## Betty Sloan, CAP Pilot

**B**ETTY PHILLIPS SLOAN, member of the 1942 graduating class, is a member of the Orlando Squadron of the Civil Air Patrol and has the distinction of being the only woman pilot in the squadron. There are four other women in the squadron, but they are "observers." Betty has held a pilot's license for several years, and is a member of the famous "Ninety-nine" an international organization of women pilots and affiliated with the National Aeronautical Association.

As a member of the Civil Air Patrol Betty is virtually under military rule. Members are called upon for any service they may render in the patrolling of certain areas or in case of emergencies. While on duty they are under strict military orders. Being a member of the squadron also calls for much studying. For a period of 4 weeks members of the Squadron devoted 4 hours nightly to class work and this has now tapered down to 3 hours each night. This in addition to doing patrol duty and completing requirements for her degree at Rollins has kept Betty plenty busy!

Betty was married in the Frances Chapel to Walter Sloan on January 19 and after graduation Betty will join him. He is a staff sergeant with the 20th Bombardment Squadron, U.S. Air Corps.

## Walter Beard, '44, Inventor

**A**N INGENIUS device for a simple sodium press has been invented in the Rollins Laboratory by Walter C. Beard, Jr., a second year student at Rollins. The invention has been made public in the May edition of the "Journal of Chemical Education," official publication of the division of chemical education of the American Chemical Society.

Approximately a half-page is devoted to an outline and diagram of young Beard's sodium press, which he points out is "designed for use in small laboratories where the demand for sodium metal in the wire form is not sufficient to warrant the purchase of a standard press."

Walter used scrap cold-rolled steel plating in designing a simple piston and cylinder arrangement, with a small hole in the cylinder through which the sodium is forced, to emerge in the form of a wire. The press combines simplicity and low-cost of construction with a minimum of machine work.

Walter is a graduate of the Winter Park High School and last summer after completing one year at Rollins was accepted for summer school work at Harvard.

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# Commencement

THE PROGRAM for Commencement week was a full one and was opened on Friday evening, May 29 with the play "The First Year" starring Patty Pritchard who has done outstanding work in the Little Theatre during her four years at Rollins. Saturday night saw the second performance of the play and the Student Association Dance honoring the Senior Class was held following the play out at the Dubsdread Country Club.

The Baccalaureate service was held in the Knowles Memorial Chapel with Dr. Thomas E. Jones, uncle of Janet Jones, giving the sermon. Seniors taking part in the service were: Carrow Tolson; Aldine Baker; Robert F. Whiston; and Janet Jones. Class Day was held in the Annie Russell Theatre because of rain. Robert Whiston chairman of the Senior Committee presided. The Last Will and Testament was written and read by Dick Kelly, prizes and honors were awarded, Dr. France spoke briefly to the graduates and the Farewell was given by Priscilla Thompson. The traditional Palm Planting Ceremony followed. That evening members of the graduating class were presented in a conservatory recital in the Annie Russell Theatre.

The President's reception honoring members of the graduating class and their parents was held at Dr. Holt's home Wednesday afternoon.

Thursday morning dawned bright and clear (unusual for this Commencement Week) and a goodly number of alumni and seniors enjoyed the traditional breakfast out under the spreading arm of the Family Tree. Fleet and Fred Ward were the cooks. Fleet was called away from his duties at the camp fire to try to catch a small gator which came along to see what all the festivities were about.

## Commencement

Dr. John Martin was the speaker of the morning and congratulated the seniors upon entering a world full of challenge—the challenge of winning a lasting peace after this war is won. Said Dr. Martin: "When this war has been won, as it surely will be, we of the United Nations must put brains as well as emotion into the making and keeping of peace. The United States will have the peace of the world in its keeping; and it alone can organize and lead an international police power capable of insuring world law and order."

President Holt presented Bachelor of Arts degrees to 50, Bachelor of Music to 10 and Bachelor of Science to 5. Carrow Tolson, President of the Student Body during the past year received the 0000 Honor award for his contribution to the spirit of leadership and cooperation on the campus and the Libra award for leadership among the girls was awarded to Helen Darling.

The Algernon Sydney Sullivan Medallions were given to Betty Berdahl of Daytona Beach and Dwight M. Johnston of Ocoee. In bestowing the Medallions President Holt said:

"Betty Berdahl, the award you are about to receive is to honor you, not flatter you, for flattery to you would be only an embarrassment. Yet such praises as we would give is but to acknowledge your rare, subtle and yet vital contribution to the campus life of this little College you have so loved and so faithfully served.

