ALUMNI SECRETARY RESIGNS

It is with sincere regret that we announce the resignation of Katherine Lewis Lehman as Alumni Secretary and Editor of the *Record*. Katharine and her husband, Rodman, are very proud to announce the birth of a son, Lewis John, on Thursday, December 2nd.

Katharine was born in Mt. Dora, but removed to Winter Park while in her early teens. She has been associated with Rollins as student or worker ever since. She was graduated from the old Academy in 1923 and from the college (A.B.) in 1927.

Almost immediately after graduation she became a member of the staff of the Alumni Office. She proved such an efficient administrator and organizer that in 1932 she was placed in full charge of the Alumni program as Alumni Secretary. In 1933 she was elected Editor of the *Record*. She has supervised the club work throughout the country, kept exact records of each former student, teacher, and staff member which entailed correspondence with a large number of our alumni in various parts of the country. The organization of programs for the annual reunions, in the fall, at Founders Week, at Commencement, and at Woodstock was all Katharine's work. She started the alumni library and handled the distribution of the Rollins plates.

Also Katharine was active in the campaign to raise the fund for erecting Alumni House, was a leader in furnishing it, and organized its use for the Alumni. Here she has greeted hundreds of returning alumni at all times of the year.

The Alumni Association owes Katharine Lehman a big vote of thanks for the overtime she has given, for the cheerfulness with which she has performed her duties, and for the many services which she gave that were not required of her. She has been a big factor in the success of the Alumni Association and of Alumni House since 1932.

ENROLMENT

We are happy to report to you that the enrolment this year has exceeded our estimates and expectations, both in the number of entering students and in the number of returning students.

Registrations in October totaled 299. Of this number 291 were full time students and 8 part time students (adults who are employed and do not have time to carry a full load). The total number of civilian men registered is 42. This proportion of men and women is in line with that reported by other colleges. There are 93 freshman women and 18 freshman men.

You will recall that the normal enrolment of the College during peacetime has been around 400. In spite of the loss of almost all men students, comprising almost 50% of the student body, half of the loss has been made up by the increase in women. The total decrease in enrolment, then, has been about 25%. We believe this report is highly encouraging in view of the war and travel situation.

The increase in enrolment of women caused a serious housing problem. Lakeside dormitory, which had been given to the Army, was released by them to accommodate our girls. We rehabilitated some rooms in Cloverleaf, and it now accommodates more girls than it has in years. Lakeside houses both

freshman and transfer girls. Many rooms there have been made into double rooms. The guest rooms in Strong and Mayflower are occupied by students, and in Pugsley a number of rooms have been fitted for double occupancy. At present there are but six "beds" left, and the indications are that Winter term applicants will fill these spaces.

Housing for men has been as serious a problem. The K.A. house is the only one not occupied by the Army. We had expected this would fill our needs, but more men came than we anticipated. Consequently the second floor of one of the Conservatory buildings had to be converted from office and classroom space into bedrooms for men.

The Alumni will be interested in knowing that more and more new students are applying to Rollins because they have heard of the College from alumni and students. This is indeed a healthy sign and one we wish to encourage. It comes from alumni "taking up" the College and suggesting to prospective students that they consider Rollins. For the most part, students who apply because of alumni influence are far better academically than those who select idly. If any of you know of students whom you feel would be desirable, please send us their names, and we shall be glad to send them a College catalog.

ALUMNI AND ADMISSION OFFICES COMBINED

When Katharine Lehman resigned as Alumni Secretary, the staff of the Admissions office volunteered to take over the routine of the Alumni work. The Executive Council of the Alumni Association and the administration accepted this offer. Marita Stueve, '38, was made Acting Executive Secretary. This position is in addition to her work as Director of Admissions. The combination is a practical one, for alumni assistance in admissions is important.

CHANGES IN THE ALUMNI FUND

At a meeting of the local alumni in November it was suggested that the Alumni Fund be handled in an entirely different manner. After thorough discussion the Executive Council of the Alumni Association voted to adopt the new plan and requested that it be announced in this issue of the *Alumni Record*.

The Fund will be handled as a class matter through the Class Secretary. Only once during the year is there to be a request for donations for the Alumni Fund. During February each person will receive a letter from his class secretary requesting a contribution to the Alumni Fund. No other request will be made, but we hope that Alumni who are unable to contribute at the time will try to do so later in the year.

MRS. EMILIE BAUGHMAN CASS PASSES AWAY

Detailed information has been received recently concerning the passing of Mrs. Emilie B. Cass, Registrar Emeritus of Rollins College, who died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Burleigh Seaver, at Doylestown, Ohio, after an illness of two days. Death came to her while asleep.

Mrs. Cass came to Rollins College in 1922 and retired in 1938 after sixteen years of distinguished service. In her position as Registrar, she came in contact with every student enrolled in the College during her period of service, and she became one of the most beloved women on the Rollins Campus. Her devotion to the students and faculty, her warm, friendly manner towards all, endeared her to old and young.

The news of Mrs. Cass' death will bring real sorrow to the Rollins Alumni who were so dear to her heart. A recent letter from her daughter says in part: "Two weeks ago Mother received a copy of the Rollins Alumni Bulletin, and as she read over the names of those in service, she told me funny little incidents about various ones. I believe the years spent at Rollins were the happiest of Mother's life".

In 1931, Mrs. Cass was awarded the highest honor in the gift of the College—the Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallion.

REPORT OF THE 1943 ALUMNI FUND

In the period from January 1, 1943 to December 1, 1943, the alumni contributed \$5,860.23. The number of donors was 168, which makes an average of about \$34 per donor. The total given does not nearly approach the goal of \$10,000, which we had set for ourselves. There is still time to add to the total fund before the new year begins. The size of the donation is less important than the number of people who give.

ROLLINS GRADUATES PUBLISH BOOKS

Within the last few months the alumni have published books which have received favorable reviews. Two of them received recommended listings by the Book-of-the-Month Club. The following is a reprint of the reviews:

"In reviewing 'Inherit the Wind' by Maxedon von Hesse, Phillip Van Doren Stern said, 'Here's a novel written by a newcomer that starts off with a bang and then builds up to a hurricane climax. The book is filled with incident and color. There are dozens of scenes of Florida life to add interest—cock fighting, cattle rustling in the swamps, small-town feuds, and Seminole Indian ceremonies in the Everglades.' The scene of the story is laid in the Lake Okeechobee region.

In reviewing 'The Darker Brother' by Bucklin Moon, Jonathan Daniels said, 'The story of the American negro at this hour has nowhere been so effectively told as in this hard-boiled and heart-touching story by Bucklin Moon.'

The scene of the 'The Darker Brother' opens in Hannibal Square in Win Park and transfers to Harlem, New York City.

In addition to these two novels a third recent Rollins graduate Wenzel Brown, has issued a remarkable story of his experience during the siege of Hong Kong, and his six months imprisonment by the Japs in Stanley Prison camp. The book is entitled 'Hong Kong Aftermath'.

The alumni are beginning to show the results of the excellent courses in creative writing which Edwin Granberry has been giving.
