to war training and post-war training. Following Dean Stone's talk President Holt spoke optimistically of the outlook for Rollins after the war.

At the Alumni Memorial Vesper Service, held in the Francis Chapel at 4 o'clock, Frank Evans '23, read the Invocation, Lt. Frank S. Wetherell, '35, read the Litany and Capt. Celestina McKay, '34, read the Scripture. Daphne Takach, '42, played the organ and Alice Bane Shearouse, '43, sang a solo. Mrs. Warren said a few words and President Holt read the names of those for whom the service was held. Arthur T. Dear, '36, ushered.

The tea at five o'clock in the Alumni House was under the direction of Frances Perrottet Olson, '40, and Catherine Green Lyons, '31, with a number of local alumnae assisting. Members of the Senior Class were invited.

FROM THE ALUMNI SECRETARY'S DESK

We'd like to thank the people who wrote us after the last *Record* was published and who sent us the names of prospective students. We also thank those who didn't write us, but who told prospective students about Rollins. Those students have written us. So far, our applications for Fall entrance are running about four times ahead of last year, so our prospects are good. We hope they'll keep up. Keep plugging for us.

Keeping up with some 3000 alumni is work that involves endless detail. A single change of address for one of you means four changes in our files, including making a new aluminum plate to address the *Record*. Sometimes we get pretty discouraged when we're notified by postal authorities that 200 of you have moved without notifying us. *As second-class matter, the Record* is not forwarded by the post office to your new address.

When you move and leave no forwarding address, we must classify you as temporarily lost. In order to find you, we must first determine who would know where you are. We hunt through our files to find out where your parents are, what your fraternity was, what preparatory school you attended or who your best friend is. Then we write one or more of these asking for your address. If we get an answer, we write you for confirmation. If we get no answer we must cross you off our mailing list until sometime when you may write us or when someone may tell us where you are.

If that's happened to you, don't be furious at the College for not keeping in touch with you. Instead, drop us a postal card telling us where you are, and do the same thing each time you move. For men or women in service, we'd like to have a permanent address to which we can send the *Record*, knowing that someone at that address will send the *Record* on to you. As second-class matter, postage must be added to it to forward it. Better still, is to fold the magazine into an envelope with proper postage. We cannot mail the *Record* to your camp address, for you move about too frequently and we haven't a large enough supply of aluminum addressograph plates to make so many changes. We consider an APO address when you are serving overseas quite permanent, and will use it.

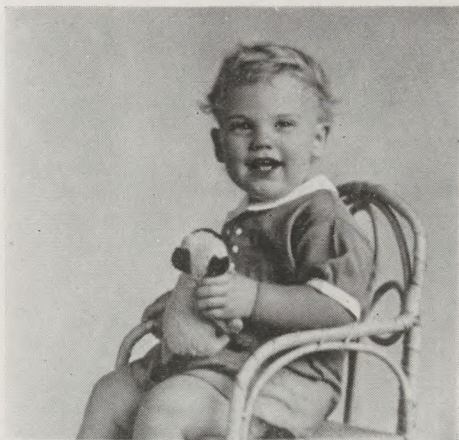
GOLD STAR MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS

At the Animated Magazine, President Holt announced the establishment of twelve GOLD STAR MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIPS in honor of the thirteen Rollins men who have already given their lives in military service. The scholarships will be for \$500 each for the coming college year 1944-45. Each award will bear the name of one of the men. The "subscribers" at the Magazine were asked to contribute to the \$6500 Gold Star Memorial Scholarship Fund and about \$3000 was collected from them. The College is now making an effort to raise the remaining necessary \$3500. If there should be an over-subscription, the extra money will be used to continue these awards. Any alumni who wish to contribute to the fund should send their gift through the Alumni Secretary.

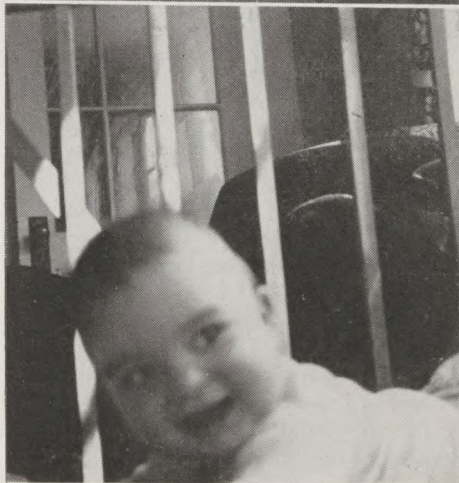
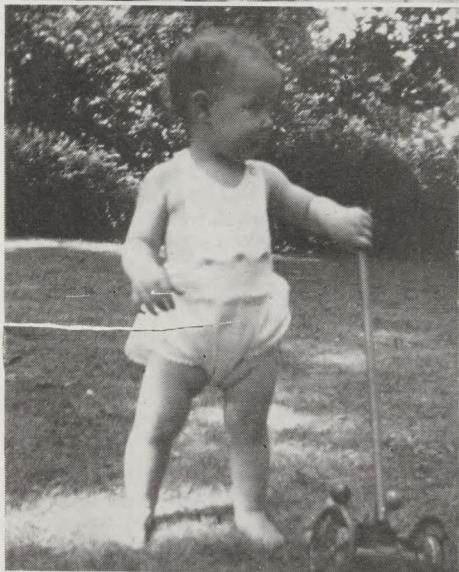
Left: Michael Ogilvie, son of Donald and Sherry (Gregg) Ogilvie, '40.