"Your cheerful disposition has often given fresh courage to your friends. Your radiant and spontaneous kindness has prompted many to be more kind. Your thoughtfulness of others, your generosity in action, your faithfulness in performance of duty, to mention only your bravery in overcoming the experiences of your first day in the Orange General Hospital as a Red Cross Nurse's Aide,

have proved you both courageous and skillful in the fine art of living.

"The student theatre, the choir, and the many college committees on which you have served—all have been enriched by a certain spiritual quality in your character. Indeed, you have already flowered into gracious womanhood. We honor you for this achievement, which is the fulfillment of the ultimate purpose of education at Rollins.

"Accept then this Sullivan Medallion in appreciation of the blessing you have ever been to Rollins College. May it be a satisfaction and inspiration to you all the days of your life."

"Dwight McMillan Johnston, in your blood is the salt of the earth, which has not lost its savor in self-satisfaction or sophistication. You have been positive and serious, but at the same time creative and colorful. You have found life both good and meaningful. You have ever been a Happy Warrior. Provocative, you have had foes, but not enemies. You have dared to speak out when others remained silent, and you have never feared to champion an unpopular cause.

"You have always asked not 'What can I GET, but what can I GIVE?' You have shown unvarying dependability and resourcefulness, never waiting to be told what to do, but seeking out ways and means of achieving what should be done and must be done.

"For these evidences of a valorous nature, the Sullivan Medallion honors you today. Yours has been a splendid contribution to the better life of Rollins College. Your record here gives promise of continuing usefulness and service in the coming years of your manhood, for they will have need of your faithfulness and courage.

"May the Sullivan Medallion be a satisfaction and inspiration to you all the days of your life."

Rollins Decorations of Honor were conferred upon two alumni, Francis R. Bridges, '23, of Tallahassee and Arthur Ivey, '19 of Jacksonville; and upon three members of the Rollins Faculty, Dr. Alfred Hasbrouck, Hugh F. McKean, '30, and Jack McDowall. Listed below are the citations for these honors.

Professor Hanna: "Francis Rhett Bridges, Jr., was born at Bartow, a Florida town which may also boast of Governor Holland as one of its native sons. He is a representative of the second generation of his family to study at Rollins, his mother, the former Annie Maude Taylor, having entered here in 1889. His late father was for half a century an active minister in the Florida Conference, Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

"Mr. Bridges received his preparation for college in the public schools of Ocala, Gainesville, Plant City and Quincy and was graduated from Rollins in the Class of 1923. He did not follow his mother's example and sing in the Rollins Glee Club, but served as president of his class, was a member of Kappa Alpha Fraternity, and as managing editor of the 'Rollins Sandspur' set a high standard for his college in the field of college journalism.

"Mr. Bridges' career since leaving college has been one of distinguished achievement in journalism and in public service. He served as reporter and news editor of the 'Orlando Morning Sentinel', news editor and staff correspondent for the Associated Press in Atlanta, Nashville and Jacksonville, and for thirteen and one-half years as news reporter, feature writer, and staff legislative correspondent of the 'Florida Times-Union.' During the 1939 and 1941 sessions of the Florida Legislature he was President of the Capitol Press Club, the membership of which is made of newsmen and radio commentators assigned to the Legislature. He has rendered additional public service as a member of the Civitan Club of Jacksonville and as a member of the Rotary Club of Tallahassee.

"When in 1941 a non-partisan Parole Commission—first in the United States to be selected on a merit basis—was organized, Mr. Bridges took the examination for eligibility to appointment to this board and attained one of the three highest ratings in the examination, which was taken by 260 men and women. When he and two others were appointed to the Commission he was elected chairman.

"Since at least ninety-five percent of persons imprisoned eventually return to society, the functions of the Commission are primarily concerned with the protection of society and the rehabilitation of worthy individuals who have been convicted of the viola-

tion of some state law, but who really want to adjust themselves to re-enter civilian life.

"Mr. President, I have the privilege of presenting to you Francis Rhett Bridges, Jr., for the Rollins Decoration of Honor."

President Holt: "Francis Rhett Bridges, Jr., Journalist and Public Servant, your alma mater takes pride in your useful and distinguished career in which you have always upheld her 'Fair, unsullied fame.' While a student at Rollins you followed the high example of your mother in maintaining a high academic standard and an admirable record as a good citizen of the campus. In less than two decades since you left Rollins you have achieved a reputation which reflects high credit on yourself and on the college where you were trained. Your faithfulness in character, hard work, and fine intelligence have won for you as head of one of the most important agencies of the state of Florida an opportunity to render even broader service. In recognition of your admirable record and a source of encouragement to you in the future, I take pleasure in conferring upon you the Rollins Decoration of Honor and admit you to all its rights and privileges."

