# *Around the Horseshoe*

**R**OLLINS' 57th year will open September 26 with every prospect of a splendid entering class. Although the proportion between men and women will be on the feminine side, the "male animal" will still be much in evidence.

Rollins will be running at nearly full capacity during the coming year. A higher percentage of students are returning this year than in many previous years. In addition to our regular students we have a quota of 20 Civilian Pilot Trainees working on an extensive 8 week's program to prepare themselves for various classes of flying. One group has already completed their period of training during the summer. These men will be housed in Lakeside.

## **ROLLINS ACCREDITED**

Rollins College is fully accredited and affiliated with all the Armed Services. 43% of our men are in the Enlisted Reserves. In one sense of the word, Rollins is a training center for war effort and all our facilities have been placed at the disposal of the Government who has requested that Rollins serve by training officer candidates.

The women are in many war activities such as Nurses Aid, Red Cross First Aid and Advanced First Aid, shorthand and typing, chemical warfare and code. These courses will in all probability be expanded during the year.

## **CPT TRAINEES**

Co-ordinator A. D. Enyart reports that the first group of CPT Trainees to report to the Rollins campus for the intensive 8 weeks training period under the first Army phase full time training, has completed its work and been assigned to advanced training. On the same day they completed their work at Rollins, 9 glider pilots received orders to report immediately to Roswell Field, N. Mex. The service pilots were ordered to Tampa where they will take advanced flying.

The next group to take the intensive 240 hours training will arrive at Rollins September 20. In this group there will be 6 glider pilot applicants and 14 service pilots. Army men have expressed their real satisfaction in the manner in which these men trained at Rollins have successfully completed their basic work.

## **A MESSAGE FROM PREXY**

A democracy must produce its own leaders. Leaders must be educated and colleges must educate them.

## SUMMER SESSION

Director Alex Waite and administrative officers at Rollins are highly pleased over the success of the first Summer Session. There were ninety-seven students who took work over the ten and a half week period. Faculty were members of the regular teaching staff at Rollins. Mrs. Enwright and Miss Green were in charge of dormitories while Miss Green also directed the Sunday evening vespers and planned social activities of the Session. The Student House was open for the Session and all meals were served here.

A great deal of local interest was shown in this new program and it is felt that should the world situation continue to make a Summer Session at Rollins desirable a good foundation has been laid and that a larger and more comprehensive program would be offered next year.

Students attending were accelerating their programs and some Freshmen were in attendance who wished to get started on their college work early.

## ACHIEVEMENT and INTEGRATED MERGE

The Achievement Plan and the Integrated Course Plan will merge next year in a program pointed directly toward preparing the student to meet the exigencies of the world situation. The new plan rests on the premise that all-out individualization is necessary if students are to be prepared to meet the problems of today and tomorrow.

The freshmen will register for 3½ courses: (1) a course in the Application of the Problems of Mental Hygiene; (2) a course related to the student's interests; (3) an elective; (4) English. In the course in Mental Hygiene, extensive aptitude and achievement tests will be given. The results will be tabulated on a profile and discussed with each individual student. A summary of the material on the student's school history will be prepared as additional information. Frequent individual conferences between student and instructor will crystallize in an understanding of the student's abilities and talents. Thus in terms of these three methods, all aimed at enabling the student to discover his capacities, abilities, talents and deficiencies, a program for each Lower Division student will be planned. At the end of the first term the Instructor of the Mental Hygiene Course will make out in consultation with the student his Lower Division program. This program will then be passed on to an advisor, who will check it to see that the three fields of knowledge—Human Affairs, the Humanities and the Sciences—are adequately covered.

Thus the Lower Division program is further related to the actual needs of the student. The development of these needs and abilities will constitute training for the student's future and prepare him to meet the necessities of the times.

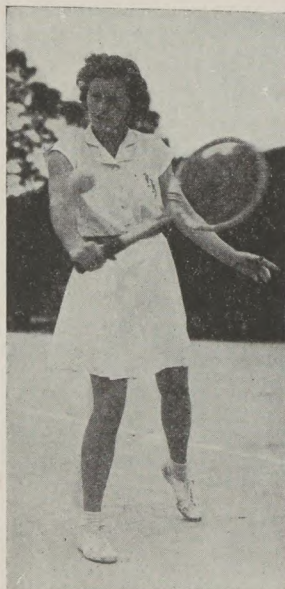

Each supervisor is in charge of 2 three-hour shifts and the supervisor has to arrive 30 minutes ahead of the shift so each one works 6½ hours every other day. The supervisor checks workers in and out, keeps files, calls all absentees and keeps a record of excuses (she says the "excuse book" is a masterpiece of humor), arranges vacations—they give 10 minute breaks to each worker around the filter board so there is no idle time. In the Mobile organization there are 550 women working.

In addition to her work for the Intercept Command Mrs. Bulwinkle has just been elected president of the American Legion Auxiliary in Mobile and attended the state convention held in Montgomery in July.