Mr. Caldwell: "Arthur Goode Ivey is one of the many creditable products of Orange County. Grandson of John Ivey a pioneer who settled here in 1858 and served as the county's first elected sheriff, he was born near Orlando in 1895 in whose schools he was prepared for college.

"After completing his preparation for college in 1915 he continued his connection with the 'Orlando Morning Sentinel' as he entered Rollins in the fall. His experience and lively interest in journalism soon placed him in a position of responsibility on the 'Rollins Sandspur' which he served as one of the three editors-in-chief and was instrumental in stabilizing that publication from an intermittent 'every so often' appearance to a regular weekly basis.

"After leaving Rollins Mr. Ivey served briefly in the United States Army in the First World War. Besides connections with a number of weekly and semi-weekly papers, in editorial, advertising, managerial posts he has devoted most of his time to newsroom and editorial assignments including three years with 'The Tampa Tribune' which he served as a reporter, assistant city editor, and city editor, two years with the 'Tampa Daily Times' and since 1929 with the 'Florida Times-Union' which he serves as State News Editor and a member of the editorial staff. His editorial page responsibilities include the preparation of several features dealing with Florida activities, a column of brief editorials under

the heading of 'Short Talks' and a column of 'Paragraphs' devoted to comments of humorous or philosophical trend. On Sundays he conducts a column 'With Florida Poets' the prime purpose of which is to discover writers of talent who might not otherwise have an opportunity to get their work before the public.

"Mr. Ivey is a Methodist and a Mason. His wife is the former Thelma Grace DeWitt of Orlando and they have one son, DeWitt Ivey. For many years he has been a voluminous contributor to national trade papers, serving varied industries and professions and he has done considerable free-lance newspaper work.

"Mr. President, I have the privilege of presenting to you Arthur Goode Ivey for the Rollins Decoration of Honor."

President Holt: "Arthur Goode Ivey, Son of Orange County Pioneers, Journalist, and Public Servant, you have achieved a record, both in college and in life, that is an inspiration to Rollins undergraduates and alumni. You are a living demonstration that high character and intelligence supplemented by steady, continuous and hard work always produce distinctive results. In recognition of what you have already accomplished as well as for the fine work you are now doing, and as a token of your notable career, I take pleasure in conferring upon you the Rollins Decoration of Honor and admit you to all its rights and privileges."

Mr. Holt: "Hugh Ferguson McKean was born at Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania, graduated from Rollins in 1930, and received his Master of Arts Degree at Williams in 1940. Since 1932 he has been instructor, assistant professor and associate professor of Art at Rollins. He is the head of the Rollins Art Department.

"Mr. McKean is both an organizer and a clubman. As a clubman he was a member of the Key Society and of the Order of the Fox while at Rollins and is a member of the Optimists Club of Orlando. As an organizer he was one of the founders of the X Club, and has been an active advisor to the members of the Club ever since, attending at least one meeting each year and paying his dues irregularly.

"He was a pioneer in the organization of the Gutenberg Club, which, he assures us, is the most exclusive club in the world. There are two members. There is no waiting list of new members. A meeting of the club consists of Mr. McKean's saying 'Good Morning' to Dr. Grover, who is the other member.

"Mr. McKean has also been active in church work and in politics. He is a past member of the Vestry of All Saint's Episcopal

# Educational Guidance at Rollins in the War Crisis

**I**N A very real sense the primary function of an educational institution is the guidance of the development of individuals. Education takes place as the result of the individual's activity and the educational institution directs to a large extent this activity. This guidance is of two main sorts: (1) The student is guided and directed by teaching in the classroom as he studies and takes part in class activities in the subject matter fields; (2) The student is guided by the general educational program of the school in the selection of the activities in which he engages.

The Rollins plan of individualized education, utilizing the conference method of teaching in the classroom, has proved an excellent means of guiding the student in the acquisition and understanding of knowledge. The war crisis has presented the need of orienting the content of courses to the war and peace aims of our nation. A faculty committee has undertaken to direct this orientation of curriculum content to these aims and the entire faculty is participating in this program. This program is, of course, basic in the readjustments made necessary by the war crisis.

The most immediate need presented by the war, however, has been the guidance of students with respect to their educational plans. Both government officials and educational leaders in our country anticipated the disruption which would occur with our nation at war and saw clearly that the solution of the war problems necessitates the training and education of a leadership which only our colleges can give. In the minds of individual students, however, the war upset all calculations with respect to the future. This is quite understandable. College students are in the last stages of that period of their lives which is devoted almost entirely to education, and they are of the age best suited to the undertaking of military and associated services for their country.

With the entrance of our country into the war, Rollins in common with all colleges, had the problem of considering all student schedules for their orientation to the national needs. In the mind of each individual student there was needed the development of an attitude with respect to further education and plans for service which would give a sense of self respect and patriotism to the student and which would also direct his activities in the most useful way both to himself and to the nation. Obviously, Rollins had a responsibility to its students in this matter. This responsibility was clearly recognized and with the beginning of the winter term an Advisory Board was set up, with Dean Enyart as chairman. This Board collected data on the world situation and national needs and on the program of the government, and undertook to advise all students with respect to their plans in the light of their opportunities and capacities. This Board has this year helped many students develop stable and farseeing plans with respect to their sphere of greatest usefulness.

It is becoming increasingly clear that individualized education depends upon an adequate understanding of the individual and his talents, capacities and interests. In order to make the Rollins educational plan as effective as possible, the faculty has incorporated into its curriculum plan for the coming year a program of achievement and

aptitude testing. In addition to the usual placement tests given to all freshmen during orientation week, students will be tested for their aptitudes, achievements and deficiencies in the three main areas of education—human affairs, humanities, and science. The test results will be used with other available information to aid the student to make an adequate self evaluation. His educational program will then be planned on the basis of his self-evaluation and the opportunities available at this time.

The problems of winning the war and winning the peace place squarely before colleges the need of producing the type of educated people who can solve these problems. Correspondingly, these problems present to college students the responsibility of educating themselves so that they will have the vision, training and courage to see and attack intelligently the questions which must be faced if civilization is to be saved.

Rollins has re-examined her educational ideals in the light of war and peace needs and has found them good. The problem of orienting all activities, curricular and extra-curricular, to the end that Rollins may make its maximum contribution to the achievement of our nation's war aims has been realistically faced. For its work the loyal understanding of all, students, faculty, administration, alumni and the general public is not only needed but is in keeping with the purpose of all loyal Americans.

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## Ollie S. Bandy, Author

**O**LLIE S. BANDY, A.B. '29, M.A. '30, is co-author with Dr. Luis Aviles Perez, Assistant State Supervisor for the Teaching of Spanish in the U.S. Army Air Corps in Georgia and formerly instructor in Spanish at Duke University, of a book just published by Turner E. Smith & Co. of Atlanta, entitled "Adventures in Conversational Spanish." Bandy is instructor in Spanish in the Technological High School, Atlanta.

The chief purposes in producing this book are (1) to create a better understanding of our neighbors to the South by acquainting ourselves with their language habits and by developing an appreciation of the historical and cultural aspects of their two countries; (2) to provide a simple and practical method of teaching and learning the Spanish language so that it may be applied in conversation. The plan used is to introduce a minimum of grammar rules and to present conversational material, which, through its cleverness and vitality, will enable the student to acquire a knowledge of everyday, spoken Spanish.

## Summer School at Rollins

**N**O SHUT DOWN HERE. Rollins is open for business this summer. The picture above is of the new Student Center which is more than ever the center of the college activities this summer. For here all meals are served to the new hard working student body, the faculty and staff. This center supplies not only the three meals a day, but that pause that refreshes, mail from a new post office, and books and supplies from a new book store. The chairs you see in the dance terrace are being used for study by some classes and individuals.

There must be a first time for everything, and this first summer term for Rollins is a portion of its War Adjustment program. It provides the opportunity for accelerating the four year college course, for completing it in three years or less. Not only are the students, the doctors, the scientists of the future bringing that future period of usefulness closer for their own satisfaction and the good of the community and the nation at war; but many others are taking specialized training in typing, shorthand, and accounting. The opportunities for adult education have attracted others in other fields. In addition to the full ten weeks term, a six weeks term has attracted teachers who want special advanced work and it is operating concurrently with the regular length term.

Church in Winter Park, and was also once a member of the Executive Committee of the Democratic Party of Orange County.

"Mr. McKean has had a literary past. He almost had the distinction of being the last editor of 'The Flamingo', the Rollins literary magazine. That honor has since been shared by others.

"All these varied and fruitful activities have been carried on by Mr. McKean in addition to his real contributions as an artist and teacher. He has studied at the summer school of the Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Arts, the School of Fine Arts at Fontainebleau, France, and at the Art Student's League in New York. Exhibitions of his paintings have appeared in New York.

"Mr. McKean has said he does not feel capable of turning out more than one Rembrandt every fifteen years. Therefore, he has, as have few other teachers of art, emphasized the teaching of art culture as an essential to the education of a well-integrated individual. His classes are interesting because he is interesting; his students learn because he is an example of good scholarship; his courses are inspiring because he is inspired.

"Mr. McKean exemplifies in his own person those qualities of scholarship, unselfishness, progressiveness and humor which are so much a part of every Rollins professor's stock in trade."

# A Rare Gift to Rollins

MRS. FRED PERRY POWERS of Philadelphia and Winter Park has given to Rollins a collection of English lustre ware, temporarily placed in the office of the Alumni House under the gracious care of Kay Lewis Lehman. To the casual observer, the pieces charm by beauty of line and color. To the student of old china, they reveal the development of this rare type from plain silver lustre, suggesting the work of a silversmith, to later achievements in "resist," rose Sunderland, strawberry and gold splashed decorations.

Luster has an ancient and honorable history dating back to the early days of Spanish and Italian pottery, but its flowering in England took place in the late eighteenth and early nineteenth centuries. So successfully did the potter imitate sterling that many people viewing this collection believed for the moment that actual silver filled one of the shelves.

Teapots, sugar bowls and pitchers comprise the major part of Mrs. Powers' gift, together with several cups and saucers, a pepper shaker, mustard pot and tiny creamer. Of decided charm is a teapot of lilac resist in grapevine pattern accompanied by several matching pieces. Of greater rarity is a large platter or tray in plain silver on a white foundation, purchased in Quebec and probably of French origin. Worthy of note are the fluted bowls and pitchers recalling valuable George III silver. Very attractive are the strawberry specimens, one cup and saucer bearing the coveted mark of Josiah Spode of Stoke-on-Trent. Dixon, a famous craftsman is represented by a small plaque displaying a ship's compass enclosed by a border of copper luster.

In speaking of the Dixon imprint, Mrs. Powers says, "When my mother was three years old in 1829, my grandfather bought for her a pink Staffordshire child's tea set and each piece is marked 'Dixon'."

A few potters aided future collectors by marking their luster, but many, alas, were not so considerate. Much of the plain silver on a brown body, particularly prized on account of its age, seldom carries any identification.

Arthur Hayden of London who has guided china lovers on both sides of the Atlantic, writes: "The places where luster is known to have been manufactured are Brislington by R. Frank about 1770; at Etruria by Wedgwood in 1780; by Wilson in Staffordshire in 1785; by Moore and Dixon in Sunderland about 1820; by Thomas Dillway of Swansea, Wales from 1800 to a later date. Treat the old ware kindly. It will not come again."

Rollins is fortunate in having this additional proof of Mrs. Powers' interest and regard. For years she has donated to the College library valuable books and magazines on the subject of antiques and the decorative arts.

# Winslow S. Anderson President of Whitman

FORMER Rollins Dean Anderson was inaugurated the sixth president of Whitman College, Walla Walla, Washington at the 83rd annual commencement exercises held June 1 in the campus amphitheatre. Dr. Anderson was inducted by D. F. Baker, president of the Board of Trustees of Whitman.

Individualism in education, the very heart of the small liberal arts college, was the keynote of Dr. Anderson's inaugural address. "The freedoms to which we have been accustomed are threatened by forces too great to be overcome by wishful thinking or earnest talking. We are engaged in a war to determine whether the freedoms won for us by our forefathers are to be preserved and passed on to those who follow.

"In this chaos and strife the liberal arts college finds itself in a critical atmosphere. As it is the duty of education to lead, most colleges find themselves in a dilemma of desiring to adopt new methods but fearing to break with the old. A college need not break entirely with the old, but it is evident that liberal education must adopt more rational methods if it is to achieve its goal, if it is to keep abreast of the times," said Dr. Anderson.

President Anderson was welcomed to Washington by Dr. E. O. Holland, president of Washington State College, and Governor Langlie on behalf of the people of Washington. Following the exercises a reception was given honoring President and Mrs. Anderson.

Scores of telegrams were received by the Andersons from their many Rollins friends congratulating them on this new opportunity for service and wishing them much happiness in their new home.
